



FY 25 Budget

The Wapsie Valley Board of Education has approved the budget for fiscal year 2025. Below is a recap of some of the things that the district has made decisions on as well as the tax rate that the board has set:

- \$400,000 levied for cash reserves
- \$300,000 levied for the management fund

- Increase SAVE contribution to \$275,000 toward debt levy
- Through retirement, attrition, and reduction 9 positions were affected for next year. This will equate to a cash savings of \$453,486.
 - FY 2024 Tax Rate \$13.7063
 - FY 2025 Tax Rate \$13.7339
 - Net Change \$0.0276

Million Dollar Mac & Cheese

☐ 8 ounces elbow macaroni

☐ 3 tablespoons butter

□ 1/4 cup all-purpose flour□ 1 3/4 cup milk

☐ 1/4 cup heavy cream

□ 10 ounces cheddar freshly grated

☐ 1 teaspoon salt

□ 1/2 teaspoon black pepper

For layering:

□ 1/4 cup melted butter

□ 1/3 cup sour cream

☐ 3 ounces Havarti freshly grated

 \Box 3 ounces gruyere freshly grated For the bread crumb topping:

□ ½ cup Panko bread crumbs

☐ 1 tablespoon butter melted☐ 1/2 teaspoon garlic salt

☐ 1 tablespoon parsley minced

Instructions:

Preheat oven to 375 degrees.

Bring a large pot of water to a rolling boil. Cook pasta for one minute less than package directions state. Drain.

While macaroni is cooking, melt 3 tablespoons of butter in a medium sized pot and add the flour. Cook, whisking constantly, over medium heat for 1 minute.

Continue whisking and slowly pour in the milk and cream. Cook over medium heat for another 2 minutes until thickened and smooth.

Remove from the heat and stir in the cheddar, salt, and pepper. Continue stirring until smooth and creamy. Add the cooked macaroni to the cheese sauce and stir to coat. Taste and season with additional salt and pepper, if needed.

To layer the dish:

Pour melted butter into the bottom of a 2-quart baking dish. Spoon half of the macaroni and cheese over the top. Spread the sour cream over the macaroni and cheese. Sprinkle with the Havarti and gruyere.

Spoon remaining macaroni and cheese over the top.

To make the topping: Stir together the Panko, melted butter, garlic salt, and parsley to make the bread crumb topping. Sprinkle over the macaroni and cheese.

To bake:

Bake for 25 minutes or until the sauce is bubbly and the top is as browned as you'd like. Serve immediately.

"A Salty Experience"

As we move towards summer, my mind is on tournament fishing and summer land chores and all my daily duties. But, for a moment this month, I'm going to take you on an adventure my family and I went on in late March and early April.

This journey started in early December 2023 as my wife, Aubrey, and I started to plan our family vacation for 2024. A couple years back, we were able to make our way to Gulf Shores, Alabama, and had a fantastic time and yearned to visit once again. That trip was our first time ever to the area and everything was new to us and we wanted to expand upon what the area has to offer. As we sat together at the dining room table, laptop open on that cold, snowy, Iowa December day, we dreamed of warm, southern Alabama days. We decided on a great deal on a week's stay in Orange Beach, three miles away from Gulf Shores right on the beach. We decided to have a vacation with no set itinerary and relax as much as possible.

As the trip neared, I started to dream of fishing the area. I didn't, however, want to pay a guide and be told how to do it. Instead, I began researching online shore fishing in the area in public waters. In 2022, we had visited Gulf Shores State Park, which has a fishing jetty we walked out on and, at the time, just watched people fish. This time, I had notions of trying my luck there.


When I started researching it for licensing etc., I discovered it is closed until November 2024 to complete repairs from hurricane damage in 2020. So that was out, and I began to research other areas. I soon came across an Orange Beach walkway near the bridge on the east side of Orange

Beach called Perdido Pass. I learned it's a public fishing area with accommodations of a paved walkway, guardrails, and, for the more adventurous, a rocky fishing jetty that extends a ways out into the ocean. To top it off, it's a mere 4-minute drive from the hotel we were staying at.

I began to get quite excited and started dreaming of saltwater catches and studying the area online and acquiring all the info I could online and even found a Facebook page dedicated to fishing the area! Me being me, I also researched all the laws and regulations of the area.

I learned, in Alabama, I could purchase a seven-day Alabama saltwater fishing license and easily do it all over the counter at the local Walmart. I then researched the local species of fish most commonly caught at Perdido Pass in the month of March. What I found was to expect Pinfish, Spanish Mackerel, Drum, Flounder, and some Redfish. I was familiar with Redfish as I had fished for and caught one on my first trip to Texas a few years ago. The other species I studied and assembled a small tackle assortment and added a couple fishing reels to the gear.

Upon TSA research, I found I was legal to travel with this gear in my carry-on in the plane as we flew to Alabama. Now the plans were set, and I think even Aubrey was excited about me fishing on this trip as she witnessed just how excited I got for it. The time finally came for our trip and we flew out of Cedar Rapids to Charlotte and from Charlotte to Pensacola, Florida. After arriving, we picked up our rental car and were on our way to Orange Beach! The three of us pointed out various things and sights on the short hour drive and, as we came into Orange Beach, I laid eyes on Perdido Pass! I could see folks fishing and the clear blue water glistening in the sun!



We made our way first to the store and stocked up on supplies for the week and I purchased my fishing license and a couple rods for my reels and, of course, some bait for saltwater consisting of shrimp, sand fleas, and smelt. I had never seen sand fleas before and the name suits them — a nasty flea-looking creature the size of a quarter. I was honestly happy they were not live bait.

Once at the hotel, we spent that afternoon enjoying the beach and relaxing although I did rig my fishing rods and tackle in preparation for fishing. The next day, the girls decided to go shopping, so I had them drop me off at the pass. I baited up one rod with shrimp and cast out and let it settle on the bottom, or so I thought. One element we don't deal with locally is tide. On this day, the tide was going out and I quickly realized how much current in the water this created. It took me three ounces of weight to get my bait to stop on the bottom. In my world, three ounces may as well be a pound. Casting out was like tying a shoe to my line and launching it.

After I had the weight figured out, I immediately started getting little bites but could never hook up and, when I'd reel up, all my bait was gone. A local was fishing a short distance away and I watched him reel in some smaller looking fish and asked him what he was catching. He relayed to me they were pinfish and they are similar to a bluegill or crappie to us in Iowa.

After a couple hours of fishing and no fish caught, I left feeling a tad rejected, but determined to learn what I needed to catch fish here. Returning to the hotel, I made my way across the street to a local bait shop. Behind the counter was a very knowledgeable local that set me up with the proper rig for pinfish which consisted of a series of ice fishing sized jigs all tied together. He told me to tie a weight to the bottom, add a small piece of shrimp to each hook and go have a blast! He also told me now was the time to get in on the Spanish Mackerel run each day on an incoming tide. He set me up with a lure called a "Gotcha" — it looked like a piece of 3/8s diameter metal tube, two treble hooks and a bright orange weight at the front. He told me on incoming tide to throw it as far out as possible and reel it in fast while pumping the fishing rod in a downward motion.



The next day I made my way to the pass and wasn't there on an incoming tide but started fishing near the bridge and targeted pinfish. I utilized the bait shop worker's advice and quickly caught my first pinfish!! I was so excited to make it work! I got right back at it and started catching two and sometimes three at a time with the multihook rig from the bait shop.

While having this fun, I met a young couple named John and Kendra fishing next to me. They were local and fished here all the time. They asked where I was from and became very interested in what fishing was like in Iowa and especially the Missis-



sippi River. It was so fun sharing fishing stories with each other and, while talking, Kendra's rod got a huge bite and she set the hook! After a lengthy battle, she reeled up a great looking flounder!! I congratulated them and snapped a picture.

On my way back to the hotel I felt really good as I was learning some saltwater fishing and accomplishing some goals. Up next was catching the elusive Mackerel. The next day was Easter, so I stayed with Aub and Delana all day, hanging out on the beach and enjoying family time. During the day I did, however, check the tide schedule. An incoming tide was due shortly before sunrise and I decided to get up early to be there for it.

I arrived in the dark the next morning and settled into a spot at the pass. A guy next to me said, "Were you here yesterday for the phenomenal Spanish Mackerel run?" I said, "No, I wasn't." He then relayed to me the fishing was phenomenal and nearly everyone down the wall caught multiple fish and he was hoping for another day like it. I started casting the Gotcha plug and, after an hour into daylight and arms getting tired from all the casting and working the bait in, I began to think of the alltoo-famous line in fishing. "Shoulda been here yesterday!" Yep, I missed it, I thought, when suddenly something hammered my plug nearly pulling the rod out of my hand! I carefully fought the fish and swung him ashore!!


ing with Dave and Jeff after the girls were grown. Later, many more memories were made during annual mother-daughter adventures.



The Contest ~ Harvest 2023

On Thursday, February 29, 2024 at Maple Hills Country Club, Tripoli, the awards banquet was held for the 33rd Annual Readlyn Savings Bank & American Savings Bank Bremer County Master Corn & Soybean Growers' Yield Contest: a.k.a. "The Contest." Years ago, there were a number of such county yield contests but today "The Contest" is the only one of its kind in Bremer County – and perhaps the entire state of Iowa.

Sponsored by Readlyn Savings Bank, The Contest is a friendly competition between area farmers. The Contest Banquet provides Bremer County area farmers an evening of camaraderie and celebration of the previous year's harvest: Harvest 2023. The Banquet, held annually before spring, was graciously hosted by Maple Hills bar staff with Frederika Locker providing a superb prime rib buffet dinner and dessert.

Traditionally, to help kick things off, the first award of the night is always the Vernon L. Tonne Spirit of the Contest Award. The Award annually honors the long-time, enthusiastic and good-natured participation of the Master Grower who exemplifies The Spirit of the Contest. "The Vernon" this year went to Wapsie Farms Partnership, which includes Kevin Leistikow, Kurt Leistikow, Marty Marticoff and Aaron Matthias. Wapsie Farms partnership, and its members, have been participating for many years. The Spirit Award recognizes Wapsie Farm's enthusiasm for The Contest as well as their passion for farming and commitment to one another through their partnership.

Following dinner, the bank heard from agronomist Jon Jaschen with Heritage Ag Research, Inc. in Fairbank. Jaschen visited with approximately 50 banquet attendees regarding trends in pest management and crop stress research.

To wrap up the evening, Bank officer Ed Traeger presented the Harvest 2023 awards. The Bank was also represented by Dani Sauerbrei, Mackenzie Joerger, Cassie Munson, Kim Alcantara, and Cody Funk.

Harvest 2023 consisted of a total of 21 different farmers conducting 31 yield checks

in the 4 Contest Divisions: 15 conventional corn, 7 no-till corn, 4 conventional beans and 5 no-till beans. The Contest's official yield checker, Charlie Albrecht, certifies each yield entry while his wife, Wilda, accompanies him to take beautiful harvest-time photos. Charlie collects data on such variables as seed company brand and hybrid number, traits, dates of planting and harvesting, row spacing, population, as well as applications of fertilizers, herbicides, and fungicides. But ultimately, the determining factor to winning The Contest is bushels per acre.

Highlights from the results include S & M Boevers winning top honors in Conventional Beans with a yield of 72.27 bushels per acre. Not to be outdone, Wapsie Farms, the 2023 Vernon winner, was this year's Grand Champ in No-Till Beans posting an incredible yield of 80.38 which narrowly beat the second place yield of 80.14, harvested by Brad Steege. Meanwhile, history was made with corn yields breaking the mark of 300 bushels per acre for the first time. In fact, 4 vield checks broke 300 bushels! (Please see below for Top-3 yields in each of the 4 divisions.) The high yields combined with the fact that it was one of the driest years in recent memory and a beautiful harvest season all make 2023 a Harvest to remember!

In closing remarks, the Bank's representatives congratulated the winners, thanked all the farmers who entered The Contest, and thanked everyone who helped make the evening possible.
