Billboard added to **Freedom Rock**

In May, an attractive billboard, which involved a three-step process, was installed beside the Freedom Rock:

1) Stokes Welding in Janesville built the billboard.

2) As seen in the photos (right and below left), many strong Readlyn volunteers unloaded and anchored this massive sign.

3) Stokes Welding employee Nick West from Readlyn helped weld and complete the installation of this sturdy billboard.

The billboard contains the background information of the three veterans illustrated on the rock as well as a notebook for visitors to sign.

Visitors have come from as far as Italy, California, Texas, and almost every other state to visit the rock. This validates that the Freedom Rock is a great addition to our town and a real tribute to our Bremer County Veterans

It seems we went from nice mild summer to a cold, wet, windy fall. The harvest looks slow going for the farmers. We're hoping for better weather ahead. Maybe an Indian summer, for like 2 months.

The leaves have started to fall, and, remember, you can burn them in your own yard, but please be respectful of your neighbors. You can also always haul them to the compost pile at the sewer plant. This reminds me of several yards that I have noticed in town that have tree branches piled up on them. The City does have a place for that, also at the sewer plant location.

The Malone Street Project is moving along - even though the weather has not been the best conditions. The drainage line is installed and the concrete work has been done. I have had some good feedback from the drain on that 8th Street stub. We have also fixed a couple water service shut offs. Denver Underground has been back to do a few sump pump hookups and will continue as long as the weather permits.

While I'm talking about sump pumps, I still see several discharge hoses into the street. The ordinance states that the lines should not be within ten feet of the curb or property lines. If you have questions, please call City Hall. Thank you!

The City has done some winterizing of City property, but at this time we still have the restrooms open in the City Park and the Ball Diamond Park. As temperatures drop, they will eventually be winterized and unavailable to use during the cold weather months.

The Community Club is planning on Christmas on Main for December 13, from 5 to 8:30 PM. They are planning on a bunch of businesses on Main Street having open houses, a lighted parade and a Christmas tree lighting. Lot of work goes into the event, so please plan on coming out to enjoy the fun!!!!!!

From a book by Dale \overline{L} . Cummings, Manager, Readlyn Telephone Company

In 1906, Carl Bruns organized the Maxfield Telephone Company. He was also Vice President of the Readlyn Savings Bank. On April 29, 1907 the Maxfield Telephone Company was reorganized and renamed the Readlyn Telephone Company.

An application for telephone service shows a \$25 investment. This represents the approximate price of an acre of land

in 1907. Today, in 1987, eighty years later, this company still collects \$25 from each customer for one share. The cost of extending a pole line would require an additional \$40.

William Sanwise was the first President of the company. Carl Bruns, the founder of the company, was the only director with a Readlyn town address.

The first rural line was from Readlyn to Klinger. Each succeeding year about a dozen to twenty shares were sold to applicants requesting rural service. In a few years, lines were extended in all directions and progressively more distant from town. One such line, north of Knittle, was shared with 24 families.

Interference and line noises were common, resulting in an occasional shouting match to be heard. Some of the first lines were isolated country lines. They were connected to a few neighbors, but not to the exchange. Later, they joined the system to access the network. An emergency call to the doctor could require a horseback ride to the nearest telephone. The doctor would respond with a visit by horse and buggy.

The telephone was a new experience. Without radios, they became a vital link to the outside. By picking up the neighbor's ring, the most interesting news could be heard. Sharing a party line took discipline and patience.

On the evening of September 9, 1912 a fire swept through a portion of Readlyn's Main Street. The Readlyn Telephone Exchange was located on the second floor of the drugstore. It is believed that service was lost several weeks until a new switchboard was installed on the second floor of Klemp's Barber Shop. Mrs. William Klemp was the company's first operator and continued from 1906 to at least 1914.

H. William Meyerhoff served as the first secretary-treasurer for eight years. By 1914, the company served 190 rural

subscribers and 31 residents, totaling 221. Operators that I remember were Henry and Annie Schumacher and Arnold and Gertrude Poock. December 1963 ended 57 years of tradition with the installation of an automatic dial system. The new dial system cost \$43,000 and an additional \$15,000 for 550 new dial phones.

Editor's Note: Those listed by Cummings who worked on the lines were Ed Zars, Edgar Albrecht, Jack Matthias, Arnold Poock and Larry Ganske. He also credits Burton Thies for his many years of contributing to the success of The Readlyn Telephone Company.

My Most Embarrassing Experience

It was Good Friday, 1955. I was recently married, working for Philip Morris with my territory Northeast Iowa. I worked in Dubuque Monday through Thursday and got home late Thursday night. Church was in session. The fire whistle blew! Firemen dashed out of church and arrived wearing their Sunday suits. They quickly put out the fire.

I can vividly remember hearing Jim Klodt saying to me in his usual gruff voice, " Aren't you supposed to be in church?"

I was told, when the fire whistle blew, not only the fireman left church, most of the congregation must have thought their houses were on fire and they left, too. Monday morning, Eddie Albrecht and his assistant were cleaning up the Readlyn Telephone storage area along the tracks.

Having to call the fire department when I should have been in church was really an embarrassing experience.

Historical Museum News

Judy Henn and Judy Leistikow were tour guides for Readlyn Area Scout Troop 101, informing them about Readlyn history. The town of Readlyn is 115 years old. The museum used to be an old filling station and in 1927 two men came into the filling station and stole money from the cash register that is on display. We talked about cutting ice in the winter from the Wapsie River and how it was covered with saw dust to keep from melting.

The first Readlyn School House was built in 1906, The museum has Readlyn High School class photos displayed along with the old score board from the gym. Many old typewriters and adding machines have been donated. The Scouts were very interested in Readlyn history. One question that was asked is whether anyone had found gold in town. We did not know the answer but we told them that in the fall of 1938, the Army Calvary traveled through and camped overnight where Malone Ave. is now. We also have the uniform that one of Readlyn's oldest residents, Wilbert Huebner, wore when he was in service on display.

Thank you for coming and come back again as we keep getting more items and have lots of information to share. The parents are also very welcome.

The museum has pictures of all 30 "Grumps" on display for keeping history up-to-date.

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Bassmaster Junior National Championship

To those who have regularly read my article over the past year, you may remember the article from last fall about me being a boat captain and coach for Justin Schmadeke and Hunter Patton from the Independence High School Bass Club at the Iowa Bass National High School State tournament. You may also remember the boys taking home the win and qualifying for the Bassmaster Junior National Championship. This month, I will fill you in on our adventure in early August at that tournament.

A lot of excitement was felt throughout the year as I would speak to Justin or his dad, Paul, about competing in this tournament. Justin and Hunter would often dream of big fish and being on the big stage. The Bassmaster Junior National Championship was to be held in Huntingdon, Tennessee, at nearby Carroll County 1000-Acre Lake. Neither I nor the boys knew anything about this lake, and I would soon find out, through online research, that the lake is relatively new, being built in 2011. A lot of times, I can prepare for a tournament through online research as far as past tournament results, maps, articles, etc. With 1000-Acre Lake being so new, there was not much of anything to be found online. I knew this would be a learn-on-thefly type tournament for the boys. Without much to research on the fishing, I made hotel reservations and mapped out the area as far as places to eat, gas stations, and all the places I needed to have the boys to for meetings before the tournament. Once that prep was all done in early spring, all that was left to do was wait for the first week of August

As the first week of August finally rolled around, I made sure my truck and boat were all prepped for a 10 hour trip. I had a full checklist of everything to go over, as you can't be too prepared when pulling a boat that far. We left on Friday morning from Justin's house in Brandon. We loaded all their gear in my truck and boat, said goodbye to their parents and we were on our way to Tennessee! Excitement was very high as we started our 10 hour drive. There was talk between Justin and Hunter of ten pound bass and the thought of winning the tournament and the \$2000 scholarships each. I was surprised to see that excitement fade quickly as we rolled down the highway about an hour into the drive. Both boys were sound asleep and I was suddenly all alone on our drive. As I crossed into Missouri, I made a quick stop for gas and woke the boys up. Soon after we got back on the road, again sound asleep. "Come on boys," I thought as I got towards St. Louis. I finally woke them up as we got into St. Louis as I needed spotters through traffic.

"Hey Justin, am I clear on the right? Justin?" Looking over to a head bobbing, I finally gave up and realized I was on my own. Upon further questioning, I learned they had both stayed up all night in excitement of the trip. We made a couple more stops and, around 5 PM Friday, we arrived at our hotel. We moved in and the boys and I readied our equipment as I was able to fish with them during practice. The official practice days would be Saturday and Sunday. The lake then went off-limits on Monday and the tournament was held Tuesday and Wednesday.

Saturday morning arrived and we were on our way to 1000-Acre Lake. We quickly launched the boat and started to survey the lake. The lake was very clear and I thought the water temperature gauge was broken on my depth finder. The water temp was 92 degrees at 6 AM, and, as we would soon find out, climbed to 96 degrees each day. The air temp each day neared 100 with heat indices taking it much higher. These type of conditions, especially in a lake with no current, was something I had never really encountered. After a long day of practice, we had found our usual bass fishing techniques were not going to work here. We found out, to catch fish on this lake, we were going to need to fish deep water. As we went into practice Sunday we tried deep diving crankbaits, and dragging big plastic worms across the bottom with Texas and Carolina rigs. About midday, I realized these standard bass deep techniques weren't going to produce much either.

With the very clear water, and the bass feeling sluggish due to the hot conditions, I knew it was going to take finesse tactics to catch these fish. When I say finesse, I'm talking light line, spinning reels, and very small baits. Anyone that knows me will tell you I'm not a strong finesse fisherman. Yet here I was, trying to teach Justin and Hunter how to dropshot and use small ned rigs to get the job done.

Shortly after we picked up the light tackle, we started catching fish. We found the old creek channel down the middle of the lake and quickly realized we could catch fish in 17-20 feet of water everywhere there was a slight hump in the bottom of the lake along the old channel. The boys were quite excited as we left the lake Sunday and happy we had figured something out.

The next day was Monday and this would be a day of meetings. We had official check in at Bethel College at 12 PM and a quick meeting to go over the rules. The boys started to see they were indeed at "The Big Show" as we arrived at the college. Bassmaster laid out the red carpet for these teams. The auditorium was full of sponsors giving the teams gear, hats, stickers, and much more. We got officially checked in and learned there would be 62 teams in the tournament of young men and women from all across the United States and Canada. We spoke with teams from Arizona to New Jersey. The boys were in awe the whole time, and I was quite excited for them to experience such an event. We drew boat number 32 for take off on day one.

The next morning was tournament day, I'm fairly certain Justin and Hunter didn't get much sleep, but were ready to go as we







headed for the lake at 4:30 AM. We arrived at the lake plenty early and waited our turn to launch. Once launched, I parked the boat along the side and we waited for 6:30 takeoff. The national anthem was sung, and I fired up the motor. We made our way to the dock in order, with an emcee calling our names with music in the background!

We headed to our first area and Justin soon hooked up with their first keeper bass. Then, the fishing went into a lull. By 10 AM, Justin and Hunter had one fish in the live-well and were getting a little down. I told them it only takes four more bites and you've got three hours to do it. Soon after, we drifted over a hump and I could see on my Lowrance depth-finder there were fish on it.

Suddenly Justin hooked up with another keeper! He would quickly follow that up with three more bass and they now had their five. Fishing was slow after that flurry of action, and we reached check-in at 1 PM with those five bass. We were excited to have a limit as we knew the fishing was tough. The weigh-in was held in downtown Huntingdon and we waited in the checkout line for officials to make sure our bass were alive in the livewell and added some ice to the water to keep our fish healthy, then a 20-minute drive into town for the weigh-in. Again, Bassmaster made this a huge event as they had the elite series stage set up and interviewed the teams as they weighed in. The weigh-ins were streamed live each day on Bassmaster. com.

Justin and Hunter were very professional as they weighed and interviewed. The boys ended day one with five bass for just over 5 pounds and sitting around 15th place. We were still in striking distance as the weights were very close and feeling excited for day two.

Day two arrived and again we were start-

ing mid-pack as the takeoff numbers were inverted for day two. We arrived to the area where Justin had caught them quick on day one, and most of the field ended up in this area. The other teams had caught onto what the leaders were doing to catch fish. The area looked like a boat yard with boats very close to each other and everyone dropshotting. Hunter quickly hooked up with a nice keeper bass and that settled the boys' nerves. A bit later Justin caught another keeper and they were feeling good with two in the livewell quickly. They continued fishing hard and started noticing other teams around them catching fish and they weren't. I tried to keep them from getting spun out by telling them to keep their heads in it and not worry about what others were doing. The boys fished hard and didn't quit until the end, but could only come up with two keepers on the day.

I was very proud of them as they crossed the stage and both their families were in attendance to see them weigh in. They thanked their parents and sponsors for helping them get there. When we get off the stage, I let them both know how proud of them I was for how they had put a plan together in very tough conditions and fished hard until the very end. They finished 42nd out of the 62 teams. We had a great week and an awesome experience! Truly something the boys and myself won't soon forget!

I want to take this time to thank Paul and Andrea Schmadeke, Wade Patton, and Lisa Johnson for allowing me to coach and have the privilege of going on this adventure with Justin and Hunter. I hope to again qualify to do this again before the boys are through high school. I also would like to thank the Independence High School Bass Club and their coach, Todd Reed, for this opportunity as well. I can't explain how fun this has been. Until next time, GET OUTDOORS!!!
