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## Crane Creek Firefighters win tab collection trophy

The 140th Annual Fire Fighters Association Convention was held at Waverly from September 5-9. One of the competitions that takes place during the convention is collecting of can tabs. This year's champion collector goes to the Crane Creek Firefighters, consisting of the towns of Denver, Readlyn, and Tripoli. These towns will be displaying the traveling trophy they earned.

Crane Creek recorded 864 pounds of tabs. It takes approximately 1300 tabs to make a pound. This equates to approximately 1,123,200 tabs. These tabs can be pulled from beverage cans, soup cans, cat food cans, or any miscellaneous aluminum can tabs.

Jen Happel of Denver has been the leader in getting the communities focused to save tabs. That desire has also been spread on to Nancy Kleitsch, Readlyn, and Ann Harms, Tripoli. These gals report that they have several people from across the state gathering tabs for the annual competition. They even report folks from the state of Wisconsin and Illinois bringing them tabs.

The 2018 results are (in pounds): Crane Creek – 864, Atlantic – 474, Plainfield – 329, Stacyville – 234, Latimer – 147, Griswold – 47, Key West – 34, Elkhorn – 16. This means 2,145 total pounds were collected this year which is approximately 2.9 million tabs. The price for aluminum, when melted down, ranges from \$.85 to \$1.00 per lb. Crane Creek alone donated approximately \$800.00. Everyone involved in saving says, "Just make it a habit! It doesn't cost you any extra time!"

At convention, the tabs are collected by the Can Tabulous crew. They work with Jeff Jefferson, who has been sorting and cleaning these tabs for 49 years. After meticulously doing this, the tabs are turned into a cash donation to the Shriners Hospital for the children's burn unit to help families pay for their medical expenses. In Jefferson's years of doing this, he calculates over \$81,000 has gone to help burn victims.

She has also served on the National Concrete Reinforcing Steel Institute Government Affairs Committee promoting the use of reinforced concrete and was a member of the CRSI Board of Directors.

Corwin now serves as President and CEO of New Chapter, LLC, purchasing and renovating distressed properties and is a tiltup industry consultant.

Lester Diekmann, my uncle, was born to F. L. and Anna Schuette Diekmann. He had two sisters, Velma and Loueen, my mother, and a brother, Harold, longtime Readlyn postmaster. He attended St. Paul Parochial School and graduated from Readlyn High School in 1937. Wilbert Huebner, 96, his classmate, remembers him as a good athlete and a pitcher with a vicious curveball. A direct quote from Lester: "When the baseball team had a tough game somebody would drive out to get Eldo Moeller, a good third baseman, to play." Question of eligibility? Eldo did not even attend RHS! Hilarious!!

Upon graduation he attended Upper Iowa for two years. Lester was employed at John Deere when he was drafted into the U.S. Army on September 17, 1952. He served as an artillery forward observer in France during WWII and was awarded a Bronze Star for valor during the Battle of the Bulge.

He told me that one of the worst things that happened to him in WWII was, as he was coming around a corner, he surprised a German soldier, shot and killed him, and when he looked down at him he felt bad because he killed a boy who he did not think was more than 15 years old. He was discharged, came back to Readlyn and was in partnership with Leo Moeller in Readlyn Auto Sales, buying cars in Chicago or at auctions, detailing, repairing and selling them in Readlyn. I worked for them when I was 16 at \$15 a week plus they gave a Model T to drive. This Model T Coupe was bought from Fred Meyer for \$20. Leo had it painted bright yellow. Vernon Stumme and I went everywhere in that car.

After eight months as a civilian, Army life came calling. He reenlisted twice, intending to make the Army a career. His final and fatal assignment was with the 24th Infantry Division in Japan.

CPL Lester H. Diekmann is being honored by being selected as one of the three veterans on the Freedom Rock. Depicted on the Freedom Rock as symbols relative to Lester's Army career are barbed wire, outline of the two Koreas, and his WWII Bronze Star. The artist painted a very realistic likeness of my uncle. Our family is very grateful that Lester is so remembered. Previously, the flagpole at the Wapsie Valley High School was dedicated by the Wayne Teisinger VFW Post to the memory of Lester Diekmann. His good friend and classmate, Bud Rommel, conducted the ceremony. I do not remember the year, sometime in the sixties, but I recollect that Roger Zars and Dennis Moeller were on the team. Wapsie won!

Arlin Wittenburg and Paul Milius, the two other veterans honored by being placed on the Freedom Rock, will be featured in subsequent issues of the *Readlyn Chronicle*. The Readlyn Community and Bremer County should be proud for establishing the Freedom Rock as a memorial to those of us who served our country. More on the history of the Freedom Rock in later issues.

#### CPL Lester H. Diekmann POW 1920-1950

CPL Diekmann was listed as a POW on July 5, 1950 with the reported date of his death December 31, 1950. His name appears on both the "Johnnie" Johnson list and the "Missing in Action, Captivity" report compiled from returning prisoners of war. — From the U.S. Army:

By the beginning of July 1950, the war in Korea was not a week old and going very badly for South Korea. The North Koreans, battle tested from fighting in the Chinese Civil War, had surprised everyone with their June 25 invasion of South Korea. The North Korean Army, led by Soviet-made T-34 tanks, had quickly routed major portions of the lightly equipped and inexperienced South Korean forces.

The first American combat forces began to arrive in Korea on 1 July 1 and were known as "Task Force Smith." Named after their commanding officer, Colonel Charles B. Smith, the Task Force had been created from American occupation units serving in Japan since WWII. These units were badly under strength and lacked the heavy artillery and anti-tank weaponry to counter the enemy's battle tanks. When the task force took up positions two miles north of Osan, South Korea, on July 5, it had only 540 men. At 8:00 a.m. July 5, the infantrymen could see the leading elements of a North Korean armored column coming down the road towards them and at 8:16 the guns of the artillery opened fire

One historian noted: The U.S. Artillery took the tanks under fire at a range of approximately 4,000 yards, about 2,000 yards in front of the American infantry. The forward observer quickly adjusted the fire and shells began landing among the tanks. But the watching infantrymen saw the tanks keep on coming, undeterred by the exploding artillery shells.

The task force had very few High Explosive Anti-Tank rounds so the North Korean T-34 tanks passed through the Task Force positions. The artillery pieces were reduced to firing at the tanks' tracks, by which method they did succeed in immobilizing three of the 33 tanks in that first column. The tanks had already destroyed the one forward artillery piece. Next came another column of tanks and the artillery was only able to stop one.

An hour later a massive motorized infantry column appeared, escorted by even more T-34 tanks. This motorized column stretched 6 miles long and contained two full regiments (6,000+) of North Korean soldiers. It soon became clear that the task force had no chance of stopping or defeating the enemy forces so, at 2:30 p.m., Colonel Smith decided to have the Task Force fall back. CPL Diekmann was captured during the course of this fighting.

In the days that followed, CPL Diekmann was one of many U.S. POWs marched or taken by train or truck to Seoul, South Korea's capital, newly occupied by the North Korean Army, and was kept there in a former schoolhouse. He arrived at the end of July. After three weeks, this large group was consolidated and sent to Pyongyang, capital of North Korea, by train. CPL Diekmann again stayed in a former schoolhouse. He left Pyongyang for Manpo in a mixed group of 750 military prisoners and civilian internees on September 5, by train, six days enroute.

The period around Manpo was chaotic.

## Earlier Life of Lester Diekmann

CPL Diekmann marched through three or four encampments nearby before beginning the infamous "Tiger March" to the "Apex Camp" on October 31. He definitely was one of the survivors going over the frozen Chasong Pass four days later and arrived at Chunggang-jin, first of three 'Apex Camp' villages on November 9. By then all were in a greatly weakened condition and many had developed pneumonia and other complications. In the weeks that followed, CPL Diekmann continued to Hangjan-ni, the second village. He was mortally ill and died among his companions during December 1950 of malnutrition. The Army, not having an exact date, later set December 31, 1950 for record purposes.

A memorial service was held on the afternoon of April 18, 1954 at St. Paul Lutheran Church in Readlyn with Rev. Theo Frese delivering the memorial sermon.

My sister, Carol, and I were informed that, upon death, the many hundreds of bodies were placed on the ground and later covered with rocks to protect them from scavengers. The ground was frozen making it unable to dig. The U.S. is attempting to negotiate with North Korea the return of the remains of thousands of dead for burial in this country, but have had little success.

#### Readlyn Veterans in Korea

As I remember these area servicemen were in Korea serving during the Korean War: Victor Meier, Herbie Diercks, Lester Diekmann, Orville Huebner, Laverne Schmidt, Fritz Buhrow, Vince Albrecht, Vern Schweer, Vernon Stumme, Arlen Poock, Merlin Matthias, Pete Moeller, Ralph Oltrogge, Ray Rindels, Eddie Steinbronn, Rueben Wittenburg, Henry Lobeck, Jr., Reiny Freitag, Wilbert Thies, Norman Herman, Robert Thran. There were at least twenty of us. I may have missed some.

Lester Diekmann was the lone casualty. Arlen Poock, Reiny Freitag and I are the only ones still alive. We are pushing 90.

#### Veterans Day Speaker

The Student Council invited me to speak at the Veterans Day program at Wapsie Valley High School' on Monday, November 12. I hope to see many of you veterans there. You will hear a vivid account of what we experienced in Korea.

In 1914, the first water tower was erected.

**Iowa Bass Nation Youth State Tournament** As I sit down to write this column, I'm full throttle into Iowa's Archery Deer season and my mind is focused on whitetails 90% of the time. I've been trying to temper my excitement about deer season a little as I've tried really hard to stay out of my best stands and waiting until the time is right for the mature whitetail bucks to start moving in daylight hours. As we round out October and head into November, the time will soon be right. But until then, I would like to talk about a tournament I was privileged to be involved with back in September. This month I'm going to write about my favorite tournament of this past season.

It all started back in mid-June. In my everyday job I'm a CNC Machinist and June 1 I started a new job at Blackhawk Systems Tooling. I soon discovered that my boss, Paul Schmadeke, was an outdoorsman and a tournament fisherman as well. We had an instant connection and talked often about fishing. Paul told me a lot about how great a fisherman his son is and is a member of the Independence High School Bass Fishing Club. I was very interested as Paul told me about their tournaments. These high school clubs are a fairly new concept and I think they are a fantastic way to get kids involved in the sport of tournament bass fishing. I first met Paul's son Justin at one of our Tuesday night tournaments. I could tell immediately by watching him fish from a distance he has great fishing skills. Paul soon asked me if I would be willing to be a boat captain for Justin and his friend, Hunter Patton, in the Iowa Bass Nation Youth State Tournament. Without hesitation, I told him I would and the plans were made.

Fast forward to mid-September. I met up with Justin and his family and Hunter and his Dad, Wade, in Independence on Friday evening. The boys said goodbye to their parents and good luck and well wishes were exchanged and we were on our way. The tournament was held on Sunday, September 23 at Prairie Du Chien, Wisconsin. We planned to head up to my cabin in Prairie on Friday night and get a full day of practice in on Saturday before the tournament. As we drove up to my cabin, the boys were excited and it was fun to be a part of their excitement. Saturday morning dawned cold, my truck read 36 degrees as we made the short ride to the boat ramp. My plan for the boys was to target smallmouth bass in the morning and then try for a few largemouth in



the afternoon. As we stopped on our first spot, we found out quickly what we needed to do to do well in the tournament. Our first area was a main channel point consisting of a mix of rock and sand and a current break, a classic fall smallmouth area. Justin quickly hooked up with a three-pound smallmouth and Justin and Hunter became very excited. We spent the rest of the morning stopping on points much like the first and Hunter and Justin hooked up with fish on most every point we stopped on. As the day progressed we decided to try a few backwater areas for largemouth. It didn't take us long to figure out that the largemouth bite just wasn't there. As we finished up practice the boys and I talked about the plan for tournament day and they decided to run smallmouth areas the entire tournament day. That evening Hunter and Justin decided on Culver's for supper and I had so much fun listening to their excitement and talking about how the tournament would go. We got to bed early, although I'm sure the boys didn't sleep much.

The very next cast Hunter caught another keeper smallmouth. Having two in the box so soon had Hunter and Justin very excited. They fish together as a team for this tournament and get to keep five bass. The next spot we stopped on Justin caught his first keeper bass of the day, and quickly after the boys rounded out their limit. We spent the rest of the day running main channel points and the boys picked up fish everywhere we stopped. As time started to wind down, I told the boys I had a big fish area near check-in where we would try to add a "kicker" bass to their limit. A couple casts and Justin set the hook on a very big fish, a couple head shakes and the fish popped off. Justin looked at me and said "Dang! Missed opportunity." A little further up the bank and Hunter set into a bass that we all could see, a bonified fourpound largemouth. The boat went crazy for a moment as Justin yelled, "Get the net, Eric!" Hunter fought the beast for a brief moment and it popped off as well. I let the boys fish to the last second before we headed in to check in. As we idled into weigh in, the boys were a little dejected missing the two big bass. I told them I thought they still had a shot - with the tough conditions others could have struggled. As we pulled up to the bank, Justin's and Hunter's families were there to see them weigh in. The boys proudly bagged up their five bass and headed to the scale. "9.17 lbs. - new tournament leaders!" The tournament director shouted as Justin and Hunter weighed in. I quickly ran up there and fist bumped them as they took their places on the "Hot Seat." They anxiously sat on the hot seat as team after team weighed in. No one would unseat them as Justin and Hunter were named 2018 Iowa Bass Nation Junior Division Champions and punched their

tickets to the Bassmasters High School Nation National Championship at Kentucky Lake to compete against the best high school teams in the country.

I had so much fun taking these two young men on this tournament and I can say hands down that this was my favorite tournament of the season and I look forward to accompanying Justin and Hunter to Kentucky Lake next July as I will boat captain for them in the national championship. I would like to thank Paul and Andrea Schmadeke and Wade Patton for giving me the honor to captain for their boys! This was a tournament I won't soon forget! Until next time GET OUTDOORS!
