

July Grump Article

I recently was recognized as the Readlyn Grump when I gave a talk at the Oelwein Public Library summer reading program. This was fun to share the knowledge I have of finding gold and other natural treasures in the area around Readlyn. So far this year, the river has not been low enough to flare up my gold fever. However, I do think I got some people at the presentation thinking about looking for some Iowa vellow gold.

Gold is not native to Iowa. Iowa has no gold-bearing mountains. This land once was an ocean. Our gold was brought by glaciers during the ice ages. Many geological treasures that we have traveled to Iowa in the glacier drift, including all the rocks I picked up in my grandparents' fields as a young boy. The gold I find in the area is placer gold. The key to finding the gold is water, such as in a stream bed, where it will concentrate gold on the upstream side of certain sandbars. Gravel bars are better and still better is a river bottom with large cobbles.

Panning is the basic way prospectors find all gold. So, I sample to find the pay streak that runs from inside bend to inside bend. Gold is twice as heavy as lead. There is nothing like swirling the black sand away until you see specs of gold sticking to the bottom of the pan.

So far, it has been very good being a grump. As I travel around eastern Iowa, people recognize me as the Readlyn Grump and start a conversation with me. It aways amazes me how many things we have in common and can talk up a storm like we are old friends.



Old friends, fond memories

This article is about the children and grandchildren of Louis and Clara Everding Schweer.

Louis was born July, 1, 1899 and died October 12, 1966. Clara was born August 15, 1899 and died April 20, 1969. Louie and Clara had two children, Vern and Elda. Louis and Clara are buried in Zion Lutheran Cemetery.

I received a call from Ann Bachman McIntosh several weeks ago. She inquired as to my knowledge of her father, Vern Schweer. I assured her that I knew Vern well, having been in Vern and Orlie's wedding, being one year behind him in school, on the same sports teams, and that I had worked with Vern on his dad's carpentry crew, etc.

Ann was concerned about the possibility of her father having suffered from PTSD (Post Traumatic Stress Disorder), a condition often affecting those who served under much stress in the military. Throughout his life, Vern exhibited periods of anxiety and depression, at times withdrawing from crowds, wanting to be alone and having trouble sleeping, etc. Ann arranged a three-way call which included her sister,

Vern shared little with his family about his experiences in the Korean War. A few days after I came home from Korea, Vern asked me to work on his Dad's carpenter crew. We worked sideby-side weeks, talked

about many subjects, but not once did we discuss our experiences in Korea. I knew Vern served with the 1st Cavalry Division. The 1st Cay was involved in vicious fighting and suffered heavy casualties.

The only experience Vern told me was that his unit was dug in in foxholes on the front line. A listening post was established in a foxhole forward of the MLR (main line of resistance); its purpose was to give a warning in the event of an attack. Vern and another soldier were assigned to this foxhole, each man having two hours of sleep and two hours on alert. Vern woke up and found the other soldier sleeping when he was to be on alert. Vern told me he reacted, threatening the other soldier, "If this happens again, I will

Vern never exposed his daughters to his struggles during the Korean War. He opened up on only two instances to members of his family. His nephew, Jerry Wittenburg, remembers Vern saying that two of his buddies were killed

To Ann's husband, Vern said that his unit was being overrun by the Chinese. He was wounded but able to walk. He carried two men back to an aid station where wounded were treated before being sent on to a M.A.S.H. At the end of the attack, Vern said he was one of only three men left in his squad. The men lost were casualties, either killed or wounded. An infantry squad usually consists of 9 soldiers.

Cathey said Vern did not like cold weather. It reminded him of being in a foxhole during that cold Korean winter.

Ann recalled that Vern often said, "War is hell!" Seeing the war in Vietnam on television affected Vern. Vern hated guns. He never owned one.

Vern and Orlie Schweer

Vern was born September 19, 1928 to Louis and Clara Everding Schweer. He graduated from Readlyn High School in 1946. Orlie was born in Hawkeye. Iowa May 27 1934, the daughter of Fred Henry and Olive Louise Cummings Fedeler. She graduated from Hawkeye High School in 1952, where she earned honors as an all-state basketball player.

Vern and Orlie were married May 9, 1954 at the United Methodist Church in Hawkeye. They made their home in Readlyn where they built three homes together working side-by-side. Their two daughters, Cathey and Ann, attended Wapsie Valley schools.

When Vern was sixty, he and Orlie moved to Waterloo to be closer to their work. Vern had worked many years for John G. Miller Construction as an estimator. When Orlie began working for Baird Industries in Cedar Falls, her entry position was as a secretary. She retired 36 years later as president of the company. Ann reported that her mother worked long hours and never took a vacation, even working while ill. Orlie was successful in management years before women were readily accepted as executives. Cathey retired at 55, Ann will retire at 60.

Vern and Orly had two daughters, Cathey and Ann, born 8 years apart. Both graduated from Wapsie Valley, Cathey in 1973 and Ann in 1982. Cathey, the older daughter, resides in Robins, Iowa. Cathey graduated from Kirkwood with a fashion merchandising degree and had a successful career in sales at Grainger Industrial Supplies in Cedar Rapids. Among her many customers was Arlin Poock, who bought overalls for the Klinger Store. Cathey retired at age 55. She and David have a son, Adam, 33, who will marry in No-

Ann Bachman McIntosh lives in Naperville, Illinois. Ann graduated from Iowa State in 1986 and taught in Lisle, Illinois, a suburb of Chicago. She earned a master's degree from the University of Illinois in 1989. After 20 years, she left teaching and now is employed by the Illinois Education Association NEA, as unisery director, advocating for teachers in disputes with administration. She has a son, Tyler Bachmann, 31, who will soon be married. Her husband, Scott, brought twins, Jason and Kayla McIntosh, into their

Vern died in 2001. Orlie outlived Vern by 8 years and died in 2009 from complications of a stroke. Orlie was an active member of the Readlyn VFW Auxiliary, a 49-year member of the Fairbank United Methodist Church where she served

on the church board, UMW and pastor parish relations. Vern and Orlie are buried in the Fairbank Cemetery.

Elda and **Delbert** Wittenburg

Elda Schweer born August 29, 1921. She married Del-Wittenburg, September 8, 1938 in

Zion Lutheran Church in Readlyn. Delbert and Elda farmed in the Klinger area. They had two children, Jerry and Bonnie. Delbert Wittenburg died October 1, 2001. Elda died Au-

gust 22, 2009. They are buried in St Paul Lutheran Cemetery. Jerry Wittenburg graduated in 1960, the first graduating class at Wapsie Valley. He married Bonnie Poock in Maxfield Lutheran Church, Denver. Jerry retired from John Deere in 2003 after 30 years. Bonnie was employed by Lutheran Mutual and Terex as a secretary. Jerry and Bonnie have two children, Randy and Rhonda. They have a home in Readlyn, a cabin in Harpers Ferry and spend winters in Texas.

Bonnie Wittenburg graduated from Wapsie Valley in 1964. She married Roger Zars in Zion Lutheran Church in Readlyn. Bonnie worked at farming with Roger and for Denver Mutual Insurance Agency. They had three children, Pam, Angie and Todd. Bonnie died August 22, 2019 and is buried in the Immanuel Lutheran Church Cemetery near Klinger. Roger remains on the farm. Roger and Bonnie enjoyed playing Schafskopf.

The Last Dance

After I left Readlyn in 1959, I saw Vern and Orlie only one time. It was on the dance floor of the Electric Park in Waterloo. We were dancing. The music stopped playing for a few seconds between numbers. Vern and Orlie happened to be near. We exchanged pleasantries. The band resumed playing and we resumed dancing. Those few seconds were the last time I had any contact with Vern and Orlie. That memory brings tears to my eyes. Vern and Orlie were the best dressed, the best looking and the best dancers on the floor.

This article has been a tribute to an old friend, Vern Schweer. It hurt to lose another old friend recently, Reiny Frietag. My old, close friends are almost all gone. Why am I still here? I thank God that, at 92, I can still see, walk, talk, hear (somewhat), drive, and have a sound mind. As a tribute to yourself, ponder for a moment after you ask, "What are the treasures in my life for which I should be thankful?"

Louie's Band

Vern was an outstanding musician, his specialty, the trumpet. He was a member of the Readlyn High School Band. You can see a youthful Vern in the foreground with the members of his father's band, below. The picture was taken circa 1940. Louis is on the right with a concertina. I cannot identify others. I doubt that I could find anybody who can

When I asked a good friend of Vern's, Al Judas, the name of the band he replied, "Louie Schweer and his Wapsie Nightingales." Louie's band, along with Elmer Otto's band, The Music Makers, played at barn dances, wedding dances and other activities in the area.

Louie played the bass fiddle in addition to the concertina. He was proud of his band and especially his fiddle, which was displayed on a stand in the living room.



Business Spotlight Grumpy's Spirits, Suds and Grub & Event Center

They may not be grumpy, but they've got it down. If not the role, at least the spirit. This couple have taken on the challenge of reviving a once popular bar and grill in Readlyn, and they are determined not just to make a go at it, but rather, to make it a destination for area communities.

Mike and Samantha Keeran are the brainpower, the investment power and the handson power behind Grumpy's Spirits, Suds and Grub, Readlyn's new old place for fun and food on Main Street.

They have put together a dynamic team of employees, friends and old classmates and have invested their hard-earned money to transform the building at 209 Main Street in Readlyn into a hub for great food and entertainment.

Just like building any business or team, you can't do it yourself. We continue to add key players to our team, having part ownership added with Mike and Karrie Nicholus, Kelly Bockholt as our General Manager, Noah Freebury as our Bar Manager, and Heather Collins as our Kitchen Manager to our management team. This team has been amazing and already are working on other business adventures in the coming months

The name they came up with reflects the town's tradition, which is spelled out on a sign on the highway, which says "857 friendly peo-

ple and one old Grump."

The Old Grump folklore goes back to 1990 when the first Grump, Sam Sickles, was crowned during the town's annual summer celebration, held the third week of June.

Beyond the sign on Highway 3, the lineage of the town's quirky Grumps, who are 65 or older, lives in the symbolic gifts that the Grumps, the town's ceremonial ambassadors, receive, such as a hat and a license plate.

But that history is also honored at a special oval table at Grumpy's, where news clippings of each Grump are bonded into a tabletop, which provides a unique display.

The new owners also created a wall of fame, right next to that table, which will list each Grump, honoring the town's tradition.

Like any old building, this one needed upgrades and re-envisioning to make it an accessible and desirable destination.

An access ramp for wheelchair accessibility is in the works and the city is pitching in with sidewalk improvements for 2023 and the Betterment Group of Readlyn is helping with updating the exterior of the building and many other inside projects to make this Event Center a beautiful place to holding weddings and celebrations.

Meanwhile, a beer garden is currently being installed in the back which will add to the atmosphere and opportunities for a unique experience.

On the events side, they have a lineup of exciting live performances planned.

We planned to have country and rock bands, comedy performers, even a dueling pianos act already scheduled with many more being added weekly.

Mike Keeran (owner) oversees the entertainment, and he plans to make a mark in the area so that fans from near and far have a reason to hop in the car and drive to Grumpy's for an evening of memorable food and fun.

They have learned to listen to the feedback of the staff and the community and have lunches starting July 26 with some amazing pies being added to the lunch hour, along with coffee and muffins in the morning for those early birds that need that cup of joe to get that day going to avoid those Grumpy ways... along with a favorite Tuesday night menu with tacos and margaritas starting July 26 at 4pm.

"It's about family, friends and business and coming together," Keeran said. "And one Old Grump."





The year was maybe 2004 or 2005, somewhere in that time frame. I was an eager, early 20s, very inexperienced, yet very driven, bass tournament angler. I had finally put together a small 14 foot flatbottom jon boat with a 25 horsepower Johnson outboard and a small 36 pound thrust trolling motor with a small livewell and now had a rig capable of competing in the local Tuesday night tournament series.

I had fished it since 2001, but always hitching a ride in someone else's boat. I was now on my own with my decisions and could compete how I wanted to! The scene was set on a stretch of the Cedar River in downtown Waterloo near the ballpark. I readied and launched my boat and paid my entry. As I waited on the water for takeoff at 5:30 pm, I devised a plan to jump out ahead of everyone at the start in this little boat.

Cue the word "inexperience" again....

At this time, all these tournaments were a "shotgun" start which meant, at the sound of the horn, the entire field of 30 or so boats could take off all at once. The danger factor of this is high and no longer happens these days in tournaments. You can imagine the chaos as boats with 25 to 250 horsepower all mixed together hammering the gas at the same time take off.

Well, my eagerness of getting to "my spot" first, overshadowed the danger factor. As the horn blew, I was a good forty yards up river from everyone else and already in the gas. I ended up with about a 100-yard lead on the field and was feeling pretty good about myself for about 15 seconds until the field of boats caught me and were passing on each side and my little boat was being slammed with waves.

I found myself towards the bank as we all ended up where the river necked down to one narrow path that had deep water. I quickly took a hard right without even looking behind me, and shot through the narrow channel. Little did I know at the time that I had totally cut off Jim Mastain

and Paul Herron and they had to nearly run into the bank and kill the motor to avoid running into the back of me. I hadn't a clue of this mishap as I fished all evening.

As I made my way back to the ramp for check-in at 8:30, I was walking to my truck to pull my boat out and heard, "You in the red shirt! I need to talk to you!" I did not know this guy at all and he told me what I did and gave me quite a talking to. I gained a little experience that evening for sure and felt sick over it. It was Paul that was talking to me and, later, Jim came up and talked to me as well and relayed the danger and what I'd done. As I said, I was sick, the last thing I wanted to do was have a reputation of recklessness.

A couple days later, my phone rang with a number I didn't recognize, but I answered. It was Jim Mastain. After cutting him off like I did he called to talk fishing and asked if I would like to go with him the next weekend. I said yes and a friendship was born. Somehow, out of an on-

the-water confrontation, we became friends and anybody that knows me well knows Jim is one of my best friends and we've done lots of tournaments and have been fishing together over the last 17-18 years.

I have met so many great friends over the years through fishing. For many years, I ran that same Tuesday night series along-side Jim and the Cedar Valley Bassmasters Club and made so many friends in those times that still continue today.

Today, running our No Nonsense



Prairie Bass Series, we continue to make more friends and get to know so many people, whether it's the business relationships, or the comradery of getting to know the anglers, those friendships are made. In my mind, these days this is the best part of tournament fishing and owning a series.

Just recently, Aubrey, Adam, Monica, and myself that own No Nonsense have become great friends with our Angler of the Year in 2021, Joey Renner, and his wife, Leah. They live in Prairie du Chien and invited us to grill out with them. Their daughter and son are around the same age as my daughter, Delana, and they've become friends as well and, after that cookout, we even share a crazy story or two!

Another great story that's come from owning No Nonsense happened at our last tournament June 23. Young anglers Drew Campbell and Noah Wiegel won our tournament of 69 teams - no easy feat for a couple high school aged young men for sure! As the awards were handed out and checks written, my wife called Drew up to the table as he had some tax info to fill out and his mom came up with him. Many of you know I've worked sports shows through each winter in various capacities for over a decade now. When his mom came up to the table she got my attention and relayed to me that Drew had talked with me at a sports show as a very young boy and that had sort of planted a seed in him on tournament fishing. Fast forward to him winning the series I co-own!

At first, I was just like that's awesome and congratulated him and thanked his mom for the story. It wasn't until later, while packing up, Aubrey relayed the story to me again and it hit me, the impact of a conversation from years ago that inspired a youth to take on a sport I'm so passionate about. A little overwhelming to say the least.

The friendship mantra also holds true in the hunting side of the outdoors as I've made many friends through hunting as well. Some great friends are the farmers and landowners where I hunt, to the friends I've made on trips like last winter in Texas. Being now friends with Jeff Schutte after that trip has led to friendship with Gary Matthias and helping him with his land.

I guess where I'm headed with in this month's column is, share your outdoor passion with others and a lot of times it leads to friendships and relationships that last many years. I'm so thankful for all the great people in this world that I've met through the outdoors and it continues to grow all the time. So, next time you strike up a conversation with someone about the outdoors, share a fishing trip or a duck blind together. It just may lead to a lifelong friendship!
