



1888 - 1934

Readlyn – The community was shocked Sunday morning to hear of the death of E. C. Stumme, 46, which occurred at Colonial Hospital in Rochester, Minnesota at 1 o'clock. He had gone to Rochester for treatment several weeks ago but few realized how seriously ill he was. The cause of his death was hardening of the arteries and complications.

Funeral services were held at 1:30 at St Paul's Lutheran Church, with Rev. Theo. Frese conducting the service. Burial was made in St Paul's Cemetery.

A native of Maxfield Township, Mr. Stumme was born Oct. 27, 1888. He received his education at the public and parochial schools in Readlyn, and at Wartburg College in Waverly.

He spent all of his life in th munity, and for the last 26 years he has been cashier of the Readlyn Savings

He was united in marriage with Miss Anna Paul June 6, 1911. Surviving are his widow, six sons, Harold of Waterloo, Burton, Milton, Paul, Vernon, and Emil, Jr.: five brothers, Henry and Arthur, Readlyn, John of Denver, Herman of Waverly, and Arnold at Clermont, Iowa; three sisters, Mrs. Fred Kelling of Malmon, Minn., Mrs. Henry Lobeck of Readlyn and Mrs. Ernest Platte of Denver. Also surviving are his mother, Mrs. Chris Stumme, and his grandmother, Mrs E. Matthias, age 96 years.

At an early age Mr. Stumme was baptized and confirmed in the Lutheran faith. He was a faithful member of St. Paul's since coming to Readlyn, attending services regularly with his family.

As a leader in making Readlyn a better community, Mr. Stumme will be missed by a great number of friends. As a devoted husband and father he will be greatly missed in the family circle.

In his work as director of the junior and senior bands of this city he demonstrated his interest in the affairs of the community and will be missed in this endeavor. - Waverly Democrat, December 1934

Election at Readlyn

There was an election of town officials at Readlyn on Monday, when only a light vote was polled on account of there being no contests for the several offices.

George Vanderwalker was re-elected mayor; he is a good man for the place, and no one was named against him.

William Meyerhoff was elected treasurer, and Emil Stumme assessor.

The council is composed of Chris Warneke, Carl Hagenow, Chris Miller, Dem Mersch and H.A. Griese, and all are good men for the places. Fred Diekman and Fred Booth retired from the council, much to the regret of the citizens of Readlyn, as they had proven themselves valuable members of that body.

Circa 1910

Vernon & Emil Stumme Jr.

Many of you will remember Vernon and Emil Stumme Jr., the two youngest sons of Emil and Anna Stumme Sr. Their mother, Anna Paul Stumme, died October 30, 1944. Vernon was 7 at the death of his father's death and 15 at his mother's death. Emil Jr. was 4 when his father died and 12 at his mother's death.

Burton Stumme, who worked most of his life in the Readlyn Savings Bank, married Gertrude Moeller, and they provided for Vernon and Emil, living in the Stumme

Vernon Stumme and I were best friends from third grade through high school. I spent many hours in the Stumme home and in their two-story barn. Tears came to my eyes as I read the following poem, an addenda to E. C. Stumme Sr.'s obituary.

It is so dark within our dwelling, lonely are our hearts today, For the one we loved so dearly has forever passed away. We have lost our darling Daddy. He has bid us all adieu. He has gone to live in Heaven, and his form is lost from view. Oh, Dear Husband, how we loved him, and how hard to give him up! But an angel came down on him, and took him from our midst.





Leon Heineman,



Immanual Lutheran Church Sanctuary - Christmas 2022

Immanuel Lutheran (Klinger) Christmas Traditions

Immanuel Lutheran's congregation has always enjoyed the season of Advent and celebrating the birth of Jesus. From young to old, all have roles in celebrating this joyous season.

In preparation for Christmas, the sanctuary is decorated with Christmas trees, evergreen roping on the walls and balcony with poinsettias adorning the altar, window sills and on tables near the organ and around the pulpit. The sanctuary had four live Christmas trees in 1948 (see photo.) Often, special music is shared through the adult choir and bell choir performances during church service throughout December.

Until the last fifteen or so years, the teachers and staff at Community Lutheran School (CLS) also created and produced the Christmas Eve service with all CLS students invited to participate in the program. Since then, Immanuel's Sunday School teachers have led the children's program. It is a wonderful service with Immanuel's children, ages preschool through 8th grade, sharing their musical talents and their faith in a themed program appropriate for the season. For many years, Audrey Schmidt, a retired teacher, wrote the programs, selected songs and designed the recitation pieces to fit each child's talent and ability. The entire program is memorized and rehearsed to bring an enthusiastic message of Jesus' birth. Another tradition during this service is singing the hymn "Silent Night" with all lights extinguished except for the ones on the Christmas tree and with each individual holding a lighted candle.

The Christmas Eve service is now in addition to the CLS Christmas program typically held on the last Wednesday before break. The CLS children also memorize their pieces and songs. They share the message of our Messiah's birth to congregation members from both Immanuel and St. Paul's as well as all community members in attendance. Children participating in both the CLS and Immanuel programs have a lot to memorize!

Today's traditions are similar to ones in the past. Eugene Matthias, a lifetime member of Immanuel remembers that music was emphasized at the Christian Day School, now CLS. "Mr. Will, a teacher in the 5-8 grade room between 1944-1947, emphasized choral music. So the Christmas Eve service had excellent singing by the students, along with recitations. Chairs were added up and down the aisles in the sanctuary to accommodate those in attendance." Immanuel still enjoys hosting visitors during its Christmas Eve service. And, of course, offering each child in attendance the traditional Christmas sacks containing peanuts in the shell, peanut clusters, orange and apple compiled by the CLS School Board with the contents purchased at the Klinger Store from Arlin & Pat Poock. Arlin & Pat maintain the 'recipe' for the Christmas sacks.

Our Christmas Eve service was scheduled for Saturday, December 24 at 7 p.m. to celebrate the real reason for the season, Jesus our Savior!





"Bring on the ice!"

The wind whisked light snow across the ice as I carefully bounced my jig just above the bright red mark on my sonar flasher. With one more light flick of the wrist, the red mark raced to the mark of my jig on the screen and my line went slack. A hookset and the battle was on!

The light 2lb. test line stretched and strained against the small iced up rod and words of my grandfather went through my head, "Don't horse him, take your time!" The drag started screaming and doing its job and, after a long battle, I was rewarded with a beautiful crappie.

As fall turns into winter, a lot of folks dread the winter season. I, on the other hand, get excited — with all the cold and snow the lakes freeze and ice fishing season begins!!!! Yes, some think we are crazy to sit on a bucket on a frozen lake. But ice fishing can be very productive and a lot of fun!!!

Over the years, my ice fishing addiction has grown as I've added nicer equipment with flashers, tents and Skandia Tungsten jigs. But it really doesn't take a lot to get started ice fishing and we have some great opportunities for fishing right here in our area. This month, I'll take you through getting started in a sport I've become so addicted to.

As with any sport, it's best to get started by talking with sportsmen that are already skilled in the sport. Friends, co-workers or family that can get you started in the right direction. Also, the Internet becomes a useful tool in getting started. There are literally thousands of YouTube videos on ice fishing.

Another great place to start is our local outdoor stores such as Hank's Live Bait and Tackle, located on 15th Street in Waterloo. Paying them a visit can get you an endless supply of knowledge on the sport and up-to-the-minute fishing reports. You also may meet other fishermen at these stores that would love to show you the ropes.

Once you decide you want to try ice fishing, you will need the basics to get

started. A rod is a great first purchase -the choices are endless on rods. You can
spend as little as \$10 to a couple hundred
dollars. Just starting out, I would suggest
a nice modestly priced spinning rod such
as a K&E Tackle Whippr rod or even a
Schooley brand rod with the plastic reel.

Next on the list would be a decent ice auger. Again, there are a lot of choices out there. Starting out, I would go with a hand auger that can be purchased for \$30-\$50 brand new.

Also, you will need a five gallon bucket. Not only can you carry your gear with you, but it makes a nice seat too!

Watch marketplace or other classifieds for deals on used equipment -- a lot of times you can get a bundled deal on everything you need.

Next come the jigs. A lot of this will depend on what type of fish you will target. I'm mostly a panfisherman in the winter, targeting bluegills and crappies. I prefer Skandia Tungsten jigs, moon jigs, and Arnold jigs. These are all great jigs that won't break the bank. I've really started using the Tungsten over the last five years or so. The Tungsten is heavier than lead and shows up on sonar better. The denser material gives you more weight in a small jig to get back in the strike zone quicker and is more sensitive to feel those sluggish bites.

You may also want to add an ice tent to your arsenal depending on your cold tolerance. Again, there are lots of options when it comes to them and I suggest talking to your local outdoor store and seeing a lot of tents and choosing what best suits your needs and budget.

The biggest thing with ice fishing, and I can't stress this enough, is SAFETY!! Ice can be a tricky animal that is always changing with temperature fluctuations. Some of your most important gear to own is your safety gear.

I suggest, especially early and late in the season, carrying a Spud bar with you. You can use the Spud bar to check the ice ahead of you. I usually do not venture onto the ice each year until there's a good four inches of solid clear ice on the ponds.



It's important to have a fifty foot throw rope and some ice spikes you can wear around your neck, should the unthinkable happen. I suggest never fishing alone and it doesn't hurt to wear a life jacket or purchase a striker ice suit that floats should the ice break.

There are a lot of ice fishing opportunities right here in our area. Lakes like Big Woods, Volga, and Beeds, have healthy fish populations and are great places to start. Look for areas that the water falls off of flats into deeper water. Those drop offs are great fish holders, and, in lakes like Big Woods and Volga, they've added lots of structure for the fish, such as brush piles and pallet structures. The structure was placed to attract fish. Find some of

these areas and you will be on the fish. Lake maps with GPS coordinates of these structures can be found at the Iowa DNR website.

Also always be on the lookout for small out of the way ponds and backwaters along the Cedar and Wapsi River. Sometimes, those small waters can yield big results! And, if you're lucky enough to access a farm pond, you can get into some phenomenal fishing!

As the weatherman starts to show those freezing temps heading our way, it's time to get that ice gear ready and enjoy a sport that gets you through those long winter months! Be SAFE and, until next time, Get Outdoors!


