

Remembering Immanuel's Loved Ones

It was with fortitude that settlers came to this area from other countries, in the case of Immanuel, primarily Germany, to begin new lives, twenty-five years after Iowa became a state and twenty-one

years before Readlyn was incorporated as a town. Typically, they journeyed to the United States in ships, then made their way to Iowa to begin a new life. They had to build homes and businesses, mostly farms, and establish churches and schools for worship and education. Materials used were from the surrounding wilderness and buildings shaped with settler's hands, hard work and a few tools. All of this was done with hard work and strong faith in

Church cemeteries are typically well-maintained and places of solitude to remember friends and family members who have passed on. Given the time period, little medicine was available for what are common maladies today. As a result, a cemetery had to be started in 1873, the same year Immanuel began as a church, to lay loved ones to rest. The first funeral at Immanuel was for a four-year-old child named Friedrich Widdel. As with many cemeteries, there is a 'baby row' with the remains of babies who died at birth or shortly after. Many are not even named as infant mortality was high.

Today, family and friends come to the cemetery to remember loved ones especially on Memorial Day. The cemetery is especially beautiful with American flags from the local VFW to commemorate individuals serving in wars along with flowers on a majority of the tombstones. It is not unusual to meet seekers of genealogy information stopping by Immanuel's cemetery throughout the year. While information is available at genealogy online sites, Immanuel's congregation ensures records are maintained to respond to questions. A full list, 1873 to present of funerals as well as other ministerial acts, will be available in Immanuel's 150th Anniversary booklet which is available to purchase at the August 6 celebration and after.

Immanuel's 150th Anniversary theme, "O God, Our help in ages past, our hope for years to come," is also appropriate for the settlers' courage who came to this area in 1873.



On One Fayette County Farm—A Murder and Three Fatalities

Ashley Downing's unsolved murder occurred on January 4, 1933 on his 240 acre farm southwest of Westgate. Three separate accidents took place in the years Bernard Reinking owned that same farm. Since 2006, the farm has been one of the many properties of Top Deck Farms. Jason and Sharon Decker occupy the home on that farm.

Brenda Reinking dies in car crash

Brenda, six-month-old daughter of Bernard and Irene Steinbronn Reinking, RR Westgate, was announced dead upon arrival at the Sumner hospital Thursday evening (October 13, 1960).

She was killed in a two car crash Thursday at 9:10 AM two miles southwest of Westgate on a gravel road.

According to the highway patrol, an auto driven by Mrs. Bernard (Irene) Reinking, 22, of RR Westgate, was traveling south when it struck a car head-on driven by Roger Decker, 18, of RR Westgate.

Two other Reinking children, Jeffrey, 3, and Joan Marie, 2, received cuts, bruises and possible internal injuries in the crash.

Mrs. Reinking received cuts, bruises, possible internal injuries and suffered from shock. Decker had possible internal injuries, cuts, bump on the head and a possible leg injury.

Mrs. Reinking was traveling south on the county road toward the Burle Downing farm where she was reportedly going to turn in. Decker, coming from the south, apparently swerved to miss the Reinking car and the autos hit head-on.

Highway patrolmen at the scene reported that the Reinking auto apparently anticipated a turn to the right into the Downing farm and was edged close to the middle of the road at the time of the crash.

The Decker car ended up facing south on the road on the west side, with the Reinking vehicle on the east side, hanging in the ditch facing west.

No charges were filed, but investigation is pending. The autos were total losses.

Renae Reinking passes away after farm accident

Renae Robyn Reinking, 13-month-old daughter of Bernard and Mandy (Anfinson) Reinking of rural Oelwein, died Saturday afternoon, Oct 24, 1987 at Mercy Hospital after an accident on her family's farm.

Services will be at 1:30 PM Tuesday at Zion American Lutheran Church. Rev. LaVerne Streich will officiate. Burial will be at Woodlawn Cemetery.

Friends may call any time today (Monday) at the Brant-Kerns-Jamison Funeral Home in Oelwein. A memorial fund has been established in her name.

[Author's Note: I spoke with Mandy, Bernard Reinking's wife and the mother of Ranae. Mandy said Bernard was playing outside with Ranae. He left Ranae near the house without telling Mandy that Ranae was outside alone. Ranae toddled after Bernard. Bernard was not aware of Ranae following him. In backing the truck, the accident occurred.]

Bernard Reinking dies after fall at home



OELWEIN — Bernard W. Reinking, 71, of rural Oelwein, died Tuesday evening, July 25, 2006, at University of Iowa Hospital and Clinics in Iowa City, of injuries he sustained due to a fall at his home on Monday.

Funeral services will be at 10:30 AM Saturday, July 29, at Zion Lutheran Church, Oelwein, with the Rev. Charis Combs-Lay officiating. Burial will be in Woodlawn Cemetery, Oelwein, with military graveside rites by the Oelwein American Legion Ross Reid Post 9.

Friends may call from 3 until 9 PM Friday at the Jamison-Schmitz Funeral Home, Oelwein, and after 9:30 AM Saturday at the church.

Bernard William Reinking was born June 27, 1935, at Westgate, the son of Henry Frederick and Gertrude Ann (Gumm) Reinking. He was baptized July 7, 1935 and

confirmed April 25, 1948, at St. Peter Lutheran Church in Westgate. Bernard graduated from Oran High School. He served in the Army during the Korean Conflict. Bernard married Irene Steinbronn in 1956 at Westgate and five children were born to this union, Jeff, Joan, Brenda, Kent and Quinton. They later divorced. Bernard married Madalene Kay Anfinson on June 2, 1984 at Oelwein and four children were born to this union, Renae, Cassie, Tony and Ashley. Bernard was a lifelong farmer near Westgate. He also was a dealer for Cen-Pe-Co Oil for many years.

Bernard enjoyed racing go-carts, participating in tractor pulls, flying airplanes and model airplanes and racing stock cars. He was an avid NASCAR racing fan. In recent years, he enjoyed restoring antique tractors and building and stocking his ponds with fish on the farm. Bernard also enjoyed all the time he spent with family and friends camping at the pond. Bernard was an active member of Zion Lutheran Church in Oelwein where he had served on the church council, as a deacon and as an usher.

Survivors include his wife, Mandy; his children, Jeff (Lori) of Cresco, Joan (Richard) Arthur of Nora Springs, Kent (Sheila) of Oelwein, Quinton (Mary) of Oelwein, Cassie, Tony and Ashley, all at home; 14 grandchildren; two sisters, El Frieda Matthias of Fairbank and Lila Mae (Ron) Glass of Westgate; and many nieces and nephew.

He was preceded in death by his parents and two daughters, Brenda and Ranae.

A memorial fund has been established.

[Author's Note: Mandy was backing their van, using the two side view mirrors, omitting use of the rear view mirror. She did not see Bernard who was directly behind the auto. Bernard was bumped and fell, his head hitting the concrete. All efforts to save him failed.

In her attempts to overcome her grief from Bernard's death, Mandy immersed herself into the planning and construction of the home she and Bernard were building. Her home is located on Highway 3, a short distance east of Westgate Fireman's Park.


Bernard was far from a typical farmer. He was flamboyant, fun-loving, possessed a spirit of adventure and even owned an airplane. His obituary describes him well but does not include the many activities and boards on which he was an active member.

Mandy Anfinson was living and working in Waterloo at the time she met a divorced Bernard at a dance in Janesville. They were married in Bernard's home congregation, Zion Lutheran, in Oelwein She describes her life with Bernard as a whirlwind of exciting, funfilled activities.

For years, Mandy has driven the same school bus route for the West Central Maynard School District. Mandy very much enjoys her relationship with the students riding on her bus.

Behind Mandy's spacious home lies a huge park-like area with several camping sites and a large pond stocked with fish.]

Ashley Downing brutally killed by a robber

Ashley Downing, aged about 78, was found murdered in his home about eight miles northwest of Oelwein, about 4:15 yesterday afternoon (January 4, 1933) evidently killed with a shotgun by a robber. Mr. Downing lived alone on a 240 acre farm and was somewhat feeble, although his health was good. For a number of years he has walked with the aid of a homemade cane, taken from a pitchfork handle. This was a short stick, and was probably used as much for a weapon of defense as an assistance in walking. His pocketbook is the only thing missing so far as known.

Just what time the murder was committed is not known. He was talking with C. F. Plaster between 1:00 and 1:30 yesterday afternoon. Mr. Plaster lives about a half mile south of the Downing home, and in driving past the Downing home he stopped and talked with Mr. Downing in the road in front of his home. He was the last person known to have seen him alive.

From all of the evidence at hand it would seem that Mr. Downing was stooping over the woodpile which he has in his kitchen or general living room. The charge was fired at close range, burning his neck, and the entire charge of shot from a shotgun going through his head, the shot lodging in the woodpile over which he was bending, tearing away the right side of his face. The pile of wood was in the southeast corner of the room, and the door from the east opening into it from the outside was north of this. The body when found was lying with the head against the east wall, just north of the outside door, and his feet toward the west, nearly to the heating stove, which was in the center of the room. The brains had been blown over the woodpile, with his head back of the door which was closed. At the

northwest corner of this room was a little room used for storage and at the southwest corner of the room was a small room used as a bedroom. Whether the man who killed him was already in the house when he came in and he came out of one of these rooms and shot him in the back of the neck, or whether he came while Mr. Downing was there in the house and shot him afterwards, is not known. Whichever way it may have been, Mr. Downing was evidently stooping over this pile of wood to get some to put in the stove when he was shot.

The body was found by John Boiling and Harry Leiser, who had brought some chickens from Westgate to deliver to him. Mr. Downing had bought the chickens but had not yet paid for them, and these men were making the delivery. Looking around the place to locate Mr. Downing and not finding him, they knocked at the east door of the house. Receiving no response, they pushed the door open and there they met the gruesome sight on the floor just back of the door. They immediately notified the sheriff's office.

The sheriff and the coroner soon arrived as well as the county attorney. The house was full of people by that time so that it was difficult to locate anything that might lead to a clue. There was a large number of notes and mortgages in the house, for Mr. Downing never kept any money to speak of, he invested it as soon as he received it. Some of these notes were good and some of them never were. While he was most eccentric, he was also a sociable sort of man, and enjoyed company stopping and visiting with him. Living a hermit's life seemed to be largely from choice. His wife left him about six years ago, since which time he has been entirely alone. The wife died at the home of her daughter in Oregon about a year ago. He has three sons, two of them, Roy and Arthur, living at Parkersburg, Minn., and one, Ralph, living in South Dakota. The daughter, Mrs. Ethel Quinn, lives in Ore-

Miss Ethel Gherken, teaching at the Galvin school, heard the shot, about three o'clock yesterday afternoon, but she said she thought it was someone hunting and gave it no further thought. Mr. Harold Glew, living a short distance north of the Downing home, saw a man going through the cornfield across the road east from the Downing home, going diagonally southeast from where he went into the field. Footsteps were followed through the field this morning and found to have gone southeasterly to another road.

Mr. Downing was not known to have had an enemy of any kind. While having his peculiarities, he made no enemies. Being a man of considerable means, he had loaned a great many people money, but he had never sued on any of it. In fact, he was too easy with money matters when it came to loans of this kind. About a year and a half ago, he was held up at his home by two men and they secured something like \$72 from him then. This was a larger amount than usual as he had just been paid \$30 a short time before. He was a member of no church and he seldom left his home. It is said that he has sometimes been in the habit of taking a nap right after his noon chores were done, and yesterday it seemed to have been no exception. He had taken off his shoes and they were on the floor near the chair, on which also were his gloves.

Mr. Downing has lived on this farm for the past 55 years. He owns about 800 acres in Fayette County and about the same amount in Minnesota.

The body was brought to the Hintz funeral home in Oelwein last night. The coroner will hold a more extended inquest this afternoon. Sheriff Nehring is at work on the case but reports no definite clues have been found.

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
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


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
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"Catfishing"

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As many of you know through the years of my articles, I love bass fishing and tournaments. And yes, that part of the sport of fishing makes my world go round through the open water season. But what many don't know is I love to catch anything that swims, I absolutely love fishing for all species! One of my favorite species to fish growing up is catfishing. And it just so happens we have some great catfishing opportunities right in our backyard. This month, I'm going to talk about a fun, inex-

pensive species to fish for the catfish.

I still remember following my dad down an old dirt path along the Cedar River, the hot sun beating down and the grasshoppers jumping out of the dry grass as we made the long trek to our favorite catfishing hole. It was always so exciting for me, back then I only got to see my dad on the weekends and I would wait all week in excitement to get to go to Dad's as I knew

we would be catfishing all weekend. I was probably only nine or ten years old at the time and back then I'm sure Dad was just using this as a way to inexpensively get some fishing in when my family didn't have a lot of money. But what he probably didn't realize at the time is he was creating some of my favorite memories fishing growing up. It was always so cool to me to ride to the local bait shop for catfish bait, I was always in awe at the large bait tanks full of all the different sizes of minnows, chubs, and crawdads. I loved the smell, and the sounds of the tank pumps as we visited the store for our bait of choice for day. It was my wildest dream to one day be involved with that shop. That shop is Hanks Live Bait and Tackle and now currently one of my biggest sponsors on the tournament scene. It's funny how things work out sometimes. Anyway, back to following dad down that path, as I said, it was usually hot and it was all my little arms could handle carrying the bucket of chubs

and our gear down the path. Dad and I had kind of "built" our favorite fishing hole. There was naturally a rocky point that had created a current break, but we added to it. We carried rocks and piled them further out into the water creating an even bigger current break and a deep hole in the water where catfish like to live. On the bank, we found a bunch of bricks and built a makeshift fireplace. A lot of our fishing would go well into the night and a small fire was a neccesity as we would usually bring some hotdogs or a can of beans for a snack while fishing. If I recall correctly,



that's even where I got share a sip or two of dads Old Milwaukee "when I ran out of pop" sitting side by side on the riverbank. Insert winking emoji face here. We would sit there for hours with two poles each propped up on sticks with a different bait on each rod. Dad taught me at the time how to target the two different catfish species in the Cedar. If

you targeted channel catfish we generally used dead chubs or stinkbait and if we were after flathead catfish we needed to use live chubs, as flatheads would only bite live bait. We both became obsessed with catching a big flathead. Our goal was always to break that twenty pound mark,



and I still remember the night we did. We were in our usual spot and it had been a slow evening with only a few fish caught.


Dad had decided that he wanted to try some bigger bait and had thrown a nightcrawler out on the bottom to try to catch a sucker or carp to have that bigger bait. He had casted out a small spinning rod to do this and propped it up. We put some hot dogs on the fire and heard the drag on that little rod take off! Dad grabbed the rod and the fight was on. What had been put out to catch bait was now the tool to get our elusive twenty pounder in! The drag on that little reel was screaming and we both feared it

goal and as long ago as that was, I still remember every detail.

It's very easy to get into catfishing, and as I said earlier our local Wapsi River and Cedar are absolutely full of them. To get started I recommend a rod at least 6' 6" and no lighter than medium heavy action. I prefer heavy as catfish fight hard! I like to use no lighter than 20 lb. test line and you can use either spinning or casting reels, whichever you prefer. For a bait setup use a heavy barrel sinker with a splitshot behind it as a sinker stop. Stop the sinker at least a foot and a half above the hook to let the bait float up off the bottom. Baits of choice are chubs, nightcrawlers, crawdads, chicken liver, or stinkbait. Stinkbait can be purchased in jars and use a sponge or stinkbait holder on a treble hook. If you use chicken liver, I like a treble hook for that as well, as it holds the liver better than a standard hook. For

> all the other baits I like to use a 1/0 widegap hook. Cast your baits along current breaks that create slack water behind them. I like to cast right where the current meets the slack water. Dead trees in the water are great places for catfish to hide as they create current breaks and deeper water. There are many great accesses nearby to start finding these type of areas for catfish. A good place to start is with an Iowa sportsman's atlas and generally wherever there's a public area along the river, you will find good catfishing. Or simply take a family drive along the river and you can find great areas to start. When cat-

fishing, bring the kids along as it's a very relaxing way to fish throwing your bait out on the bottom and relaxing along the river. Bring snacks and you'll more than likely make some great memories just as I did all those years ago. Until next time, GET OUTDOORS!
