

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Readlyn, Long Ago

THURSDAY, June 29, 1970- Don Fauser heard that there would be something big happening in Wadena. Out of curiosity, Don and Dorothy, Gerda and I drove to Wadena Thursday and spent time at the Chaparral Supper Club. We got there at about 8:00 and ordered something to eat and drink. We hung around listening to the many rumors as to what might be happening. We learned that there would be a music program of some kind. Around 10:30 the owner of the supper club received a phone call warning him that a group of Hell's Angels on their motorcycles passed through Oelwein. They were headed for Wadena. INSTANT PANIC! Within 1 minute we were out of there, headed back to Elgin. The owner turned out the lights, locked the door and fled the scene. I saw no Hell's Angel emblems at the rockfest. We were the victims of a cruel joke. Hilarious, now.

FRIDAY, June 30. -- The Wadena Rock Fest was underway. People began arriving by the thousands. Pastor Denny Brake, Elgin Lutheran Church called to discuss our attending the rockfest. People in Elgin wanted nothing to do with what was happening in Wadena. We decided to go. We had no fear of repercussions of our attending.

SATURDAY, July 1 —- Mrs. Brake dropped off Pastor Brake, Harold Halverson, his brother and me at the gate. We paid \$15 each to enter. We were completely out of our element among the young hippies. We were walking along, in our long pants, carrying our coolers and sleeping bags, when I heard one of the hippies yell. "Hey, you guys, you going fishing?" We obviously stood out in the crowd. We picked out a spot, left our coolers, rolled out our sleeping bags on the grass, then headed to an area closer to the stage. We sat on the grass, and for the next 13 hours, listened to the music.

SUNDAY, July 2—-It was prearranged that Mrs. Brake meet pastor Brake at the entrance at 7:00 a.m. He conducted his usual Sunday services and returned about 1:00 p.m. Around 5:00



we were on our way back to Elgin.

MONDAY, July 3 — Leo Lehman and I spent time in the Wadena area. There were a few stragglers. We saw hundreds of garbage bags lying in the area. Those in attendance were requested to clean their area, placing the refuse into the available garbage bags. People complied with the request. Souvenir hunters came later, ripping the bags open, dumping the contents, looking for souvenirs

Observations As A Participant

Thousands of young people had gathered at Wadena. They definitely followed Governor Robert Ray's advice to enjoy themselves. He withdrew all law enforcement. A wise decision. I saw no incidents, no fights, nothing stolen, only young people living in harmony, enjoying themselves. I had never been in a group, before or since where the participants were as kind, courteous and pleasant. We four were readily accepted. No hassling!

Laws were not obeyed. Drugs were openly used. Some of those there were mellowed out from using drugs. Beer and wine were readily available. The alcohol of choice was Ripple, an inexpensive wine favored by young people. Drugs were available to purchase. Homemade signs on cardboard stated the price. The only drugs I recognized from the ten or more displayed were LSD and marijuana or pot, now mostly referred to as weed.

I saw no open sex. A few went skinny-dipping in the Volga River. Attractive younger women who were proud of their bodies went into the water nude and also posed for pictures. No older or fat people sought the Volga River in the nude for relief from the 90 plus heat. I did not bring a camera. I feared that people might object violently. I knew that illegal behavior would be present and did want my photos to be used as evidence.

Some of the music was enjoyable, some was hard rock. All were loud. Many acts were well known. Buffie Sainte-Marie, a Canadian Cree Indian, was my favorite. The music could be heard miles away and affected chickens laying eggs and cows giving milk.

Sitting on the grass next to us were two young girls from Monona. I visited with them. Pastor Brake visited with the girls at length. They appeared to be 12 to 14 years old. My thought was: Why would parents allow their children to attend the rockfest all alone? Later, Pastor Brake and I had our lives affected by one of these young girls.

The rockfest was well organized bringing in the groups, many by helicopter from airports in the area. Buffy Sainte-Marie was flown to the Oelwein airport by private plane, then by helicopter to Wadena. The logistics were challenging, coordinating the arrival time of the many groups.

We sat listening to the music. There was a few minute interval whenever acts changed. It was announced that the music would end at 4:00 a.m. At four in the morning a glimmering light could be seen to the east. I was overjoyed that 4:00 a.m had arrived. Needless to say, I was tired. However, the crowd yelled MORE, MORE, and the music continued for a short time. We returned to our sleeping bags. It was daylight. I made a stupid blunder. I unrolled my sleeping bag. It was wet from the heavy dew. I crawled into my sleeping bag. Lying in the wet sleeping bag was uncomfortable. I was unable to sleep and soon got up. No sleep Saturday night. There were thousands of tents pitched. Those young people came prepared.

A doctor and a nurse were available near the

see some who were being treated.

During daylight hours planes were flying overhead constantly, as many as a dozen planes. Chartered flights were arranged for those wanting to see the Wadena Rock Fest from above.

I saw at least 15 Iowa Highway Patrol cars parked next to the Wadena Elementary School. Law enforcement established a post in the schoolhouse used during the rockfest. Later I saw, written on the blackboard by one of the troopers, the message, "When in trouble, call a hippie."

Some Days After

I was informed by Avis Wenger that members of our Lutheran Church did not approve of Pastor Brake having attended the Wadena Rock Fest. He would face harsh criticism at the next church board meeting. I was on the church board and feared I, too, would be rebuked. The evening of the church board came. Paster Brake opened the meeting with a prayer. He immediately said he had a letter he would like to share. The letter was from one of the young girls from Monona who sat next to us at the Wadena Rock Fest.

Summarizing her letter, it said, "Paster Brake, it was great talking with you at the Wadena Rock Fest. I wish more pastors were like you and would go out to places where there is sin and temptation and talk with young people. Sincerely, Miss?"

After the letter was read by Pastor Brake, we members of the church board sat there stunned--a moment of silence-- absolutely no rockfest discussion. After the short pause we calmly proceeded with the business of Elgin Lutheran Church. I found this episode amusing. I laughed—--to myself.

My Dad, Oscar Thran, came to visit us in Elgin. He got out of his car and brought up the topic, the Wadena Rock Fest. I told him I was there and found the rockfest an interesting experience and enjoyed the harmony of the entire group. On hearing this, my Dad immediately jumped back into his car, and without saying one word, drove back to Readlyn. He left me standing there.

Looking back, I never, at any time, discussed the rockfest with any of my Elgin friends. No one broached the subject, and neither did I. This article is the first time I have shared my experiences at the Wadena Rock Fest.

Reflecting, the Wadena Rock Fest was indeed a novel and interesting experience. I am glad that I took part. I was 41 years old. Some of the groups played music I really enjoyed. I drank Pepsi and ate my sandwiches. Someone, who brought a crate of oranges to share, threw one my way.

Recently, I learned that some Readlyn citizens attended the rockfest. Knowing who they were, I am certain they thoroughly enjoyed themselves.

In summation, I wrote only what I saw. Others who were there, I'm sure, viewed the rockfest from a different perspective..

Wadena Rock Fest - Were you there?

The excitement began when the rockfest, which was scheduled for Galena, was blocked by an Illinois court. The promoters had to quickly find a site in Iowa. The 240-acre Schmitt farm near Wadena was purchased.

The organizers had only two days before the rockfest was to open. Iowa authorities also tried to block the rockfest. The court allowed the rockfest to proceed if sanitation and parking conditions were met. One hundred porta-potties were quickly ordered. Land was leased for parking from local farmers. The biggest party ever held in Iowa began. The Wadena Rock Fest was the story of the year in

After the rockfest was over, the promoters left, taking anything of value. Taxes were not paid on the farm. The property was sold for back taxes.

Among the thirty groups that appeared at the Wadena Rock Fest were: Guess Who, The Fuse, Illinois Speed Press, Rotary Connection, Chicken Shack, Mason Proffit, Buffie Sainte-Marie, Little Richard, REO Speedwagon, The Flying Burrito Brothers, Everly Brothers, Poco and more.



Pavelec shows how to pan for gold at Readlyn Library summer program

The Readlyn Library hosted Larry Pavelec, the chair of the Bremer County Conservation Board, for a summer reading program talk. He had a lot of useful tips on how to go about locating Iowa gold.

Pavelec talked to a couple of dozen kids and some adults who were in attendance. His main advice was to always ask permission before looking for gold in Iowa streams and to respect the landowner. It would be best, to stay on your own land. If on public property when you're on Iowa streams, stay between the high water points of a flood. Do not dig into the stream bank.

Gold in Iowa was moved here by giant glacial ice masses. The glaciers came from Canada and Michigan. They could have traveled from as far away as Greenland. These same glaciers that pushed the gold here also ground it up quite fine. The majority of Iowa gold is as fine as pepper. But it is still heavy, yellow gold, and it sticks to the bottom of the pan.

Larry demonstrated how to pan the gold. First, he put some gold-bearing material into a pan. Then he liquefied the material in the gold pan by shaking it. When panning for gold he only needs about a quarter pan of water. This will stratify the material. The heav-

ies such as gold go to the bottom of the pan. The blonde sand will be on top. When you stop the liquefication, the sand will lock up in the pan. He then swirled the water and the light sand came off first. Then he sluffed off the blonde quartz sand into the panning tub. Then the material is liquefied and stratified again. As always, the gold will go to the bottom of the pan. The specific gravity of gold is 19.3, so you know it's going to be right at the bottom. Your black sand, made up of hematite and magnetite, are anywhere from 3.75 to 5.3 on specific gravity. The black sand material covers the gold. This can be swirled off. Then with a light tapping on the side of the pan, you will bounce the gold over to the clear space at the bottom edge, so that you can see the gold. Remember, if it shines, it is not gold. Yellow gold sticks to the bottom

A couple of tips from the session were to look at the start of a sand or gravel bar on the upstream side. Then to find the pay streak, you're looking from inside bend of the river to inside bend. Gold always wants to travel in a straight line. It is very lazy and will always take the shortest route.

The best way to confirm if you have gold in

a spot on a stream is to do test pans. You take a little bit of the material in the pan and work it down to see if you can find some gold. You will do several test pans across the direction of the water flow on the sand or gravel bar. You are test panning to see where the most gold is. The pay streak is only about a foot wide

At the end of his presentation, the kids did some panning for gold. Larry brought in concentrates from the Wapsipinicon River. Five of the children found some gold. One girl even found two pieces. Larry put the gold into .5-ounce vials for them to take home. If they did not get some gold, he handed out some fool's gold (iron pyrite) to everyone. After most of the participants had left, Larry gave the librarian a teaspoon of the concentrates to pan. Wouldn't you know who found the biggest spec of gold! She probably has caught gold fever now.




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
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"It's Not A Passion, It's An Obsession" Part One



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
