Poker Rules:

> Players will return to Grumpy's Bar by 5 p.m. to turn their cards in. Please plan accordingly!

Readlyn Community Fund's first annual award night held

Sunday, August 20 was the first annual award night hosted by the newly organized Readlyn Community Fund. For years, the Readlyn Community Fund was an affiliate of the Community Foundation of Northeast Iowa (CFNEIA) and distributed funds through the CFNEIA's platform. To provide a stronger connection and greater local impact,the Readlyn Community Fund established its own 501(c)3 at the start of 2023 and the 2023-2024 grant cycle was the first cycle of grants awarded through the organization.

The mission of the Readlyn Community Fund is to provide support for future projects directly benefiting the people of Readlyn through an annual grant process. Committee members of the RCF (Readlyn Community Fund) consist of Kyle Shores, Jaci Hogan, Jill Krall, Amy Sheppard, Danny Sickles, Jill Schwickerath and Sharon Davis. This year's 2023-2024 grant cycle awarded five local organizations their full or partial grant request.

The first recipient of the award night was the Wapsie Valley High School Industrial Technology program with an award of \$2,000. These funds will be used in a continuing project to help introduce students in 7-12 grades to different computer aided design (CAD) software options.

The Northeast Iowa Food Bank was the second recipient with an award value of \$2100. This grant request aids the local backpack program that assists many families in the Readlyn community.

Third, Readlyn EMS received a grant award of \$2400 to go towards the purchase of a Stair Pro Chair. This device will help with transporting patients up or down stairs without requiring heavy lifting from any crew member.

Security cameras for Main Street and the City Park will be purchased with the grant award of \$3,500 given to the Readlyn Police Department. Getting a second set of eyes for Readlyn was the main goal for this application. This is a project that will continue to keep the community safe for years to come.

The final recipient of the 2023-2024 grant cycle was the Readlyn Fire Department. The organization was awarded \$5,000 to go towards the purchase of two thermal imaging cameras. After the ceremony, the members of the RFD stayed for a demonstration of the thermal devices.

All organizations were exceedingly grateful for the support of the Readlyn Community Fund. The next annual RCF grant cycle will coincide with the Bremer County Foundations' grant cycle in 2024. 

Readlyn Fire Department Receives Grant from Readlyn Community Foundation -The Readlyn Fire Department would like to thank the Readlyn Community Foundation for the financial assistance in purchasing 2 MSA LUNAR devices. These devices serve as thermal imaging cameras as well as search and rescue aids. These LUNARS will assist the Fire Department in pinpointing hot spots during overhaul, finding main heat sources when in a fire and locating victims or downed firefighters. The LUNAR devices cost just under \$3,000 each. The Readlyn Community Foundation awarded the Fire Department with a \$5,000 grant to aid in the purchase.

The Rinkleff family - Coming to America

Back in 1953, the Karl Rinkleff Sr. family immigrated from Opladen, Germany to Readlyn, Iowa. The economy was in shambles in Germany after WWII. Karl moved his wife, Helene, and six children, at the time, to the United States in hopes of a better existence. The children were Hermann, 15, Christel, 13, Annaliese, 12, Karl Jr., 8, Herbert, 7, and Franz, 3. The youngest, Paul, was born in 1957. Opladen was an industrial city in Germany that was heavily bombed by the Allies during WWII.

Towards the end of WWII, Helene had been taking care of the oldest four children while Karl Sr. was engaged in battle on the Russian Front. Helene had moved the family to Eastern Germany by the end of WWII, and, with the German forces in full retreat, Karl Sr. was able to get back and take his family back to the western part of Germany before the Russians overran the eastern part of the country. The journey was not without incident as the family had a run-in with a drunk Russian soldier, that did not end well for the soldier, and the family barely made it through the woods that were being heavily patrolled by Russians. One night, a teen boy helped the family through the woods while there was gunfire all around them from Russians finding people fleeing through the woods. Karl Jr. was an infant at the time and miraculously did not cry or make a sound that night.

Karl Sr. then left his family to find some American soldiers to surrender to, as it was well-known that the Russians, and French, would probably kill any German soldier. The best chance he had was to be captured by the U.S., with the British being his second choice. He found some Americans to surrender to and was put at hard labor for a few weeks to get him to sign paperwork stating he was a member of the Nazi Party. When it was apparent that he was not a member and would not sign the paperwork, he was released to return to his home and family.

Karl Sr. returned to his family in Opladen to try and put their lives back to-

gether. Though there were some areas of Germany that were virtually untouched by WWII, Opladen was not one of them. Opladen is near Köln (Cologne), and the whole area was devastated by the Allied bombings. To this day, they are still finding bombs from WWII that did not detonate. The building next door to Rinkleff's home was a pile of rubble and stayed that way for several years.

For eight years, Karl Sr. tried to support and care for his family, and this was very difficult. Karl Sr.'s mother had a cousin in the U.S. that talked Karl into coming to the U.S., as the country was allegedly flowing with milk and honey. Karl Sr. left for the U.S. with his wife and six children. The family arrived in Readlyn in 1953 and eventually lived in a house (now occupied by Jerry and Bonnie Wittenburg) across from the old elementary school. The family was starting over completely without the means to return to Germany if things didn't work out for them.

The Rinkleffs did not speak English at all. Karl Sr. was a skilled painter and interior designer, which in Germany required years of school and training to achieve. There was not the work in a small town like Readlyn to support work for someone with Karl's skills. Karl did not drive and did not have a car. He was known to walk to Waverly to find work there. These bright Rinkleff children, regardless of age, started at the kindergarten level and were progressed through the grades as their English improved. When the children would come home from school, they would teach what English they had learned to the parents.

Ironically, as bad as Germany had been damaged in WWII, the Opladen area was more advanced than the Iowa countryside was, as far as modernization and education. This was a cultural shock to the Rinkleffs in more ways than one. There were families in Readlyn that would drive the family to church at St. Mary's in Waverly. Also, a few families were generous at helping the Rinkleffs with items such as milk and other necessities. In 1958, Karl Sr. moved his family to Waterloo, where he was able to find more work and have easier access to church.

Later In America

Hermann became an engineer, and married Rodna Deur. They had four children, and eventually settled in the Minneapolis, Minnesota area. Hermann passed away in 2020.

Christel Rinkleff was married to Verne Lockard, and they had four children. Christel resides in Rochester, New York. She is a skilled homemaker and a gourmet cook.

Anneliese was a bank vice-president, had three children and now resides in the Indianapolis, Indiana area.

Karl was a skilled carpenter and married Mary Jane Kucera. They had five children, and eventually settled in the Fredericksburg, Iowa area. Karl passed away in 2013.

Herbert became a nuclear valve supervisor and married Andrea Elliot. They had two children, and settled in Brownville, Nebraska. Andrea passed away in 2022.

Franz became an engineer, and he married Sue. They had four children and settled in Waterloo, Iowa. Franz passed away in 1981.

Paul was born in 1957 and became a cost engineer. He married Shelby, and they reside in Tennessee. Paul has two children. Karl Rinkleff Sr. passed away in 1994, and Helene passed away in1995.

Note from Bob Thran — Karl Sr. survived fighting against the Russians for several years, a gruesome experience in itself, then led the family courageously through dangerous territory to freedom and finally to America. What a movie this would make. I visited with Karl Sr., our neighbor, several times, nothing about the journey to America, which I now regret.





LETRS

One of the ways we will look to improve our academics in Pk-6th grades is through a new initiative called LETRS. LETRS stands for Language Essentials for Teachers of Reading and Spelling. LETRS is a professional learning course for instructors of reading, spelling, and related language skills. It provides educators with in-depth knowledge and tools that they can use with any reading program. LETRS professional learning is accredited by the International Dyslexia Association, and aligns with their Knowledge and Practice Standards for Teachers of Reading. This program will help all of our teachers to better understand the issues children encounter with reading and how to help them through those issues.

Professional Learning Communities (PLC)

Another research-based initiative that all staff have been doing for several years at Wapsie Valley is called Professional Learning Communities, or PLC. A professional learning community is an organizational structure by design that meets regularly, shares expertise, and works collaboratively to improve teaching skills and the academic performance of students. The school's curriculum, instructional design, and assessment practices are monitored through the PLC design to ensure teacher effectiveness and most importantly student learning.

Leader in Me (LIM)

Finally, Leader in Me is an evidence-based, social emotional learning process that helps schools proactively design a culture that reflects their vision of their ideal school. It also empowers students with the leader-

> ship and life skills they need to thrive in the 21st century.

As you can see, our staff and students will be working very hard, as they always do, to help the students of Wapsie Valley gain the necessary skills to be successful adults when they enter the workplace, college, or an apprenticeship.


Also, furniture, believed to have been made in the late 1920s and into the 1930s, was donated to the museum by Dan and Bev Huebner. The furniture was original-


