
pulling our camper. Louie did well with just a couple of whimpers and OMGs.

Hello Readlyn Community!


These past two months have been a whirlwind of activities.



Readlyn Boxing Matches

Wayne and Dale Kuethe's father, Elmer, as well as Uncles Reinhart and Ervin Judas were involved in boxing. Boxing matches were held in the 1930s until some years thereafter. Wayne remembers traveling to Clarksville with his family to attend a boxing event. His Uncle Erv feared his opponent. Elmer Kuethe took his place.

I assume the bouts were staged in Readlyn in the outdoor movie lot. I attended no boxing events. I did hear people say that Erv Judas and Edgar Albrecht were both skilled boxers.

Last Boxing Matches Held In Readlyn

Six young kids, 10 or 11 years old, dreamed up promoting some boxing matches among themselves. We got permission to use Wolf's Hall, the upstairs of the building across Main Street from Readlyn Public Library. Wayne and I do not remember how we advertised the bouts. Maybe we talked Lou Sherman into printing some fliers for us or possibly we handprinted them ourselves.

The boxing card: Ervin Fortsch vs Dale Keuthe Allen Fortsch vs Reiny Frietag, Jr.

Wayne Kuethe vs Glenroy Fortsch (Norman Seeman was originally slated to compete, but Glenroy replaced him.)

We set up chairs in the hall. Boxing matches were set on the stage. I was older and served as business manager and collected the money at the top of the stairs. Admission was 10 cents per person.

The day of the bouts came. To our great surprise, lots of people came. The gate was split among the six boxers. Maybe each got a couple dollars. Big money, at that time, to those young kids.

Wayne and I now laugh about the individual matches. Dale was much taller than Erv Fortch. Reiny Frietag was much bigger than Al Fortsch. The only two on the boxing card that were evenly matched in size were Wayne vs Glen Fortsch. Glen was two years older than Wayne. No one was hurt in any of the matches.

Wayne and I do not remember how we kept track of rounds. Wayne thinks Fat Meyer was the referee. It is difficult to recall for this happened more than 75 years ago. When Wayne and I look back we find it difficult to comprehend the success of our evening of boxing matches. Many people attended. One major measure of success—not one person asked for their dime back.

Note: The interesting poster was mailed to me by Wayne Kuethe's sister, Judy Henn. Bout bill was saved by Mrs. E. H. "Ernie" Gehrke, mother of Stan Gehrke.



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
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

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News from Wapsie Valley Schools Warrion Way & More W



It is hard to believe that the month of October is half over and the cooler weather has definitely arrived. A big congratulations to all of our fall activities and the success that each of our teams has had this year. The strong traditions continue in the valley!

Over the next few months I am going to be sharing information in regards to school finance in Iowa. I feel this is an important topic for all patrons to have a basic understanding of so that you are knowledgeable about what schools can and cannot do with funds. It will also help you understand how staffing and facilities decisions are made.

Iowa School Finance

Iowa school finance can be difficult to navigate. Below are a few basic concepts that will start you on your way to a general understanding of where school funding comes from and how it can be spent.

Iowa school finance is based on the number of students in the district. The total amount of money a district has is determined primarily by the number of children enrolled. The Iowa Legislation sets the amount that school districts receive per child. That amount currently is \$7424. Except for a few specific tax levies dedicated to specific purposes, the state prohibits districts from levying as much local money as they might otherwise want to fund the school district. Therefore, when

the number of students enrolled in the district increases, the amount of money for the district increases. On the contrary, when the number of students decreases, so does the amount of money available to the district. Schools are a labor-intensive business, with about 80 percent of a district's General Fund made up of staff salary and benefit costs.

People often wonder how the district's tax rate is figured. The district's tax rate is set by the school foundation formula. There are only limited steps a school board can take to increase or decrease the property tax rate. Each tax levy has a limited purpose and the General Fund is for everything else. Property valuation has a big impact on the overall tax rate.

Certain funds have to be spent on certain things. Although it may not make sense that the district has enough money to pave a parking lot, remodel a building, or buy computers but not enough money to hire teachers (or vice versa), that's how the state law works. These are different pots of money that can be used only for specific, legal purposes.

Next month I will discuss the different types of funds in the district budget and what those funds can be spent on. Please let me know if you have any questions. Thank you for your continued support and Go Warriors!



One of the competitions that takes place during the convention is collecting of can tabs. Crane Creek recorded 536 pounds of tabs and were this year's champions. It takes approximately 1,300 tabs to make a pound. This equates to approximately 696,800 tabs for the champs. These tabs can be pulled from beverage cans, soup cans, cat food cans, or any miscellaneous aluminum can tabs. Plainfield, Sumner, Waucoma and Westgate have joined forces for tab collections and are bound and determined to dethrone Crane Creek.

Jen Happel of Denver has been the leader in getting the communities focused to save tabs. That desire has also been spread on to Nancy Kleitsch, Readlyn,

and Ann Harms, Tripoli. These gals report that they have several people from across the state gathering tabs and getting them for the annual competition. They even report folks from other states bringing them tabs.

The 2023 results were (in pounds): Crane Creek – 536, Atlantic – 451, Plainfield and friends – 203, Stacyville – 167, Key West – 50, Latimer – 47, Little Rock – 28, Lineville - 2. This means 1,484 total pounds were collected this year which is approximately 1,929,200 tabs.

The price for aluminum when melted down ranges from \$.85 to \$1.00 per lb. Bremer County alone donated over \$650.00 - just from taking a tab off and saving it! Everyone involved in saving says, "Just make it a habit! It doesn't cost you any extra time!"

At convention, the tabs are collected by


the Can Tabulous crew. They work with a man by the name of Jeff Jefferson. He has been sorting and cleaning these tabs for 53 years. After meticulously doing this, the tabs are turned in to a cash donation to the Shriners Hospital for the children's burn unit to help families pay for their medi-




