# Don't kick the cans — save them!


Roger and Marlys Deterding are the two most responsible for ensuring that we have spectacular fireworks for Grump Days and Santa's visit.






Maple Crest Manor Nursing Home (10 yrs.), located in Fayette where he grew up.

# The Life and Times of Jack C. Carney

I was reminded at a meeting on my 94th birthday that a man by the name of Jack Carney played a part in our history. Jack had an establishment located north of Tripoli in which he dispensed alcohol illegally during prohibition. In simple terms,

he was a bootlegge

Jo Porter of Denver, a longtime genealogist, sifted through the *Sumner Gazette* archives and found a wealth of information on our subject, bootlegger Jack Carney. I was amazed by the effort, time and print the *Sumner Gazette* gave to reporting on the life and death of Jack Carney.

My story this month highlights the life of Jack Carney as told by the *Sumner Gazette*. Next month, the February issue of the *Readlyn Chronicle* will present the life

of Jack Carney as reported by the *Waverly Independent Newspaper*; a completely different version of the man, Jack Carney.

The *Sumner Gazette* listed men leaving for WWI induction/training at Camp Pike, Arizona, on July 25, 1918. Jack was included in the group.

23 Dec. 1920, *Gazette* reports Jack and O.E. Bethel had been successful hunting jack rabbits and one cottontail.

31 Jul. 1924, *Gazette* reports that Jack had walked around Sumner with coil of rope on his arm. People speculated that Jack had decided to end it. But he was still around town.

1 Sept. 1927, *Gazette*; Jack was raising 500 Barred Rock pullets on Wm. Parrott property in NW Sumner. Jack was showing the first egg, a small one, from a 14-week-old pullet. He hoped to be rid of the birds before winter.

8 Sept. 1927, *Gazette*; Jack helped capture a runaway mule.

18 Apr. 1929, *Gazette*; Jack was in Tripoli on business.

20 Aug. 1931, *Gazette*; Jack drove to the Mesquaki Pow Wow

26 June 1941, *Gazette*; Jack has a Tripoli address and attended the Sumner funeral of Mrs. Emma Rathbone

22 Apr. 1943, 26 Jul. 1945, 6 Sept. 1945, *Gazette*; reports of Jack of Tripoli visiting friends in Sumner

27 Jan. 1955, *Gazette*; from the Pinhook news column; Jack fell on ice and cut head

3 Mar. 1955, *Gazette*; Pinhook; Jack visited in Tripoli

5 May 1955, *Gazette*; Pinhook; Jack is working at Armours in Waterloo

25 Apr. 1963, *Gazette*; Pinhook; Jack has been ill; is feeling better

4 May 1967, *Gazette*; Pinhook; Jack attended funeral of Fred Niemeyer, Tripoli

# Jack Carney, 77, WWI Veteran died Wednesday

From the *Sumner Gazette*, published in Sumner, IA on Thursday, March 27, 1969

Jack Carney, 77, veteran of World War I and lifetime resident of this community, died Wednesday morning at the Waverly Convalescent Home, Waverly, Iowa.

Funeral services are pending at Emerson-Milnes Funeral Home, Sumner. John Milnes of the Emerson-Milnes Funeral Home said Wednesday that they had received no information regarding immediate surviving relatives.

Mr. Carney was a member of Thomas E. Woods Post, No. 233, American Legion of Sumner.

#### Looking Around This Week...

Editorial from Sumner Gazette, April 3,

Funerals are necessarily touched with sadness, some more sad than others, but seldom does a funeral service help only to compound a mystery, to help renew and strengthen a legend. One might almost say the services held this past week for Jack Carney did just that. During the service the Priest said, "This was a famous man."

At first, for those who knew Jack Carney, even casually, this seemed like a strange statement. And yet, considering this man's life, one could only agree that he was a legendary figure in this area, a man whom was known by many during the 20s, 30s and late 40s. In a way he was famous, and almost a legend in his lifetime ... a legend practically forgotten in recent years, yet brought back to life at his passing.

The Priest continued by saying that no-

one was really sure about too much of this man's background, except what he has, at times, said. And as he recalled, the fact that the man came originally from Mexico, that he left home at the age of nine to make his own way in the world. That there was no records of any relatives, except that his family had moved to Oregon, the legend that Jack Carney flickered into life for the handful of people in the church.

How do you separate fact from fiction in the life of a man who apparently was not interested in anyone actually knowing the truth about himself? The facts are few. He came to the community in 1913, one story has it, with the crew installing the sanitary sewer system in Sumner. That he lived a good share of his life along the Wapsie bottoms north of Tripoli is fact. Although not too many people of my, and the older, generation, will admit it, there was no mystery about one of his sources of income... sale of beer, both home-brew and, especially in later years, commercially bottled beer... and all that was required was that the customer had money. There are those who insist that beer was not the only commodity which could be purchased at his Wapsie bottoms shack.

It is a fact that whatever faults he had, he never failed to pay his bills and his credit rating was unblemished. But here the provable facts seem to come to an end... and legend takes over. Which among these stories are fact, which are fiction, this is the mystery, and secret of this man, which he took to his grave.

The stories are legion... many of them, undoubtedly, as legendary stories often do, have taken on greater proportions with the passage of the years. Did this man actually come to Sumner by accident, and was he in fact running from something or someone else? Was his entrance into the armed forces in World War I participated by a brush with the law? Was his name actually "Carney" or was this, too, a convenience to help disguise his true identity?

Then there is the story of the box of silver dollars which he, at least for a time, carried in the trunk of his car. Why? Where did they come from? Did they actually exist? A man, who quite apparently lived, in many ways, just outside the law, built for himself a reputation with his apparent lack of need for close friends, with his quite obvious self sufficiency.

Last Friday morning, the service at the church ended. The flag draped coffin was placed in the hearse and the slow journey made to the cemetery northwest of Sumner, only a few miles from where he had lived so many years. The color guard fired their salute, taps sounded, the flag was carefully folded and the casket was lowered into the ground... the final chapter in Jack Carney's life

That he lived without close friends could be shown by the fact that only one person, other than those who "had" to be there, was on hand at the cemetery. And the mystery of Jack Carney remains... a man, who was truly a legend in his lifetime."

# A visit to Jack Carney's infamous speakeasy

Our community has spawned its share of what are often referred to as "characters," for lack of a better term. They are those who have marched to a far different beat than the great majority of their fellow beings. yet not always in a major role of antisocial action.

This week I was reminded of one of those people, Jack Carney, who once lived in the Wapsie bottoms where one leg of a county blacktop now cuts across country west of the big curve on Highway 93.

Jack operated a primitive speakeasy during the days of prohibition. Even after repeal, it still operated and still illegally because he never bothered to get any of the necessary licenses to dispense liquid alcoholic refreshments.

A visit to Jack's place for an illegal beer was a guaranteed conversation piece, proof of a young man's worldliness and something to be made known to those friends who hadn't had the good fortune to be accepted in Jack's humble abode.

And what does the late Jack Carney have to do with Independence Day? Probably nothing except the freedom which we cherish made most people tolerant of his place because he was flaunting authority and really not hurting anyone in the process.

This is what characters are made of....

an ability to thumb their nose at conventional attitudes and actions and yet still not do irreparable harm to others. This nose-thumbing does not have to necessarily take the form of operating a speakeasy, as with Carney, but it does require an attitude which sets a person apart in some way.





Hello Warriors and Happy Winter. I hope everyone had a safe and relaxing holiday break. Just a friendly reminder that with our winter weather usually comes delays and cancellations. You can find weather related announcements posted on: KWWL, KGAN, KCRG television stations. If you are signed up for the all call messages/text/email you will receive information that way as well. You can also check our Facebook pages for any delays/ cancellations.

This month I would like to focus on how important our AEA (Area Education Agencies) are around the state. In her recent State of the State speech, Governor Kim Reynolds talked about the AEAs being subject to DE oversight and implied that the AEAs will be "special education-only" entities.

The concern here is that AEAs provide so much more support to schools, especially small, rural schools like Wapsie Valley, than just Special Education. Wapsie Vallev receives many needed services that we would otherwise not have access to, or be able to afford, if we were going through a private company. Some of the services that Wapsie receives are: Mental Health Support, Technology, Curriculum, Professional Development, Work-Based Learning, Career Counseling, and Crisis Support just to name a few.

Below is a graphic to show what schools, students, and families currently receive for services and what would be lost if the Iowa Legislature moves forward with the bill to do away with these AEA supports. The entire list is what is currently offered and the supports highlighted in pink would be eliminated if this bill passes. This will have a huge impact on Wapsie Valley as well as many other schools throughout the state. If you have an opportunity to advocate for Iowa's AEAs it would be greatly appreciated!

This month's Iowa School Finance Information is about the General Fund and the impact state funding has on the dis-

In Iowa public schools, student enrollment directly influences the budget through a funding formula. The state allocates funds based on the number of students enrolled, impacting resources, staffing, and overall budget allocation for each school district.

Iowa schools receive \$7.626 in SSA (State Supplemental Aid) for each student that is enrolled. Therefore, when student enrollment declines so does the amount of money a school receives.

For example, the Wapsie Valley School District has approximately 50 fewer students than it did 3 years ago. If you multiply \$7,626 x 50 that is over \$381,000 less money that we are operating with today than three years ago.

When you have a loss of revenue like this you have to look to make changes. If you do not make changes the district will be in a financial burden in an extremely short period of time.

One thing that helps to offset student loss is the amount that the Iowa Legislature increases SSA. If SSA increases by 2%, the amount of revenue we receive will increase by almost \$100,000!

Therefore, state funding is extremely important to school districts in order to be able to provide the necessary services that students need.

She started out shed hunting a few times with me and her mom and even found a couple which is always exciting. As spring rolled in, she helped with some tree planting as we planted 192 trees throughout the farms and, yes, I say the weird number of 192 as two of those trees were apple trees Delana gifted me for Father's Day, probably one of the best Father's Day gifts I've ever received as on Father's Day we spent the day together at the land planting the two trees.

Shortly after, we purchased an elevated blind for her. Delana helped me assemble, trailer, and install the blind in a dogwood thicket to the north of the main food plots. As summer rolled on, she got busy as every teenage girl does and didn't have a lot of input on the fall food plots, but she kept track of our many cameras across the farms and we often talked about certain deer or what was happening in the woods.

On August 15, we purchased her tags and shot her rifle leading up to the youth season. Iowa's youth season starts mid-September and this year the weather was not conducive to great deer hunting even relatively speaking for early deer season. Highs in the mid 90s stayed throughout the season and we elected to hold out on hunting until the early muzzleloader season rolled around in hopes of better weather. Delana's youth season tag is good for all of Iowa's deer seasons so long as she uses the weapon legal for that specific season. This meant she had to learn everything about my muzzleloader and how to shoot it.

We headed for the gun range on a Sunday afternoon before early muzzleloader season

opened. Delana requested I shoot the gun first while she watched before she would shoot. I clicked off the safety, steadied my aim and squeezed off a shot to a deep woof of the powder followed by a cloud of smoke, followed quickly by, "Dad, I'm not shooting that thing!! That looks painful to my shoulder!" The following 20 minutes took every ounce of my salesmanship to convince her it doesn't kick and only looks scary. She was quite reluctant but finally squeezed off a shot followed by "Well, that ain't so bad..." Five more shots and we felt comfortable she was dialed in with the muzzleloader.

The next weekend rolled around and we were set to hunt Saturday evening. In

Delana and I started our huntdeer ing YouTube channel, EDJ "The Outdoors." I quickly realized Delana's personality really comes out on camera and she becomes a whole different girl lighting up for the viewers! We filmed our walk in and got set in the blind. Within

five minutes,

this

time

a doe with a small 4-point buck came out of the west thicket. Yes, I said 5 minutes..... I let the camera roll and told Delana to take a shot if she wanted to. She made the decision to pass on the buck and we watched contently as deer made their way onto the food plots. We set things up to attract deer to the property in October through January with the way we set up food plots and habitat and it was so cool to see the deer utilizing our work. We watched numerous deer all evening and talked and just had a good time and made a great episode.

Through the week, Delana had volleyball games and practice so the next time we could hunt together was the following Saturday on the last weekend of early muzzleloader. We had beautiful cool, clear weather for this hunt and it made for a very enjoyable hunt.

> We slowly made our way into the blind on the access trails I cut back in late August for a very quiet entry. Again, it didn't take long for deer to start making their way to the mixture of Mossy Oak BioLogic clover, turnips, radishes, sorghum, and pumpkins.

> Pumpkins, Eric? Yes, pumpkins. One part I forgot on the plots is in late May, Delana came to me with the idea to plant



pumpkins along the edge of the food plot in front of her blind. I kinda rolled my eyes, but she was persistent and I bought 3 ninety-nine cent packs of pumpkin seeds. We planted six mounds of pumpkins and, honestly, I didn't expect much out of it. Surprisingly, those six hills went crazy and we had a large amount of pumpkins. And even more surprisingly, the deer started feeding on them this particular evening. We had numerous deer come and go that evening with some as close as 5 yards in front of the blind. But Delana decided to hold off and we had another good episode for the channel.

Early Muzzleloader ended and now painfully Delana had to wait until December 2,

> to the rifle range over Thanksgiving and checked sights her and comfort with 350 her legend. We were all set and, after a long wait, Delawould na get another chance. The morning of December 2. were

gun

up early and I'll be the first to say Delana is not a morning person. She wasn't very chipper to start this YouTube episode. There was zero wind this morning and I'm certain we sounded like rhinos going through the timber to the blind. We sat until 10:30 a.m. with surprisingly no deer sighted. We headed home, had lunch and made our way back to the woods.

The camera was rolling and Delana had

some energy for this hunt. We both had a high excitement level and it just felt like it would be a great evening. We hadn't been in the blind long and it began to snow. This made for such a neat scene, and a doe made her way out of the east thicket and began feeding. Delana thought about filling a doe tag in this moment, but decided to wait in hopes of a buck coming out. Soon, four does made their way onto the plot and I caught movement behind them in the thicket.

"Delana, there's another deer coming, I think it's a buck — check with the binoculars." A quick check and, "Dad it's a buck!" I propped up her rifle and she shouldered it.

'Dad, I can't see through the scope!" I neglected to cover the scope lens and it had filled with snow while we sat. I quickly grabbed my glove and wiped away the snow. "I can see him now Dad." "Shoot if you want to," I relayed to her as I filmed while the small buck fed at 40 yards in front of us in the turnips. I heard the safety click off and BOOM! the buck dropped instantly.

"I dropped him like a sack of taters." Delana called out with this new found video side of her as we hugged and high fived. We took our time and safely made our way out of the blind and, once on the ground, there was no slowing Delana down! She got to her buck and we both took the moment in, smiling and hugging each other and me telling her 100 times how proud of her I am. After gaining our composure, we did a follow-up interview for the video and took pictures! Traditionally, the first phone call was to "Papa" which is what Delana calls my dad and they chatted while I got the truck. We field-dressed and loaded the buck up in the snowy misty weather and were all smiles on the ride home. A big hug from mom is how Delana was met at the door.

This is definitely a hunt I'll never forget and, hopefully, Delana won't as well. I truly cherish these times with her and I need to thank the landowners for the playground for us to make these memories. 
