



#### Hamming it Up Amateur Radio Licensing

Amateur (or Ham) Radio has long been fertile ground for gaining knowledge and skill with electronics technology. The Readlyn Library is working to provide our patrons access to Amateur Radio resources that currently are unavailable locally.

Amateur Radio encourages hands-on investigation and experimentation as a basis for understanding technical subjects. Amateur Radio experience can be a motivating influence for careers in computer sciences, consumer electronics, broadcast engineering, research sciences, medicine, telecommunications and more! Further, it enriches the lives of thousands of people as a way to meet and make friends, have fun, and pursue a path of lifelong learning.

Amateur Radio was formed by experimenters who wished to push the envelope of radio technology. That purpose remains at its core, which is why it fits perfectly with science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) education. Also known as ham radio, it promotes hands-on investigation and experimentation making it a valuable tool to help students understand complex technical subjects. Individuals can build a solid foundation across multiple subject matters as Amateur Radio integrates math, science, engineering, and technology, as well as other content areas (such as geography, reading, and writing).

Amateur radio also provides a means of community support. The Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) is a corps of trained amateur radio operator volunteers organized to assist in public service and emergency communications. Communication failures are a defining part of disasters. Amateur radio provides a means of communication "when all else fails".



Currently, we are attempting to procure radio equipment for patron use and are already coordinating with local amateur radio clubs to host free training (in Readlyn) to help get your license and begin operating. Stay tuned as your library team gathers resources and experts to provide you with the tools you need to become a "ham". Stop by and ask how to get involved.



# Readlyn, Long Ago

# Captain Paul L. Milius

Paul Milius was born to C.H. and Christina Milius on February 11, 1928, the youngest of four children He was born on the homesteaded Milius farm near Denver and grew up on a farm 3 miles west of Readlyn. Paul was a graduate of Readlyn High School, one of 15 in the class of 1946.

On December 30, 1951 Paul married Darlene Meyerhoff who was in his high school class. Darlene was the daughter of August Meyerhoff, president of the Readlyn Savings Bank. Darlene had a twin, Arlene, and also a younger sister, Ruth Marie. I graduated one year later than Paul and sat next to him in high school my junior year. Paul was the catcher for our baseball team (a good power hitter) and was a starter as a guard on the basketball team his senior year. Too bad Readlyn had no football team as Paul would have been an outstanding lineman.

During his senior year at RHS, Paul received an appointment to the United States Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland. By May 21, a few days after graduation, Paul was in boot camp at the US Naval Training Center in San Diego, CA. after which he reported to the US Naval Academy. Paul had little chance at academic success at the Naval Academy. Readlyn High School, as was the case with most small schools in the area, offered no advanced math courses (Algebra II, Geometry, Trigonometry) and no Chemistry or Physics. After 22 months in the US Navy, he was discharged.

His goal was to become a naval pilot, however, to qualify Paul needed a college degree. He enrolled at Iowa State Teachers College (UNI) continuing to serve in the Naval Reserve. After earning his two-year degree, Paul was again on active duty in Pensacola, Fl in pre-flight school. Next, he went to advanced training at Corpus Christi TX, where on December 16, 1951 he earned the naval aviator wings of gold. Fourteen days later, he married Darlene Meyerhoff in Zion Lutheran Church in Readlyn.

During his 20 years in the navy, Paul was assigned to many naval bases and performed a host of various duties. He also went up in rank. His first two assignments of his career, 1955 to 1957, were to the Naval Air Station in Patuxent, Maryland, where he gained experience in flying multi-engined Lockheed aircraft and to

the Naval Air Station in Hutchinson, KS as a flight instructor. His son, David, and daughter, Annette, were born during this period.

Another assignment for Lieutenant Milius was to the USS Kearsarge aircraft carrier. While onboard Kearsarge, he participated in the mission to retrieve Walter Schirra's Mercury "Sigma 7" space capsule in 1962

On his last and fatal assignment, Captain Milius (rank equivalent to Colonel in the US army) volunteered to a newly established Naval Observation Squadron. Aircraft were heavily armored and fitted with land detection systems for ground reconnaissance missions. His unit was assigned to a base in Thailand and immediately began flying surveillance missions in the vicinity of the Ho Chi Mihn Trail in Vietnam. At 1157 local time, Commander Milius and the crew of his aircraft were on a surveillance mission over Laos when the aircraft received a direct hit from anti-aircraft fire. One crewman was killed instantly. Fire broke out in the aircraft. As it became clear that the aircraft could not be saved, Paul took the control from the pilot and gave the crew the order to bail out. Paul continued to control the plane to enable the crew to escape. Of the eight surviving members of the crew, all but Paul were rescued. Although Paul was seen leaving the plane, heavy enemy fire led to search efforts being discontinued before he could be rescued. He was declared Missing in Action in Southeast Asia in 1968. Ten years later, his status was changed to Presumed Killed in Action. He was posthumously awarded the Navy Cross, a prestigious honor, 50 years ago, in 1968.

#### Navy Cross Citation

The President of the United States takes pride in presenting the Navy Cross (post-humously) to Captain, (then) Commander Paul L. Milius, United States Navy, for extraordinary heroism on 27 February, 1968 as an aircraft Commander on a combat mission in Southeast Asia. Captain Milius' aircraft received multiple hits from 37mm anti-aircraft artillery fire during a run over the assigned target. The aircraft immediately burst into flames, several members of the crew received injuries, and dense smoke and fumes filled the fuselage. Remaining at the controls to ensure stable flight, Captain Milius ordered his crew-

men to bail out. As a result of his action, seven of nine crew member were rescued within three hours of his bail-out. Rescue flights, however, were unable to locate Captain Milius. His heroic efforts and inspiring devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service.

#### **USS Milius**

The US Navy granted a great honor to Captain Paul L. Milius by naming a naval ship USS Milius. The missile-launching destroyer, USS Milius, has

a length of 505 feet, and 66-foot beam. Thirty or more people from the Denver area, led by Butch Milius, nephew to Paul, traveled to Pascagoula, FL, to witness the elaborate ceremony christening the USS Milius. Annette Milius christened the ship USS Milius, October 28, 1995, the first vessel in the US Navy named after a MIA Naval Officer.

The designation of a serviceman "Missing in Action" has a devastating effect on family members. The designation "Killed in Action" allows the family to grieve, gives closure, and offers them the opportunity to immediately manage their lives. Those affected by their serviceman being listed as Missing in Action are held in limbo, continue to hope and have difficulty in making decisions. This was the case with Paul's wife, Darlene, who was unable to cope, suffered depression and died in 1988 at age 60 in San Diego. His son, David, was a research technician in the Chemical Engineering Dept. at Princeton University, battled addiction, withdrew from the family, and in 2013, at age 57, took

his life. Paul's daughter, Annette, graduated from West Waterloo High School in 1972, attended UNI, transferred to the University of Iowa and received a Bachelor of Science in Nursing. Annette was a primary nurse on the Child Psychiatry Unit at the University Hospital and Clinics and eventually received a Master of Arts in Adult Mental Health Nursing. She continued working as a nurse supervisor. Moving to Topeka, KS, Annette worked for 14 years as a Clinical Specialist Nurse at the Menninger Clinic. She had written several publications and presented many workshops on mental health. She worked on a doctoral degree at the University of Kansas. Annette died in 2010 at age 56 in Waterloo.

Much of the information came from Butch Milius. His assistance made this article a reality. This article was difficult for me to write. For 10 years, I went to school with Darlene and Arlene. It was sad to learn that an intelligent, poised, attractive person as Darlene suffered her last years as she did.

## Readlyn upgrades air system

The Readlyn Volunteer Firefighters Association is happy to announce a recent acquisition of some much-needed equipment for the Readlyn Fire Department.

The air system used to produce and store the air needed for firefighters to breath during emergency response situations was in dire need of an upgrade. The prior system was getting outdated and struggled to keep up with demand placed on it during refill activities. In addition, it was not capable of producing higher pressure outputs that many of our neighboring fire departments use (we could get to about 3500 PSI while the modern breathing air systems are higher than that).

Through funding made possible by

many of our local supporters, the Readlyn Fire Department was able to install a new breathing air system comprised of a TalonBAC Eagle 6000 PSI air compressor and 4 cascade storage cylinders capable of each holding 6000 PSI (pictured above). The funding of this new system was made possible through the generosity of our supporters – Black Hawk County Gaming Association and the Isle Casino & Hotel at Waterloo, Bremer County Community Foundation, Readlyn Community Fund, & individuals and businesses in the area.

#### Fourth Season Success

Last month I wrote about my struggles during second season turkey hunting. This month, I'll finish out the hunting stories and transition back to fishing next month. This month's article is quite different than last month and, as hunting sometimes goes, some days you feel as if you can do no wrong. In this article, I'm going to tell you about most likely my quickest turkey

After my second season blunders, I couldn't wait to get back in the timber to redeem myself! I had anxiously awaited the opening day of fourth season. Iowa allows each hunter two turkey tags per spring season and this year I had taken second and fourth season. This year, fourth season opened on Wednesday, April 24. Due to work obligations, I couldn't make it out for the opening morning. It was a long 10 hours as I had planned to get into the timber after work. With all of my late winter shed hunting and scouting for local hunting areas, I had a pretty good idea where some nice toms were living. As I got home from work, I let my wife know where I was headed and I was on my way!

I arrived to the parking lot of a piece of local public hunting ground at 5:45, put on my Mossy Oak camo, grabbed my gun and began to walk in. As I eased down the DNR access path, I thought to myself, "In this nice open path, it would be something to see a turkey strutting or crossing it." I had only walked another 30 yards and spotted a gobbler crossing the path. He never saw me and I became really excited as I now knew there was a nice bird in this section. He had crossed about 100 yards down the path from me and I quietly picked up my pace to close the distance. Through scouting, I had a good idea where he was headed.

Within this section, there's an open stretch of timber about the size of a football field surrounded by thick underbrush. It's a perfect area for a turkey to strut in the evening before heading to the roosting trees I'd found near this open area.

I made my way close to where the tom

had entered the timber. I eased in quietly about thirty yards and let out a few yelps with my mouth call. The tom instantly responded with a loud gobble! I wasn't exactly sure how far he was from me and I hadn't even sat down near a tree yet. I stayed still as I was caught out in the open. I let out a couple more yelps and the tom gobbled again. This time I could tell he was about 80 yards in from me. I quickly found a tree to hide by and quietly settled in. I once again called and the tom instantly responded again. I could tell he was in the flat where I thought he would be. With him being so responsive I stopped calling and waited for him to make his way to me. In an evening situation like this, I like to make the bird seek me out once I know he's interested. He gobbled again trying to figure out where the "hen" (aka me) was.

Suddenly I heard a low rumble coming down the Wapsi River. It was Wednesday evening and the National Guard was training with their helicopter. They flew low to the trees and slowly down the river. It was very cool to see, but I thought for sure the tom would be spooked.

As the helicopter worked away and the timber settled down I let out another call and heard silence. I let a couple minutes pass, thinking the tom had spooked and let out another call. He instantly gobbled right back and was a lot closer this time. He hadn't spooked and was on his way.

I moved my gun a little to my right as there was a small ditch of water between me and the bird and I knew he would be able to get around it on my right. A couple minutes passed without seeing him, but instead of calling I softly rustled my hand in the dry leaves next to me, trying to sound like a hen turkey walking around. When the tom heard that, he gobbled loud and I spotted him coming through the thick brush. He was at 35 yards and moving from my right to my left. It was very thick to get a clean shot so I kept looking in front of him for a clear lane. I moved my gun, pointing down an open deer trail he was walking towards. He kept going in and out, strut and spit drumming the



whole time. It was quite a show and I was excitedly taking it all in.

The tom almost made it into my opening when all the sudden I heard what sounded like a person walking into the woods behind me. The tom spooked and immediately ran to the south. "What happened? Did someone walk in behind me?' I thought. After all, I was on public land.

I slowly turned my head left and here came two big toms from the north looking to run my original tom off. They were headed right to the deer trail opening and I decided to shoot the lead bird. As he stepped into the lane I yelped really loud and he stuck his head up high. I squeezed the trigger and he went down!! I got up and made my way to a beautiful tom tur-

I looked at my phone, the time was 6:14. I had gotten it done in just under half an hour. I was so excited, not only for getting my fourth season bird, but for doing it on public hunting land a mere 10-minute drive from my house! The scouting and planning had paid off! I made a call to my Dad and let him know the news on my way home.

Once home, I went in the house and told my daughter, Delana, to come check out dad's bird. She was so excited she jumped right in the truck, fanned him out and had me take a picture! It's definitely a hunt I won't soon forget!

As I sat down to write this, we are also busy planning Grump Days with the Community Club and I wanted to pass along that Readlyn Outdoors will be putting on a kids' casting contest during Kids in the Park and, at 2:30 Saturday, I will be hosting kids' minnow races. These are two events you don't want to miss! More information is on the Grump Days' flier. So come see me at the park on Saturday of Grump Days for both events! And until next month, GET OUTDOORS!!!
