



## Readlyn, Long Ago

## The Legacy of Albert Hinrichs

This article is an interesting segment of the Hinrichs family history as well as the history of Readlyn as told by Dwight Hinrichs, Albert's grandson.

Albert Hinrichs owned a harness shop in Readlyn once located on the lot which is now the south half of the Readlyn Community Building. The Readlyn Fire in September of 1912 caused Albert to lose everything. Without telling anyone, he boarded a westbound train and left Readlyn behind. By examining several documents, it was found that within the three months after leaving Readlyn, Albert filed for a homestead of 160 acres in western South Dakota 50 miles north of Spearfish. Albert, during that same three months married a widow, Elsie Black Arnold, with two small children. Elsie owned 160 acres adjoining Albert's land. (It is surmised that this was a marriage of convenience, for Elsie needed a man to help farm her land and Albert needed a place to live. These marriages were common during pioneer times).


Ironically, Elsie was raised on a farm near Jesup, Iowa. (Dwight Hinrichs in later years visited this area in South Dakota and found this land marginal for farming. Elsie's quarter section was suitable for raising wheat and Albert owned a quarter section that was merely pasture land). Julia, daughter of Elsie, remembered living there in a sod house. During the next six years, Albert and Elsie had three more children and Elsie was again pregnant. Sometime during this six-year period Albert established communication with his Readlyn relatives.

In 1918, six years after Albert left Readlyn, a devastating flu epidemic killed many people worldwide. Albert and Elsie were struck by the flu and died two days apart, leaving five small children. In addition to Elsie's Frank and Julia, Albert and Elsie had three additional young boys, Eugene, Walter and Edward. The neighbors made the arrangements for the funeral, but what about the five children? They found a postcard with a Readlyn postmark, then wrote to the Hinrichs family explaining the situation.

After receiving the terrible news, the Hinrichs family decided that Louie and Fred Hinrichs, brothers of Albert, and Ernest Everding, married to Albert's sister, would travel by train to South Dakota to bring the five children back to Readlyn. After returning, a family meeting was held as to who would care for the children. Fred and Sophie Hinrichs would care for the oldest boy, Frank. Ernest and Kate Everding took Eugene, better known as Jim. Louie Hinrichs and Anna Zabel chose Julia, the only girl, and the two youngest boys, Walter and Edward (Eddie). An amazing decision by Louie and Anna for they were not yet married, their wedding ceremony coming several weeks later.

#### The life of the five children

Frank, the oldest, and Fred Hinrichs did not mesh well, not entirely the fault of Frank. Frank ran away at age 16, believed hopping a freight train, and wound up in California. He kept in contact only with his sister, Julia. Frank died at age 40 of a heart problem. Julia arranged to

have Frank's body brought back to Iowa and he is buried in Waterloo.

Julia was involved in an abusive, alcoholic, first marriage. After a divorce, she married Art Ruescher. Together they operated various businesses in Waterloo and in several neighboring towns. Julia died in 1985 and is buried in Garden of Memories.

Eugene (Jim), after graduating from

READLYN FARNER Dies after Crash

Louis Hinrichs Is Victim When His Car Is Struck by C. G. W. Motor

READLYN.—Louis F. Hinrichs, 49, farmer living two miles south-west of Readiyn, died shortly after midnight Wednesday in Mercy hospital at Waverly of injuries suffered Wednesday morning when his automobile was struck by a westbound Chicago Great Western motor train at a crossing one mile west of Readiyn.

At the time of the accident Hinches was driving west, geturning some from Readlyn. In approaching the railroad crossing Hinrichs applied the brakes but the road was so icy that his cur skidded in fromt of the path of the train. The car was hit on the driver's side and was entried down the track about a black with Hinrichs pinned inside.

He suffered a compound fractuce of the left leg about six inches the above the knee and a compound fracture of the lower right leg.

After being removed from the wreckage by the train crew he was taken to the Readlyn depot and after some delay was taken to the Mercy hospital, Waverly.

Funeral services were held at Readlyn Tuesday afternoon in the ery Zion Lutheran church, Rev. Landhed grebe officiating.

Mr. Hinrichs was a lifelong resident of the Readlyn community, having been born on the farm southwest of town.

Denver High School, worked at the Crittendon Produce in Tripoli which dealt with the purchase of eggs, chickens, ducks and geese and the selling of feed. He married Elnora Tonne. After a few years he became a partner in Crittendon and Hinrichs Produce. Jim started another successful produce in Mallard, Iowa and operated this produce until he was drafted into the US Army. Relatives ran the produce in his absence. While fighting in Europe in WWII an artillery shell landed near him, killing all except Jim. He suffered from shell-shock and spent several months in an Army hospital. When released, he was no longer assigned to a combat unit, but to a company clearing the dead from battlefields. After his discharge, Jim returned to Mallard to his produce business. He sold the business in 1955 and farmed. Upon retirement, Jim and Elnora Hinrichs moved to Lake City, Minnesota. Jim died in 1998 and is buried in Lake City, MN.

Walter, Dwight's father, worked as a hired man for Ernie Spier on a farm south of Readlyn, married Margaret Wedemeier, farmed on shares on several locations in this area and in 1955 bought a farm eight miles northeast of Readlyn near the Crane Creek Lutheran Church. Dwight and Sandy Banser Hinrichs now own and live on this farm. Walter died in 1972 and is buried in Crane Creek Lutheran Cemetery.

Edward (Eddie) worked at Rath's until he was drafted into the army. While fighting in Italy during WWII, Eddie was pinned down in a foxhole partially filled with icy water. Having his legs in cold water for a time caused him to lose feeling in his legs. After spending time in an army hospital, Eddie regained the feeling in his legs and was assigned back to a combat unit. After discharge he married Betty, a girl from Waterloo, and moved to Michigan, became a painter, using his artistry to paint signs and bill-boards. Eddie died in 1978 and is buried in Michigan.

### A Tribute to Louie and Anna Hinrichs

Louie and Anna Hinrichs provided for Julie, Eddie, and Walter, children of Albert and Elsie Hinrichs, Louie's brother. Louie was also the executor of the estate of Albert and Elsie's five children. He

even traveled to South Dakota during the Depression to finalize the sale of the children's unproductive land. In addition to raising Albert's three children, Louie and Anna had four of their own, Howard, Lucinda, Lavern, who died of scarlet fever at age two and one half, and Leona, who was stricken with polio at five and walked with a limp her entire her life. Later, the wife of Louie's cousin, Bill Leverence, died leaving four small children, a five and seven-year-old and twin boys, two and one half. Louie and Anna were also involved in raising the twins. Louis and Anna were involved with raising three different families.

Louie and Anna surely deserve a special place in Heaven as a reward for all the good they did on Earth. At the end of Louie's unselfish life came a cruel blowan horrible death at 49. Life is not always fair! Louie and Anna are buried in Zion Lutheran Cemetery one mile west of Readlyn, near where Louie died.

Leona Hinrichs Flynn graduated from RHS in 1945 and from Coe College. She became head of the lab at Allen Memorial Hospital and wrote a book about the history of Allen Hospital. Leona was in a home in Cedar Falls suffering from dementia. In the early days of the Readlyn Historical Society, I approached Leona about her helping our cause. She calmly wrote a \$1000 check! She died on Thursday, March 21, 2019, a month ago.

I remember Louie Hinrichs. On Saturday nights he came to town, sat on the old leather car seats on the south side of my Grandpa's butcher shop, and visited. Louie was a kind, likable, pleasant person.

### Flint Hills donates to Wapsie Valley High School

Fairbank, Iowa –Flint Hills Resources' Fairbank ethanol plant announced they are making donations of industrial safety equipment to six area high schools. The Denver, Independence, West Central, Oelwein, Dunkerton and Wapsie Valley High Schools will receive personal gear and safety equipment for students' use. The retail value of the equipment is estimated at \$3,000.

"The supplies, equipment and materials are expensive, and welding is one of the more expensive subjects we teach, so these donations are really helpful and appreciated."

#### "Second Season"

The last time I wrote, I was in a bit of a funk with not getting outside much to take in all the outdoors has to offer. Well, I'm happy to announce I've been outside quite a bit with the better weather spring has given us!

I spent most of the end of March shed antler hunting and scouting areas for the upcoming turkey seasons and as always looking for the signs of big deer in the areas I've been. I've also spent quite a bit of time checking out hunting areas right around here close to Readlyn as I want to spend more time in the outdoors close to home. This month I want to fill you in on how my Iowa second turkey season went.

Iowa's second turkey season this year ran from April 12-16. A tradition that has recently started for me the last couple years is to hunt this season with my cousin, Colton, and his dad, my Uncle Marv. Colton and I decided to make this a tradition after he started going through his second battle with cancer at the young age of 20 years old. I've watched Colton grow up in the spring turkey woods from the first time I took him along when he was three years old, to today at 21 a fine young man and very serious turkey hunter. We made a pact to hunt at least one turkey season together each spring. In a future article I will tell you Colton's whole story, but this month I will profile our weekend this year.


As Friday rolled around I was very excited to make the drive to Earlville, Iowa. This is where my Uncle Marv and Colton live and 10 minutes from Delhi, where I grew up. I hunted turkeys each spring with Marv from a very early age and many of the areas we hunted are timbers I've hunted with Marv pretty much my whole life. It was very exciting listening to Marv and Colton talk on the phone with me about the birds they had been seeing while scouting the week leading up to the weekend. Work seemed to drag on as I waited until 2:30 that Friday afternoon to get on the road. As 2:30 finally rolled around, I barely got in my truck and Marv was calling with the game plan for the evening. The weather was very chilly and the wind was blowing at 20 to 30 mph, conditions not normally suited for turkey hunting but, with limited time, we had to get in the woods. As I arrived in Earlville, I changed

into my Mossy Oak camo clothes, hopped into Colton's truck and we were on our way to a timber that is about a 100-acre cedar free thicket. The cedar thicket is a big square surrounded by crop fields on all sides. We have hunted this timber for many years and it is always our "go to" area when the wind is blowing hard as, no matter which way the wind is out of, the cedar trees block the wind for at least one of the fields to be suitable for the turkeys to be able to strut and do there thing. The field that was shielded from the wind this Friday evening was a green hayfield on the east side of the timber.

A quick drive past showed us two strutting tom turkeys and a flock of hens in the field. On this hunt, Colton's girlfriend, Angie Wendt, was hunting with us for the weekend. We decided Angie and I would walk in ahead of Colton and Marv as we were the two with tags this weekend. Angie and I sneaked our way to within 20 yards of the field's edge hidden by the dense cedar trees and set-up and waited as Colton and Marv called the turkeys from behind us. I already started to have visions in my head of Angie and I getting a double on the first day and trout fishing the rest of the weekend! I was quickly brought back to reality as the birds were hung up in the field and eventually worked their way to the other side of the field away from us and the evening hunt was over.

On our way back to the house, we drove the back roads and laughed and joked and





cranked the music! At 4:30 a.m., the alarm was going off and I couldn't get ready fast enough! I was ready to get out in the woods.

This morning we would split up. Colton took Angie to an area he had scouted and Marv and I headed to an area I knew all too well. We set up on a field where just a year ago I had missed a turkey with my gun. That was the first time in my 25-year turkey hunting career that I had missed a turkey. So, as you can imagine, I was looking for redemption on this field. We walked in and set up in an area where last year the turkeys had first entered the field. It was a very cold and crisp morning with little wind, as we found trees to sit against in the dark.

Soon after setting up, the tom turkeys started gobbling on their roosts. A small patch of timber 200 yards to the east had at least a dozen gobblers from what we could hear in the pre-dawn and the timber we were in had two gobblers from what we could tell. As the timber woke up and it started to get lighter, Marv gave a couple tree yelps on his trusty Lynch foolproof box call and the gobblers immediately responded. Soon I could hear the turkeys fly down from their roosting trees and hit the ground. I watched across the field and saw the first bird make his way into the field. The tom worked his way across the field, covering 200 yards and hung up 80 yards to our left. He gobbled to each call Mary made and then I saw another tom come into the field. He gobbled loud, and I could tell he was the dominant bird. He raced across the field and went directly to the first tom. He walked right up to him and smacked him with his wing. It sounded like a gun going off, it was so violent. He chased him around and tried to run him off.

At this point I started to get nervous, thinking they would just run off and I would miss an opportunity. I had a cedar tree blocking my view of them and I decided I would take a shot when they came out from behind that tree. As they cleared the tree, they were at 40 yards and I clicked off the safety on my

Remington V3 12-gauge and squeezed off a shot. The birds looked as stunned as I was, I had missed! A clean miss; without much hesitation the birds ran off and my heart sank. Mary turned to me and said, "Why didn't you wait??" They had calmed down and were working closer to me, I had no reason to get impatient and, by getting nervous, I had lost my head on what the birds were doing. I felt like a 12-year-old kid again with that move. Mary laughed and said it took him back to the old days.

We actually laughed quite a bit about it as we met up with Colton and relayed the story. Colton and Angie didn't have much going for them that morning as the birds weren't cooperating with them. We hunted the rest of the day with very little action. We called it a day around 4:30 p.m. and looked toward the next morning.

As Sunday morning arrived we were back up at 4:30 a.m. and Marv and I set up in the timber where the toms had come from the day before. Sunday morning was very windy, cloudy and cold. The birds barely gobbled on the roost and didn't respond at all to our calls after they hit the ground. We called it a morning around 9 a.m. as I needed to get back to Readlyn to see my wife and daughter. When I got home they were busy with a project so I decided to try some public hunting ground close to Readlyn.

I slowly made my way through the woods, setting up and calling and then moving and setting up again. As I made it through some of the thickest part of this area, I turned to my right and saw a nice half of an eight point shed antler!! I was happy to have my efforts at least produce a shed! I was done for the day and had to be back to work on Monday.


I decided to try a different section of public hunting ground after work Monday. I again made my way through the timber slowly calling and hoping for a response but came up empty-handed on a turkey. As I got to the north end of the property, I could see a lot of deer sign and soon found another shed antler! I was pumped — two days, two sheds!


Even though I didn't connect with a turkey second season, I had a great time and, like always, a lot of memories made with Colton and Marv and a few of my own, finding those sheds close to home!
