As previously reported, the future Freedom Rock is "home" on V49 in Readlyn. Smith Excavating of Sumner deserves a huge thank you for donating 75% of the cost to move this mammoth rock.

The next steps are to power wash the rock twice, to provide electrical service to the rock, and to rent a canopy large enough to provide cover for the rock, the artist - Ray "Bubba" Sorenson II – and his myriad of paints and equipment.

In addition, expenses include his artistic fee, his specialty paints and materials, his accommodations, and any additional expenses for the more than week-long project.

The actual painting will begin June 18 with a projected completion date of June 25.

Once Bubba's work is complete, the rock needs three coats of sealant and landscaping. The final project will be a visual tribute to men and women who have served or are serving our country from Bremer County.

Readlyn Community Library Building Celebrates 50 years

History of the Library

Readlyn is proud to have a city library which was established in 1965 spearheaded by the vision of Mrs. Ethyl Rommell who felt that the growing town needed a library for the betterment of the community. The Readlyn Community Library first originated in the back room of the City Hall / Fire Station on March 27, 1965. Books were purchased from money raised locally and donations from towns people. The library continued to add more items and eventually outgrew the original space. The new building was constructed in 1968, and the multi-purpose room addition was completed in 1992.

Glennis Meier, Carol Strottmann, Barb Sowers, Amie Whiteside and Linda McCarty have served as directors of the library. We are grateful to the contributions and efforts of the many community members that have served as trustees on the library board.

The library has always kept pace with new formats and programming. The Video collection was introduced in the late 70's and now has about 1,600 selections. Public computers made their appearance in the 1980's and the automation of the circulation system was launched with the new millennium in 2000. Today the library offers audiobooks on CD, DVDs, computers and of course books. The library has four public access computer stations and a wireless network for laptop users.

To keep up with the changing times, the Readlyn Community Library has evolved in many ways. Todays libraries are multi-faceted – many things to many people. Libraries are a resource providing assistance, knowledge, entertainment and a sense of community. The library will always hold an important role in the community of Readlyn and the surrounding area. 


Readlyn, Long Ago

Wm. Schumacher Seed Oats Company Readlyn, Iowa

Driving south on Main Street in Readlyn, Iowa you will approach a T intersection, turn right and you are driving west alongside the former tracks of the Chicago Great Western Railway, now a bicycle trail connecting Readlyn to Denver and Waverly. Going further west you are driving past the St. Paul and Zion Lutheran cemeteries and traveling on farther you cross Crane Creek. Four miles west of Readlyn you encounter another T intersection. The farmstead on the right you just passed is on a quarter section of land owned earlier by William (Patent Bill) Schumacher. It was here Patent Bill developed a variety of oats differing from the standard product of that time. His oats had many more kernels per stalk than other varieties. He also invented a machine that graded his oats so only the desired kernels would be sold as seed oats. Selling seed oats and other



Schumacher Oats - In 1917 produced on an average 102 bushels per acre. In 1918 produced an average yield of 97.5 bushels

products Patent Bill created was a major sideline to his farming operation. He experimented and developed his oats by planting 250 varieties of oats on a test plot and rented an 80 acre farm near Sumner where his oats were raised. Oats, in the early 1900s, was a major crop on farms as feed for livestock. Soybeans were not grown! At the same time in the 1910s Bill Schumacher was selling his seed oats, he formulated a jam by processing buttermilk and labeled it Buttermilk Honey. He also patented a barn door latch, one of which was donated to the Readlyn Historical Society by Marv and Helen Schumacher. Patent Bill merchandised his oats, jam and latch by setting up his booth at county fairs, the Cattle Congress in Waterloo, the Iowa State Fair and even at the World Fair in Chicago. He also advertised in papers and put up handbills. His products were merchandised with a Readlyn address.

The innovations Patent Bill produced are too numerous to cover on one page of the Readlyn Chronicle, some of which are: a brooder which provided heat for little chicks. His barn and all outbuildings burned in 1920. Bill constructed a new barn which was featured in a newspaper article by calling it a pushbutton barn. He built a form to make tile, made some each day enough to tile his farm. Joe Bar-

Solid relations have been established and projects have been completed for leading companies such as Cargill of Canada and Rogers Sugar.

> Presently, employee numbers hover between 215 to 225. Nearly 100 vehicles are required in daily operations. Sales volume is more than 52 million and projected to more than double in the next few years. A rosy outlook!

Pearls of Wisdom

Balanced Christian living

Recently, I had a God incidence when I had a foot problem that affected my walk, and body posture. The foot doctor said, "I will treat your foot to help you get your balance back." Not only is balance that important for the body, but it is also important for the soul. Counselors and therapists alike have helped countless people strike the right balance between family life and professional life. In First Things First, Stephen Covey says that we can choose to live either by a clock or by a compass. He put it this way,

"If we live by a clock, we are consumed by appointments, objectives, schedules, and activities. If, instead, we choose to live by a compass, we are guided by our visions, values, principles, mission, direction, and destiny.'

Covey strongly advises us to know what is really important and central to us. In other words, he is pointing to our priority in life.

For those who follow Jesus, his teaching sets up the principle of our priority. "But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well" (Matthew 6:33).

Our relationship with God through faith in Jesus Christ is central. That relationship gives us the notion of eternity in our heart and provides us a sense of purpose and direction in life. Thus, everything else in life such as: family, career, life's outlook, and friendship, flow from it. When our life is first anchored in that relationship, the Holy Spirit helps us live a balanced life.

Living a balanced life, however, has always been a challenge for those who follow Jesus Christ. The story of the two sisters Martha and Mary in Luke 10:38-42 illustrates that. When Martha is overwhelmed with so many tasks, she tells Jesus that her sister Mary should help her out instead of sitting by the Lord's feet listening to him. Martha's sentiment may also be reflected in our low view of those who devote themselves to prayer rather than "doing something."

Jesus' response focuses on the central issue for both Martha and Mary and for us. 'Martha, Martha, you are worrying and are upset about a lot of things, but there is need of one. The one thing or the One who was needful and necessary was there [Jesus], and Martha's busyness kept her from being aware of that moment of grace while her sister Mary was abiding in it.

Doing more and more or acquiring more and more will make life less and less meaningful. St. Augustine was spot on when he realized that the human heart is restless until it rests in God. One author captures the essence of God's design by saying, "We are human "be-ing" and not human "do-ing."

If you like to be before God and want to be guided by his compass, give the following a try. Give the Word of God plenty of room to shape your heart and mind to live by what really matters: joyful living without anxiety (Phil. 4:4-6); good stewardship of time, money, and talents (Matt. 25:14-30; Eph. 5:15, 16; work with excellence (Col. 3:23); regular worship life and belonging to a community of faith (Heb. 10:25); raising our children in the training and instruction of the Lord (Eph. 6:4).

Jesus has come that "you may have life and have it abundantly," (John 10:10b). He is talking about life quality, significance, and balance. Note that the "you" there is both singular and plural. We experience Christ's abundant life individually and corporately in and through the community of believers. May the Holy Spirit help you strike the right balance! Have a blessed Easter.
