





## Readlyn, Long Ago

## German family names

In the last issue of the Readlyn Chronicle I stated that around 1950 Readlyn and surrounding community was composed of more than 97% German ancestry. How did Germans acquire their family names?

In the Bible people were identified by location as Jesus of Nazareth, by duties as John the Baptist, or lineage as Joseph, son of Jacob. Sometime between the birth of Christ and the Reformation (1600s) people acquired family names. Do you ever wonder why in America we have an overwhelming number of Smith families? Every village in England had one or more blacksmiths who earlier were identified as, for example, John the Smith or Henry the Smith. The family dropped the and assumed the name of the occupation.

The Norwegians simply took the name of the father and put a son behind it. Ole to Olson, Lars to Larson, Swen to Swenson, Torkel to Torkelson, Erick to Erickson, Nels to Nelson, etc.

In this period of history there were no factories mass producing goods on an assembly line. People lived in mostly small villages and goods were produced by local craftsmen. Each village had possibly one or two blacksmiths, a tailor, a baker, a butcher, etc. Families often acquired their family names from their occupations. German occupations translated into English are: Schmidt---blacksmith

Schaeffer--shepherd

Becker--baker

(probably Decker--roofer thatched roofs) Schneider--tailor

Meier--stewards of animals belonging to owners of the land

Traeger--carrier, transporter Schumacher--shoemaker Metzger--butcher

Gruber--digger or miner

Maurer--builder of walls-- cities built huge walls for protection

President Eisenhower--iron chopper

Schultz--village official (mayor, constable, etc.) Zimmermann--carpenter

Koch--cook

Mueller--miller, often changed to Miller on Ellis Island due to similar pronunciation

Bauer--farmer Seeman-seaman

Ackerman=land tiller

Buchholz=book wood, maker of wooden book bindings.

Messerschmidt--knife smith, was name of a famous WWII German fighter plane

Names ending in -ow and -tz as Leistikow, Buenzow, Hagenow and Schlewitz came out of eastern Germany or Poland area and are slavish names I listened to Kirk Ferentz identify his name as slavish We Thrans came from Buechow, --ow, the Jaschens from Zirkwitz --tz, villages 1 mile apart in eastern Germany. Kremnitz --tz is a neighboring village. At one time this area in eastern Germany and Poland was inhabited by slavs. Many villages have --ow or- tz endings.

Names ending with berg indicate mountain or hill, as in Bergman, Wittenberg, Lutherstadt. Names ending with burg suggest fort or castle. The Wittenburgs probably came from Wittenburg, a city northeast of Berlin. Wartburg is a castle but built like a fortress.

The Thurm family lived near and identified with a tower as Thurm is a tower. Reiny Freitag's family possibly had something important happen on a Friday as Freitag is German for Friday. The Steinbronn (stone fountain) family identified with a stone fountain. Sauerbrei in German is sour mash, the family having something to do with producing sour mash, maybe in a brewery.

OK, Wes?

The official language of Germany is High German adopted in part because Luther's writings were in that dialect. Languages need a literature. Low German dialects have no literature. There were five or six Low German dialects. Many of the families that settled in the Readlyn vicinity came from the province of Hessen where Low German was spoken. Family names have meanings in Low German but the translation is lost. I would love to know what a strott is for.

Strottman or what the verb moellen means for Moeller, or what hueben means for Huebner or what a boeve is for Boevers or what heine is for Heinemann or what a diek is for Diekmann, my mother's maiden name.

Kuhl is cool in German. What did the Kuhlmanns cool? A klinger is a bell, Klingman, a bell ringer. The apostle who took the place of Judas, the betrayer of Jesus, was named Matthias. A connection? Seedorff--village by the sea. Schimmel--white horse. Reiter--rider of an animal. Westendorf--west village. The first name of a family father was sometimes chosen

as a family name. The Otto name could be an example.

Names were created from colors Schwartz=black, Braun=brown, Weiss=white or from size, Gross=large or Klein=small. Some names come from personal characteristics as General Schwartzkopf (blackhead) must have had coal black hair. An interesting name in Readlyn is the name Rosengarten (rose garden). It is doubtful that their ancestors possessed a rose garden.

In those times people were referred to as serfs, who were subjects of whoever ruled. They probably lived near a rose garden or else tended the roses of the owner.

My name, Thran, is a Danish name. There is a lake and a stream named Thran in Denmark. My ancestors in the 1600s were part of an entourage that accompanied a Danish princess who wed a prince living in what is now eastern Germany.

In writing about German names I attempted to include family names found in the Readlyn phone book. I hope you found this of interest. When it comes to the subject of German names you should no longer be a complete Dummkopf! (dumbhead)

#### **How Grump Days was born**

So Grump Days is a wonderful combination of tradition and innovation, with

quirky events in between; but what are the origins of Grump Days? This is a question shrouded in mystery. Though this is the 20th year of The Grump, the story goes back much further than 1990. There's an old saying in Read-

lyn Town - and indeed it's part of the Readlyn Chronicle Journalist's Credo: "I don't know what the truth may be; I tell the tale as told to me." That said there is a tale, sometimes told in hushed tones in the dim nooks of the Center Inn. It is a story that goes back to the younger days of our nation and to the birth of Readlyn Town, circa 1904.

An old-timer - a "rider of the rails" they called his kind — was wandering his country. Some say he was a soldier of the

(This story was originally published in Civil War, originally from Ohio perhaps, who was on Sherman's March to the Sea (1864). Others say he was but a simple vagabond from who-knows-where. Anyway, the story goes The Old Grump was but a young man then when he jumped his first train. "He rode them rails for 40 years," goes one telling. From California to the New York Island, from the redwood forest to the gulf stream waters, our weary traveler saw nearly every inch of America.

> Just about the time the railroad came to Readlyn this mysterious soul arrived in town; by now the young man had grown old and grumpy. He walked the town with his hickory cane, his tired spirit impervious to the happy greetings and smiles of the 857 Friendly People who never did begrudge him his grumpiness.

> "Too bad for the reason," they'd say, "but he's our neighbor now," and so they were all the friendlier to him. Nobody knew his name, nor did he tell it, so they just called him The Old Grump.

> "Good morning, Old Grump!" they'd say happily and sincerely. "How's The Old Grump this afternoon?'

> Also what the people didn't know is why The Old Grump got off the train that day and decided to stay. The simple reason is that he loved Readlyn. Never before in his old life and in all the places he visited had people been so friendly to him. His face was frozen in a frown but inside he was happier than he had ever been.

> It took him a whole year, but then one fine morning in mid-June a miraculous thing happened: the Old Grump smiled! And laughed! They say his sudden smile lit up the town like fireworks and his laughter burst like a marching band in a parade. Some say that he smiled and laughed at his first sight of a child riding a bicycle: a curious sight at the time. But others said it was just that it took a whole year of Friendliness for his heart to finally thaw out. And he lived in Readlyn happily ever after.

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

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



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## The Season Opener

Yes folks, spring has finally arrived! Mother Nature sure made us wait for it this year. As spring finally rolled around, I counted the days until opening day. To the general public you casually mention opening day and most folks think of baseball. And while I myself don't mind a good baseball game from time to time, to the outdoorsman and outdoorswoman across the Readlyn area the words opening day mean so much. It's hard to describe the feeling of an upcoming opening day in the outdoors. As close as I can come to describing it is it's much like when you were a little kid waiting for Christmas morning to come! While there are many opening days for me throughout the year with the different hunting seasons, this week I'm going to talk about opening day of the Cedar Valley Bassmasters' tournament season.

Like I said above, it felt like spring would never get here this year. I had prepped my boat and had everything ready to go for the season back in March and then we kept getting snow. Our season opening bass tournament was set for April 28 at Lansing, Iowa and we had snow a mere week and a half before this. Cold water can make things very tough in the spring. Add to that dirty and rising water and you have a recipe for a very tough tournament. But as always, the tournament will go on and someone will find the fish and the winning pattern to take home a win. My friend and tournament partner Adam Farmer and I met at my cabin in Prairie Du Chien on Thursday night and

began planning how we would go about taking on Friday practice to find some fish. We decided with the cold water we would target areas near the bass wintering holes and see what we could find. Friday morning dawned cold and clear. We were to the ramp and on the water at daybreak. Lows were in the thirties and as we idled out of the canal a quick check of the water temp read 48 degrees. Not exactly ideal, but we needed to find them. We decided to start at a well known area that typically had warmer water. We fished around in there and found two areas that held a school of keeper bass. I told Adam, "At least we have this if we can't find other areas. But we need to get here first." We left there and decided we wanted to target Smallmouth. We had a tournament here last year around this time and in that tournament we did really well with Smallmouth Bass. We went from rocky spot to rocky spot all day with little to nothing to show for our efforts. We covered a lot of water throwing all kinds of different baits. At one point I had so many Carrotstix rods and Abu Garcia reels on the front deck of the boat I'm surprised I didn't trip over them and fall out of the boat! By 2:00 pm we decided the Smallmouth just weren't going to play for us and decided to switch things up. We pulled into a backwater that we've caught them shallow in the spring before and I thought to myself it's too cold for this. Another check of the water temp read 53 degrees in the backwater. A light breeze was adding a little chop to the water, so I picked up a spinnerbait and made

> a few casts. On my third cast I had a big bass roll over it. I looked at Adam and said, "That was a big Largemouth, we have an area to try to get a kicker fish tomorrow afternoon." I should have taken that clue right there changed and up our whole game plan, but more on that in a bit. That night





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made our plan to start at the community hole and stay there most of the day, then go to the backwater in the afternoon when it had warmed up to try for a big Largemouth. Tournament morning dawned even colder than the day before and the wind had blown hard all night. As we idled out of the ramp our takeoff order was boat #9. I wondered if the handful of boats in front of us would head to the area we wanted to start. I was nervous, because I knew if we weren't in there first we would have a harder time putting fish in the boat. As we took off I saw two boats ahead of me heading to that area. But I also noticed they were taking the longer way around that you must use when the water is low. I had idled out of there in practice and knew the water was deep enough to run across wide open. As they went around left I immediately cranked the steering wheel right and ran across the shallow flat beating both boats into the area, a fist bump between me and Adam as we drove right up to where we wanted to start. We put the trolling motor down and got to work. Adam almost immediately hooked up with a beautiful two pound Smallmouth and we had our first keeper in the live well. It didn't take us long and we had a limit of five fish in the live well and were feeling pretty good.

We had one small pocket in fast water that we would throw our Texas rigged Strike King tube into and let the current wash it into the rocks and as it washed over the rocks the fish would bite. We ended up anchoring and exclusively fishing that spot. We worked our way up to 12.72 pounds of a five fish limit and felt good. I did lose one big Smallmouth that would have really helped us, but we were having so much fun it really didn't hurt too bad. We stayed there until 1:00 pm and decided to finish out the last two hours of the day trying our Largemouth backwater. We fished that only producing one small Largemouth. As we headed to weigh in we felt good about our chances, but we ended

up very surprised. 12.72 was only good enough for sixth place. We were somewhat disappointed; I could not believe the big Largemouth that were brought to the scales to put us in sixth place.

Now don't get me wrong, Adam and I had a fantastic day of fishing. But the competitive side of me analyzes where we went wrong. This was a big lesson and one that I'm still doing a palm to face on. In a lot of my articles I talk about photoperidism (amount of daylight in a day) and how it affects animals' habits. The same applies for fish, especially bass. Because we had such a late spring, I had it in my head there was no way the Largemouth would be shallow with the cold water. I should have kept a more open mind on that and it's something you can apply to your fishing. While water temp is a big deal in the spring as far as bass moving shallow to spawn, it's just one factor in the process. What I didn't take into consideration is the water was rising (moves fish shallow), the water temp was rising a little bit each day (moves fish shallow), and the moon phase was nearly full (moves fish shallow to spawn). I had three key ingredients to move bass shallow and I didn't put it together. As I would later find out, the tournament was won shallow on Largemouth bass. A big lesson learned for me and believe me, all this was written down for next year.

Keep all this in mind as you bass fish each spring. Those three ingredients are key in the spring. Especially photoperidism; the amount of daylight is what triggers all wildlife. Current weather alters it slightly, but much like the white-tailed rut, the bass spawn is triggered by the amount of daylight. But, all in all, it was a great opening tournament for our season, we caught a lot of bass and shared a lot of laughs on the water. And after all, that's what it's all about!
