Hi, everyone!

This is a great time to reflect on the many good things we have going on here, living in Iowa, Bremer County and Readlyn. No forest fires, safe neighborhoods, good schools, good living conditions and really, pretty much everything we need. It's just a great time of year to say, "Thanks" and reflect on what we have!

The City Council has decided to apply for an Owner-Occupied Housing Rehabilitation Program, that is funded by HUD and administered by the Iowa Economic Development Authority. Not everyone that applies gets accepted, because funding is limited. Readlyn participated in this program a few years back and it was very successful with rehabbing several homes. There are also some income requirements for the area of town determined to be rehabilitated. So, to get this funding going, the City and INRCOG will be sending out a survey to see if the City of Readlyn qualifies. I would really appreciate it if you would please fill out these surveys and return them. The information is confidential and is only reviewed by INRCOG. We need 100% cooperation from the surveys to make the program work. I think this is a good opportunity to help out some homeowners with a grant to rehab a home. Any questions, just call City Hall or myself.

The Wetlands Project had been moving right along until the weather has acted up. If the weather cooperates, we will continue to try and get this project done before winter. We have already found some issues with the way the old drainage was working and I believe this project will benefit the City of Readlyn in many ways.

One project Austin and Barney are going to work on, through the cold months, is to replace all homeowner water meters. I know it will take some coordination with homeowners and Barney and Austin to get in and get it done. Please help us out when the guys get a hold of you. The reason for the change is to eventually have auto-read water meters. This will give us a more accurate and timely meter monitoring. If you have any questions regarding this project, please call City Hall.

Since we have already experienced a couple of light snowfalls, please be considerate of the city employees plowing snow and remember not to park on the street. Besides being in violation of the ordinance, it makes a dangerous situation while the guys are plowing and also afterwards, when snow or ice is still on the street.

As a reminder, I've seen several vehicles parked on the street - the wrong way. Once again, that is not a legal way to park and it is also dangerous, because the front of a vehicle has no reflectors and if you approach that vehicle in the dark it's very hard to see.

The Freedom Rock area is looking great! The Community Club has the sidewalk completed, the flagspoles up and some landscape rock installed. Thanks so much, it looks awesome! Great job all!! Watch for details for a dedication coming up.

The new sewer plant has been working very well. We definitely would have had issues with the old plant with all the moisture we had this fall. We will be having an open house in the near future. It is also sure nice having the compost piles back out there and they are doing a great business!!



# Readlyn, Long Ago

# Pearl Harbor Attack-December 7, 1941

Franklin D. Roosevelt, President of the United States said, "Yesterday, December 7, 1941, a date which will live in infamy--the Unites States of America was suddenly and deliberately attacked by naval and air forces from the Empire of

Japan." Until the time of the attack, negotiators from Japan and the United States were discussing peace in the Pacific. It was obvious that the attack was deliberately planned days or weeks before. The Japanese government had deliberately

sought to deceive the United States by false statements and hope for continued peace. The attack on the Hawaiian Islands caused severe damage to American naval and military forces. Very many American lives were also lost.

# **USS OKLAHOMA**

Arlin Wittenburg and Paul Aschbrenner enlisted in the navy together and were shipmates on the USS Oklahoma. They escaped "hell below" by a few moments on the morning of December 7, 1941. Wittenburg of Readlyn and Aschbrenner of Sumner were on the USS Oklahoma which capsized in the attack. *The Courier* interviewed Wittenburg and Aschbrenneri in 1997. Wittenburg died in 1997, Aschbrenner in 2013.

Aschbrenner said, "Some of my shipmates were killed outright as the ship was attacked by 28 Japanese torpedo bombers specifically attacking the Oklahoma from four different carriers. Other sailors burned to death when the oil leaking from their ship and others caught fire. Other sailors were trapped in air pockets in the ship's capsized hull and suffocated days and sometimes weeks later."

Wittenburg and Aschbrenner each were below deck in opposite ends of the ship. Both escaped by quick feet, quick thinking. Wittenburg was below the gun turret of three 14-inch guns at the stern of the ship ready to load powder charges that fire shells from those guns. Then it came over the loudspeaker that the Japs were attacking and the ship blew. Either bombs or torpedoes. Everything went black. She started going over. The sailors jammed a 16-inch-long brass nozzle in the hatch. "That way when the ship rolled the hatch fell open so we could go outside onto the

water," Wittenburg said. The surface of the water was covered with a layer of oil. Some of his shipmates stayed afloat by hanging onto the wing of a seaplane that had fallen off the ship into the water when the ship capsized (rolled over on its side). They were eventually picked up by a rescue launch.

Aschbrenner's situation: At the same time they passed the word over the loudspeaker, "Man your battle station - the Japs are attacking. This is no sh-t." He ran to his battle station but the ship was torpedoed, shook and lost power. Aschbrenner literally ran for his life--up the ladder out onto the deck and jumped into the water as the ship listed at a 45-degree angle and was about to capsize... He was the first one out. He doesn't know if anyone behind him made it. He swam away from the ship. "I was in the water trying to stay afloat, and when I was swimming in there the Japs had some fighter planes come strafing along shooting at us in the water. I was in the water swimming when I saw the Arizona blow up," said Aschbrenner. He was picked up by a motor launch and taken to Ford Island. "They issued me Marine clothes and gave me a .45 pistol. When the second wave came over, I was over there on Ford Island shooting at those planes with a.45 pistol."

Wittenburg said it was two days before he and Aschbrenner knew they both had survived. "I thought he had been killed and he thought I had been killed," said Wittenburg.

After the attack Wittenburg manned a cutting torch at the Oklahoma's capsized hull trying to free trapped shipmates. Aschbrenner assisted as well. "You could hear them tapping on the bottom.

"We cut some of them out after 72 hours. They were white as a sheet, blanched from being trapped for three days in the dark, damp hull." Some weren't that fortunate. Some trapped sailors counted the days by scratching marks on the inside of the hull until they were too weak or died. For some sailors whose bodies were recovered later those scratch marks stopped as late as Dec. 23--more than two weeks after the attack.

In all, 429 sailors of the Oklahoma's crew of 1,100 were killed. One was a Roman Catholic priest from St. Lucas, the Rev. Aloysius Schmitt, believed to be the first American chaplain killed in World War II. His remains were recently identified, returned to Iowa and interred following a service in Dubuque. He saved the lives of many shipmates at the cost of his own. Arlin Wittenburg was one whose life he helped save.

The Oklahoma was damaged so badly it could not be returned to duty. The ship was decommissioned, her armaments removed and then sold to a salvage group in California. While being towed from Pearl Harbor she capsized and sank in the Pacific Ocean.

We, who are old enough to remember, I was twelve, heard the following bulletin at approximately 4:30 pm on Sunday, December 7 on the radio: "WE INTERRUPT THIS PROGRAM TO BRING YOU THE FOLLOWING BULLETIN; THE JAPANESE HAVE ATTACKED THE HAWAIIAN ISLANDS."

We were stunned. I can best describe it as if someone had just kicked you in the stomach. This announcement had burned itself in our mind that we can all remember exactly where we were at and what we doing on December 7, 1941. I was coming home from Westgate from visiting relatives and we were driving past the Grove Hill Cemetery.

# We were fortunate

We, in the United States, were very fortunate that battleships were docked in Pearl Harbor and our aircraft carriers were out at sea. If the carriers would have been in Pearl Harbor they would have been heavily damaged allowing the Japanese control of the Pacific. The Japanese lost three of their four carriers at the Battle of Midway and the other was damaged, crippling their war effort.

Paul Aschbrenner had three sisters who married Readlyn men and farmed in the Readlyn area: Erna (Arnold Tiedt), Ruby (Marvin Huebner) and Lenora (Reinhold Rathe). Paul retired from John Deere.

Arlin was one of five sons of Ted and Bertha Wittenburg. His brothers are Delbert, Leo, Arlin, Glenn, and Elmer. I might add, five crazier characters would be hard to find. Arlin married Viola Traetow and they had two sons, James and Kendall, both deceased. Both served in Viet Nam, Kendall earning two Purple Hearts and a Bronze Star for valor. Viola is in the nursing home in Shell Rock. She recently celebrated her 95th birthday. Arlin and Viola farmed near Bremer. Viola said that Arlin was fortunate that the USS Oklahoma rolled over on the right side allowing his escape.

Arlin's picture is on the Freedom Rock in Readlyn along with Pearl Harbor ablaze. His cousin, David Wittenburg, was one of the Readlyn citizens instrumental in bringing the Freedom Rock to Readlyn.

Students also got to meet with many global leaders to learn more about their role in solving these problems.

To participate in this event, students had to write an essay about a barrier facing another country and discuss the possible ways in which they would go about solving it. Students start by presenting their ideas at their state institute and then may advance to the global level. At the Global Youth Institute, they were able to present their ideas to several global leaders and fellow students, as well as discuss others' ideas on a global level.

While at the three-day conference, students visited the Borlaug Dialogue and were able to listen to many key leaders in government and world hunger as well as able to engage with them in a question and answer session. Global Youth Institute to further develop their leadership skills participants were also able to go on various immersion sessions to gain hands-on experiences about different aspects of agriculture and policy. By attending this institute, all students are given the opportunity to sign up for a variety of internships

and become involved in the World Food Prize Organization as well as awarded with a \$1,000 scholarship from the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences at Iowa State University.







### "Outdoor Traditions"

As I sit down to write my column this month, I have come to the realization that I need a little more time on my article. I have also come to the realization that a lot of Readlyn area residents have discovered and read my article each month. I thank you all so much for reading my articles and so as I continue to work on my article, I have pulled up one of my favorite articles I've written and would like to share it with you this month.

It's hard to pinpoint exactly when my infatuation with the outdoors started, I do know it came at a very early age. I'm often told stories from my parents and family of times of pretending my wagon was a boat or my first word being Mississippi. I grew up idolizing my Dad and Grandpa Bob and my uncles with their outdoor experiences. I remember as a very young boy daydreaming of my outdoor adventures when I got older and could not wait to get started! My Dad started my fishing addiction at about three years old fishing for chubs in a local Creek. My Grandpa Bob helped fire the passion by paddling me around a local pond for hours because I wanted to troll rooster tails for bluegills. Some of my earliest memories are fishing that creek with my Dad and watching that red and white bobber, or waiting for the rod to load up while trolling, all the while dreaming of the day I could get my own baitcasting reel and start bass fishing. You see, my Uncle Rick had started bass fishing in a local club level and was teaching my dad everything he was learning fishing for bass in the local tournament scene. Naturally, my dad started to pass this knowledge on to me and it was on from there! I wanted to learn everything I could about bass and spent as much time as I could fishing the local pond and Maquoketa River. At seven years old, I caught a five pound largemouth out of the pond and I was completely hooked on bass fishing. I introduced friends to it and my team tournament partner to this day is Adam Farmer that I met in seventh grade. We

spent most of our time in the summers off of school fishing the Maquoketa, learning everything we could about smallmouth bass. Most of that knowledge we still use today in our tournaments on the Mississippi River.

As far as my love of hunting goes, that was also started at an early age. I remember shooting my suction cup bow and dreaming of hunting whitetails like my dad and uncles did. Hunting in my family has always been a strong tradition, my grandpa taught my dad about waterfowl and pheasant hunting. My Grandpa Bob taught my uncles pheasant hunting and deer hunting. My dad sort of went his own path bowhunting for whitetails and really learned it by the school of hard knocks. He often tells me of mistakes he made early on that he had to learn from. By the time I was old enough to bowhunt, he had learned from those mistakes and I didn't have to make so many early on in my bowhunting career. I also loved waterfowl and upland bird hunting. Dad passed on his waterfowl knowledge from his dad to me and I still remember every detail of my first duck, a green-winged teal. The smallest of waterfowl, I recall the shot. The duck was out a good forty yards, but after a lot of shooting over the summer, dad told me to try him. With a shot from my single shot twenty gauge the teal folded in the air! It fell in heavy cattails and dad was worried he wouldn't find it, he walked over and it was right on top! I still see the pride in his eyes as he retrieved my first duck! I'll never forget how proud he was of me that day and how excited I was! I also hunted a lot of upland birds such as pheasant and quail. I remember the early days of being the dog and crashing through the brush before I was old enough to carry a gun.


What I'm getting at with this week's article is that I was lucky to have a family with a strong outdoor tradition and all the passed down knowledge. From my mom driving me around to go hunting or fishing before I could drive, to dad, grandpa, and uncles often taking me hunting or

fishing. I always had that support behind me when it came to the outdoors. I'm almost certain it kept me out of trouble as a youth when all I could think about was being outdoors. Not all people have that behind them. There's many people out there that have interest in the outdoors but don't know how to take that first step. I try to pass my passion on wherever I can, from passing our family traditions down to my daughter, to passing it on to friends or anyone who shows an interest. What I'm saying is, be that person that invites a friend, neighbor, coworker, or the neighborhood kids that might not have someone to introduce them to the outdoors. Pass on your passion whether it be hunting, fishing, camping, or hiking and biking the great trail systems throughout the Cedar Valley. Offer to pass it on, some people may have interest

but are afraid to ask or don't know where to start. And if you're the person with interest in the outdoors, don't be afraid to ask someone you know. More than likely they will lend a hand to get you started. Also, do a Google search of clubs in our area such as Cedar Valley Bassmasters, Cedar Valley Walleye Club and Tuesday Night Bass Series. Also hunting clubs such as Blackhawk Archers or local chapters of Ducks Unlimited, National Wild Turkey Federation or Whitetails Unlimited. Most members of these clubs will gladly help get you started. Also most outdoor stores such as Hanks Live Bait and Tackle always welcome new people to the sport. 



# STO tax credits nearly gone News from the Iowa Alliance for Choice in Education

The School Tuition Organization Tax Credit program is a great way for taxpayers to help lower-income and working-class families afford the accredited, nonpublic school of their choice. Donors to an STO receive a 65% state income tax credit, and those funds are then used to give tuition grants to qualifying stu-

The STO program also saves the state money - as estimated by the Iowa Department of Revenue, the program pays for itself AND saves the state an additional \$12.5 million!

Each STO has only a certain number of tax credits available and as of November 15, 5 of the 12 School Tuition Organizations (STOs) have given out all their tax credits. We anticipate that all credits statewide will be exhausted well before the December 31, 2018 deadline, so you need to hurry!





### **Pearls of Wisdom**

### "Christmas with Jesus in the ICU"

The following story is taken from our family diary back in 1991. At the time, we lived in Carbondale, Illinois, while I was completing my graduate study in Telecommunications at Southern Illinois University. Our son Jonathan was scheduled for his second heart-bypass that early December, but his surgeon broke a finger at a golf tournament. That mishap delayed the surgery for a week. The surgeon told us that Jon would be discharged right before Christmas.

The surgery took place as scheduled and everything seemed to go as planned. After five days, they moved him to the floor. Then, out of the blue, he got the flu. We thought that the place was sanitized and all the medical staff was very cautious about things like that. But, it did happen, so they moved him back to the ICU. Christmas was now a few days away, and we started to bargain with the Lord: "Lord, we would like to celebrate Christmas at home. Please, give Jon a speedy recovery."

We thought that the Lord would not mind hearing a prayer like that. Meanwhile, we started to connect with few families around the ICU waiting area. We were all in the same boat and could easily connect by sharing stories about our sick children. The daughter of one African American lady fell down on an icy sidewalk and broke her femur. She happened to be a Southern Baptist and enjoyed talking about Jesus. She had the gift of encouragement and we thank the Lord for that

Another woman had a daughter who suffered from a viral infection of the heart. The doctors gave her a few months to live. If that were not bad enough, she just found out that her husband was having an affair with her close friend living down the block. He served her the divorce papers while their daughter was being admitted in the ICU. "Lord, this is inhuman," I said

to myself, as I listened to her story.

I was working in the computer lab one Wednesday afternoon when Cardinal Glennon Children's Hospital of St. Louis called in. It was Dr. Ruis, a pediatric cardiologist, who informed me that Jon stopped breathing during a minor procedure on the general floor. Therefore, they had to put him back to the ICU again.

Now Christmas was just two days away. So, we resigned to the fact that this would be a Christmas at the hospital. On the way to St. Louis, I started to unload on the Lord. "Lord, didn't you say that you would never leave nor forsake your people? Look at us, spending Christmas at the hospital of all places! Far away from families and friends on Christmas! Were we more sinful than others to deserve this Lord?" I could vividly remember hearing the echo of my prayers!

Jesus answered our prayer, "You will spend time with other families in the ICU." That Christmas morning, the lady with a dying daughter was waiting for me to pray with her. Another family from Illinois was pretty depressed and needed encouragement. The ICU families huddled together and encouraged one another that Christmas. Looking back, Jesus was in our midst.

God taught me through that adversity that Jesus did not come to a happy perfect world, but a sin-sick world; a world plagued with suffering and pain, flawed with greed and indifference. Christmas is not about food, drink, and getting stuff. It is about God's Son becoming one of us, living our harsh condition, giving special meaning and purpose to our life. Christmas is not always a happy holy-day for those who lost loved ones or job or health or relationship. Christ comes to them as well in their grief, loneliness, brokenness, and depression. Thick or thin, Jesus is God with us, our Emmanuel. May you experience his saving presence this Christmas! Pastor Jean Rabary
