Eligible voters of Bremer County will p.m. Voting in Readlyn will take place head to the polls for the 2025 City/School Election on Tuesday, November 4, 2025. Polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00

at the Readlyn Community Library, 309 Main St.

All ballots will contain school offices.

Ballots for voters residing inside the corporate limits of Readlyn will contain city offices in addition to school offices

Candidates for the City of Readlyn include Dan Wedemeier for Mayor and Joseph Jones and Keith Brunscheon for City Council (vote for two).

School Board candidates for the Wapsie Valley Community School District include Director District 2 At Large -Scott Broten Jr., Director District 3 At Large - Angela Auel, and Director District 5 At Large - Amy Becker.

Any voter who is physically unable to enter a polling place has the right to vote in the voter's vehicle. For further information, contact the Bremer County Auditor's Office at 319-352-0340 or e-mail swolf@co.bremer.ia.us. For TTY access, dial 711 + 319-352-0340.

Any voter who requires assistance to vote by reason of blindness, disability or inability to read or write may be given assistance by a person of the voter's choice, other than the voter's employer or agent of that employer or officer or agent of the voter's union.

Pre-registered voters are required to provide an approved form of identification at the polling place before receiving and casting a regular ballot. Voters who are not pre-registered – such as voters registering to vote on election day – and vot-

ers changing precincts must also provide proof of residence.

DON'T FORGET TO

A voter who is unable to provide an approved form of identification (or prove residence if required) 1) may have the voter's identity/residence attested to by another registered voter in the precinct, 2) prove identity and residence using Election Day Registration documents, or 3) cast a provisional ballot and provide proof of identity/residence at the county auditor's office by 12 noon on Monday, November 10, 2025. Election Day Registrant attesters must provide an approved form of identification. The University of Northern Iowa's GOLD & Bold awards recognize the accomplishments of three outstanding young alumni every year. This year, the university is recognizing Grant Helle, '19, Juana Hollingsworth, '16, and Sarah Huebner, '16 as the 2025 award recipients.

Sarah Huebner of Readlyn is a 2016 graduate of UNI, where she earned her

degree in Ecology, Evolution, and Organismal Biology. Now a Wildlife Ecologist with the Smithsonian Institution, Sarah leads the creation of its born-digital wildlife collection, built entirely from camera trap imagery. Based at

the National Zoo and Conservation Biology Institute, she curates Smithsonian WILD—a free, open-access archive of expertly labeled wildlife images designed to support research, artificial intelligence development, and global conservation ef-

Her work bridges science, technology, policy, and public engagement, making conservation data widely accessible and actionable. She draws on deep field experience, including studies of lions and elephants in South Africa, and a strong record of collaborative science. While earning her Ph.D. in Wildlife Ecology and Management at the University of Minnesota, she co-founded Snapshot Safari, a camera trap network spanning six African countries, and helped launch the Labeled Image Library of Alexandria (LILA), a public image database supporting machine learning and species identification.

Across all of her work, Sarah is committed to building inclusive, data-rich tools that help people and wildlife thrive together. She remains actively connected to UNI through guest lectures, student engagement, and citizen science, living out the university's mission by making science accessible, impactful, and inclusive.

Sarah is a graduate of Community Lutheran School and Wapsie Valley schools.

Can you believe we've (almost) reached November? November is my favorite month of the year as with November comes the best whitetail deer bowhunting of the season. And, as you read this, if it's daylight outside, you can bet the farm I'm in a tree stand filming hunts for my daughter, Delana, and my YouTube channel, The EDJ Whitetails. As my mind is 100% on whitetail deer right now, I'm not going to talk about them this month. What I am going to talk about is NNPBS.

Many of you might not realize this, but the largest team bass tournament series in the upper Midwest actually holds an address right here in good ol' Readlyn, Iowa, owned by Eric and Aubrey Johnston. This month, I'm going to take you through our championship weekend that happened October 11 - 12, 2025.

NNPBS is No Nonsense Prairie Bass Series LLC. Co-founded by Eric Johnston and Adam Farmer in 2021, what started as an idea over some beverages between two lifelong friends has grown in five short seasons to the largest team bass tournament series in the upper Midwest housed on the Mississippi River in Prairie du Chien, Wisconsin. After a decade of running club tournaments together and feeling as though our hands were tied, not having the ability to utilize ideas and ways to make tournaments we operated better due to club voting etc., we decided to form NNPBS and own and operate it our way.

In the beginning stages, we thought if one day we built the series to 30 boats participating in each tournament we would be doing well. In April 2021, we held our first tournament hosting 46 teams, tournament two in May held 72 and we've never had fewer teams since, each tournament.

Now averaging 88 teams per regular season event through five seasons, we've had our hands full. Our wives soon joined our team as they could see we were a touch in over our heads with the extremely quick success. To put things in perspective, the 2nd largest attendance tournament behind us during regular season events currently averages 26 teams. We have been perpetually humbled and honored to host these anglers each year.

The premise of the game is we host five regular season tournaments each year. Tournaments are one day, anglers fish from 6 a.m. to 2 p.m. and catch their best five bass for the day and hold them in their boat's livewell. At 2 p.m., we broadcast the weigh-in on our Facebook page and teams are scored by the total weight of their five bass. Bass are then held in a release boat tank owned by Ritter's Fish Market and released in DNR-approved locations on the river.

Each team pays an entry fee and we pay out 90% of all entry money brought in back to the anglers out to the top ten. On a typical regular season tournament, the winning team will take home around \$3,000 and plaques for their winnings. Throughout the five regular season events, we score teams with points earned at each event. The top 20 in yearly points qualify for our season ending championship, the No Nonsense Prairie Bass Series Classic, along with crowning our "Team of the Year" for finishing first in overall season points. We also host a "Wildcard"

tournament where the top five finishers in the Wildcard advance to the classic.

This year, we hosted our classic October 11 and 12 in Prairie du Chien. We start each classic weekend with a Friday evening dinner for our qualifying anglers. This year, our dinner was at the Duck Inn Lodge in Prairie du Chien. Anglers were treated to beverages, smoked pork sandwiches with sides, and a gift to each angler for qualifying, all courtesy of NN-PBS. The Duck Inn Lodge is a very cool facility and we can't thank the Cejka family enough for allowing us to host the dinner there. Also, a big thank you to Mike Taylor and Nicole Zitzner for preparing our dinner. Anglers at the dinner enjoyed time with fellow competitors telling fish stories and laughing. During the dinner, we announced special rules for the classic and give a State of NNPBS rundown for the year and look ahead to the next. This year's announcements were big in the future of our series. Adam relayed to me early in the 2025 season he would like to step away, and we made this announcement to our anglers. We also introduced the new faces that will step in to help take care of the duties Adam held. It was very emotional for me as we are brothers and it'll be very different without Adam around, but as I announced to our anglers, NNPBS will always be founded by Eric Johnston and Adam Farmer and my goal is to make Adam proud of the future of NNPBS.

With the conclusion of the meeting, we prepared for day one of the classic. Day one launched out of Genoa, Wisconsin, and anglers were allowed to fish pool 9 of the Mississippi and weigh at 2 p.m. After the day one weigh-in, Mike Brueggen and Clayton Weber led the tournament with five bass weighing 16.83 pounds. The weather Saturday was cool and windy with little sunshine which kept weights on the lower side. The battle was close as the gap between 1st and 10th place was a mere 2.33 pounds.


Day two dawned with much different conditions, as it was cloudy and windy, but much warmer. Day two of the classic was held right in Prairie du Chien and anglers could fish pool 10 only. The combined weight for two days would be the angler's score for the weekend. After leading day one, Mike and Clayton were the team everyone was chasing and they certainly rose to the challenge, bringing a five-fish bag to the scale of 17.77 pounds and securing the victory as they had the best weight day two as well! For their championship, Mike Brueggen and Clayton Weber took home two trophies, an \$8,000 check from NNPBS and sponsors, and an additional \$8,000 from Nitro Boats in contingency program money totaling a \$16,000 payday on a no-entry tournament from NNPBS.

It's hard to believe what Adam, Aubrey, Monica, and I have built over these last five seasons! Now Aubrey and I intend to take it even further in the future and make Adam proud!! Congratulations once again to Mike Brueggen and Clayton Weber for their win! Also a special shout-out to Michael Gearhart for all his help with us over the years and Grace Schmadeke for her help this past season! School Board Elections

In November, the Wapsie Valley School Board will be holding elections for 3 board positions. District 2 (Brent Sauerbrei-will not be rerunning), District 3 (Angie Auelis rerunning), and District 5 (Jeannie Wolfe-will not be rerunning) are up for reelection. PLEASE NOTE: You do NOT have to be from a specific district to vote for the candidates. You may vote for any candidate in any district. It does not matter which district you live in when voting.

Tuesday, November 4, 2025: School Election Day. Polls are open from 7 a.m.

Iowa School Performance Profiles

Each school in Iowa receives an overall score based on its performance on accountability measures. Schools also receive a score for each group of students, such as students with disabilities (student groups must have 20 or more students to receive a score). The measures are:

- · Chronic Absenteeism and Attendance Growth: This includes two indicators: o Chronic Absenteeism: The percent of students who miss 10 percent or more of school days for any reason, excused or unexcused - for vacation, health conditions, suspensions, etc.
- English Language Growth (ELPA21): For students whose first language is not English, this measures a student's progress in obtaining English language proficiency across the domains of reading, writing, listening and speaking. This measure is based on Iowa's English language proficiency assessments, ELPA21 and the Alt ELPA.
- Graduation Rate (High Schools): The percent of students who graduate from

high school within four or five years.

- Growth: This examines student growth by looking at assessment scores over time to determine whether a student performed better or worse than their academic peers (students at the same grade level with similar scores).
- Participation Rate: The percent of students who participate in state assessments. While this indicator doesn't directly impact school accountability scores, low participation does impact the Proficiency indicator and school rating categories.
- Postsecondary Readiness (High Schools): This includes two indicators:
- -The percent of students earning college credit while in high school.
- -The percent of students participating in work-based learning while in high school.
- Proficiency: The percent of students in a school who are proficient in English language arts (ELA), math and science based on assessment results.

The rankings that are given to schools are: Exceptional, High Performing, Commendable, Acceptable, Needs Improvement, and Priority. Exceptional is the highest ranking while priority is the lowest.

I am happy to report that the Wapsie Valley School District, as a whole, received rankings that were higher than any other year previously. Fairbank Elementary, the Junior High/High School, and our rural buildings have all been labeled as 'Commendable' (deserving of positive recognition due to its merit or virtue). Readlyn Elementary has been labeled 'High Performing' (consistently achieving outstanding outcomes). All of these rankings are outstanding accomplishments on behalf of our students, staff, families, and community! Congratulations to all!

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


