
Wilbert Huebner's 100th birthday!

At right, Huebner's yard was decorated with "good wishes" signs and an antique John Deere tractor.







Wilbert Huebner, Centenarian: Excerpts From His Life

Wilbert Huebner was born April 17, 1921. He turned 100 days ago.

His parents both came from huge families — Wilbert had over 100 first cousins. There were two older sisters, Norma, who married Arnold Otto, and Elda, who married someone from Waterloo. His two brothers, Arnold and Orval, along with Wilbert graduated from Readlyn High School. In 1935 most farm boys did not attend high school. His Dad told Arnold and Wilbert they could go to high school but farm work came first. Wilbert missed a lot of school.

In high school, Wilbert was a starter on the 1938 basketball team. The main members of the team in 1938 were Lester "Red" Diekmann, Bud Rommel, Wilbert Kroblin, Ozzie Wittenburg, Wilbert Huebner, and Melvin "Mickey" Richmann. This story is from the February 26,1938 edition of The Readlyn Chronicle.

The Readlyn High School boys' basketball team won the sectional basketball tournament and advanced to the district tournament at Iowa State Teachers College gym in Cedar Falls where they met Rudd March 3. They lost to Rudd.

Red Diekmann had the exceptional record of not having a foul called on him in three games. It is remarkable as an average of 23 fouls were called each game. The Readlyn fans are a loyal bunch and turned out in big numbers for each game. In the Denver game, Lester Diekmann and Wilbert Hueber made all the free throws they were given. Wilbert had 4 and Lester 3.

When Bud Rommel made the last basket in the Denver game which gave Readlyn a five-point lead with two minutes to go, Coach Kenny Werner heaved a sigh of relief that sounded like the timer's horn.

K.0. Becker and Oscar Thran have voices that certainly do carry. The last report is that some of the Denver fans were looking for Kermit (Becker).

Although I was only 9 years old, I attended some of the games. Exciting time in Readlyn.

Huebner Family's First Automobile

What a thrill it must have been, a family buying their first automobile. A complete change-instant transportation-no more hitching and unhitching their team. A piece of cake!

Not quite! Cars had no starters, the driver had to learn how to master the crank.

Wilbert Huebner's family bought a new Model T in 1916, three years before Wilbert was born. It cost \$300. It came equipped with four wheels, an engine, a roof, a windshield, and windshield wipers the driver operated by hand and a crank.

No side windows or rear window, only hanging curtains. A Model T had no starter or generator.

Whenever someone drove the Model T, the automobile had to be cranked to start it. The person using the crank dare not place his thumb around the crank handle for, if the engine would backfire, the crank would spin backwards, breaking a thumb or an arm. In cold weather, Wilbert said the engine would be too stiff to tum with a crank. They would jack up one rear wheel and tum the wheel back and forth, to loosen the engine for easier cranking.

In The Coast Guard

Wilbert Huebner enlisted in the Coast Guard one month after the Pearl Harbor attack December 7, 1941.

At first, he patrolled southern beaches at night on foot, later on horseback. Then he was assigned duty on a destroyer, protect-

ing convoys of 90 to 110 merchant vessels crossing the Atlantic. Twenty-two trips!

Dodging German u-boats and repelling German planes in the Mediterranean Sea was a challenge. Wilbert was discharged February 28, 1946.

Returning from WWII

On reentering civilian life after being discharged following WWII, Wilbert Huebner and Paul Tiedt, Readlyn's last two surviving World War II veterans, had a similar experience.

They received discharges well after the end of the war. Most veterans were home. When they left home to enter the service they both had girlfriends who would wait for them until after the war. After a period of time they both received "Dear John" letters.

Wilbert said, "At first the letters came regularly, then less frequently until one said, 'I don't love you anymore'." Wilbert's reaction was, "I don't blame her. She

didn't know when I would come home or if I would come home. The war could last another ten years."

Wilbert said, "Returning home was difficult because, after years of being away, you wanted to find someone. Those you knew previously were taken. I had no idea who was available. With dating, I had to start over."

Wilbert was 27 when he married Irene Schroeder on October 26, 1947.

Paul Tiedt stated the same. He had to start over. He did find Marrillee Nerge. When they married, Marrillee was 16 and Paul was seven days short of his 24th birthday.

Readlyn residents were treated to an official visit from the Easter Bunny on Saturday, April 12, at 4 PM.



Judy passed away from cancer in December 9, 1997.

Lester passed away on October 27, 1981. Ruth moved into Tripoli off of the family farm. She attended Hawkeye Community College in 1982 and 1983 taking floral design classes. She worked for the Blumenhaus Floral and Gifts in Tripoli and several other floral shops in the area like Kathryn's Floral and Gifts, in Denver; the Wild Rose in Sumner and Dawn's Floral and Gifts in Readlyn. She was also chairperson helping with the Tripoli parades for many years and she participated in the Tripoli Boosters variety show as an Elderberry for many years.

Ruth married Edwin Steinbronn on September 12, 1987 and she moved to rural Readlyn where she and Edwin farmed for 4 years. They moved into Readlyn in 1991 off of Edwin's family farm. Edwin had five sons and one daughter. One of his sons passed away in an auto/deer accident in 1999. Edwin and Ruth were active members of Klinger Immanuel Lutheran Church, rural Readlyn. She was active in Ladies Aid. Ruth served on the Bremer County Dairy Board and was the Bremer County queen candidates' chaperone. She was past secretary of LWML zone. Edwin and Ruth enjoyed traveling together to Branson, Hawaii, Albuquerque, Illinois, Indiana, New York, Germany and Norway. Both were active in the Luren Singers and Ruth served as past secretary for the Luren Auxiliary of Decorah. Edwin passed away July 1, 2004. Ruth moved into her condo in 2005. She was also chairperson helping with the Readlyn parade for many years; active in the community club and received an award for volunteer of the year in 2012 from the city senior citizens and Merry

Elders groups. She was the former queen mother of the Red Hat Gems red hat group and was voted the Readlyn Grump in 2002. She led the dancing granny's exercise class every Tuesday morning for 7-1/2 years. Ruth enjoyed playing in numerous card clubs, eight to be exact, and going to dances. She loved spending time with her grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

On February 24, 2015, Ruth had a stroke and was hospitalized. She was later brought to NorthCrest for some rehab for six weeks. She returned to her home again in March 2015 until December 18, 2015. On December 22, 2015, she ended up in NorthCrest for rehab again, only not to be able to go home again as she needed 24-hour care.



The Month of May

It's the end of April and one of my favorite months of the year is finally upon us! No, I'm not talking about my favorite month of the year, Sweet November and the Whitetail bowhunting that I love so much, but May ranks right up there with it! This month's article I'm going to talk about some of the great outdoor activities you can get outdoors to experience in the month of May!

The month of May for me means four things: turkey hunting, great fishing, mushroom hunting, and we are finally out of winter's grip! Early on in May, to about mid-month, I'm usually dedicating my time to chasing our great population of turkeys! We are fortunate enough to live in an area that has a very healthy population of Eastern Wild Turkeys and, if the Wapsi River behaves itself in the spring, plenty of area to hunt them. As you've read in articles past, I love turkey hunting and early-May to the end of the season, around mid-May, can be a very productive time to harvest a big spring gobbler!

May is Iowa's fourth and final turkey season of the spring. Seasons one through three, while exciting in their own right, can be very inconsistent as birds can be what we call "henned-up." What I mean by that is a gobbler can get with a group of hens and stay with them for as long as a week or two. Henned-up toms can be frustrating to hunt as it's extremely difficult to pull one away from the group. Add in the inconsistent weather April brings, and those earlier seasons can, at times, be difficult.

What I love about fourth season is a hen's priority starts to become nesting. By May, a hen will fly down from her roost and immediately go to her nest of eggs and stay there all day. This leaves the toms lonely and looking for the final hens of the spring breeding season. A hunter can capitalize on this.

While the birds have seen pressure from hunters through the first three seasons, oftentimes they forget about that in desperation for that last hen. The other bonus to May turkey hunting is warmer temps and not having to bundle up. In May, I like to move a lot, calling and trying to get a turkey to gobble back to my calling. When you get one to gobble, set up as fast as you can, as a lot of times he's coming to you after that first gobble. This time of year I prefer to not use a turkey decoy. Usually

in May, the timber's undergrowth has had a chance to grow up and become thick. In that thick vegetation, I like to make a gobbler look for me and my calling to produce a close shot. Use this "run and gun" technique to bag a fourth season gobbler.

Also, May produces my favorite meals of the year, morel mushrooms! By May, temperatures have brought the soil temps to the mid 50s and, with a little moisture, that's the perfect recipe to get them mushrooms popping!

I always direct my attention to finding dead elm trees to find my mushrooms. If I can find an elm tree that recently died and the bark is just starting to peel, it's usually game on to find them. Now, not all elm trees produce morels, but those are the trees I look for to narrow down my search in the timber. I wish I could figure out the exact recipe of what trees produce over the others, but I haven't figured that exact science out over 30 years of hunting morels!

My favorite way to prepare them is a little seasoned flour and pan-fried in butter. There are many ways folks prepare them, but I stick to the classic way of eating them. In recent years, my daughter has discovered she loves them as much as I do, so it's great to have that extra set of eyes while hunting!

The other passion of mine that is great in the month of May is fishing! My bass tournament season usually starts in May, bringing the excitement that I have with that, but May also triggers the spawn in most fish and, along with that, comes great fishing. The water in our area lakes, rivers, and ponds are warming up and with that the fish come shallow to begin their spawning rituals.

As the fish come shallow and prepare to spawn they go on the feed and become easier to catch. Bass, bluegill, and crappies are the primary May spawners. So, the opportunities for many species of fish exist and the warmer May temperatures make it a more enjoyable experience to be on the water

As we head into May and we get away from a virus I'd rather not mention, the outdoor opportunities are plentiful! Get out there, bag that gobbler, find them mushrooms, catch some fish, and enjoy it all with friends and family because after all, that's what it's all about! Until next time, in the month of May GET OUT-DOORS!






