Each tree is individually tagged and sized with the price for your convenience. The selection of fresh wreaths, roping, swags, door arches, mailbox covers, crosses, and bough bundles will also be available. Maps of the tree farm and saws are provided, plus there will be helpers to help carry your tree.

Moulds said, "We are anxious to seeing our former customers and friends and look forward to meeting new ones. Your safety will be our first concern, but your family will still be able to have a fun and memorable experience as you find the perfect tree and holiday trimmings.'

Hello Readlyn! November has been an interesting month, and I'm glad you're here to read about it.



First off, we were able to continue our



Memories of the railroad in Readlyn

The Depot

The depot was located at the very south end of Main Street in Readlyn. It had three big rooms. The east room was the waiting room. Benches were at the sides. Seats were separated by armrests. In the northeast corner there was a window to the middle room, the depot agent's office. Here the business of the railway was transacted. Tickets were bought at the window and telegrams were sent. The depot agent used Morse code to transmit telegraphs. The south part of this room was extended out several feet so that the agent had a better view of the track in both directions.

The west room was a storeroom where freight was stored before being shipped out. Railway carts were available for loading and unloading. These carts had high wheels to make the bed of the cart level with the floor of the from his last position in Oelwein. train car. Incoming freight was stored

The depot stood empty for several years after the rail line was abandoned until Leo Wittenburg, who owned the stockyard business nearby, tore it down. The only physical remnant of the Readlyn depot is the sign,

"Readlyn," now in the Readlyn Historical building The sign was from one of the ends of the station. I can only imagine the activity in the depot in the early 1900s when everything was shipped in and out by rail. There were few automobiles. Communication by telegraph was the urgent method of communication for industry and business. The last depot agent in Readlyn was Duane Tobey. He was retained by the purchaser and, after assignments in Fort Dodge, Waterloo, etc., he retired

lyn came in the morning. Bill's cart was often piled high with bags of mail and packages, many containing items ordered from the Sears-Roebuck and Montgomery-Ward catalogs. Most every family had one or both of these catalogs. Much merchandise was ordered by mail. Evening mail was lighter. The Waterloo Courier came in the evening mail. The evening paper was loaded in Waverly, brought there from Waterloo by the WCF&N.

Two people rode in the mail car. Their job was to sort the mail picked up along the way. I could find no pictures of the

sort through your old photos, a picture of the dinky might be found.



The dinky was a combination mail and passenger train that operated between Oelwein and Clarion, Iowa. There were two other trains pulled by a gasoline engine in Iowa called dinky, one near Ames. The entire train consisted of the engine and two cars, a passenger car and a mail car. The train engine was gas-operated. Each day, the train came out of Oelwein and arrived in Readlyn at approximately 9:20 a.m. Bill Seeman, with his two-wheeled pushcart, would be waiting with the outgoing mail and then take the incoming mail to the post office. The dinky would travel west to Clarion where it was turned around. Around 5:30 p.m., the dinky would return to Readlyn. Bill Seeman would again be waiting with the outgoing mail. Bill did not have to go far to work. The Seeman home was directly across from the Readlyn Savings Bank on Main Street.

Riding The Dinky

I don't know why we always called the little train "the dinky." I never heard it called anything else.

In 1936, when I was fourteen, I started taking the dinky to Waverly. My best friend, Betty Bowdish, had just moved to Waverly from Readlyn. I would take the train to Waverly at 9 a.m. and return at about 6 p.m. Sometimes on summer vacations I would stay a week. You could always hear the dinky coming 5 or 10 minutes before it got there because of its distinctive hooting whistle.

It was very comfortable, really deluxe. There were big, overstuffed easy chairs of red and green velvet scattered about. There was a cute little restroom. Everything was very clean. I think I was always the only passenger. It cost 25 cents.

All of my life in Readlyn, I knew when to get the mail. When I heard the dinky whistle, I'd hop on my bike and, by the time I got to the post office, the cart with mail would be there, hand pushed.


Thinking about the dinky brings back very happy memories.

Marlys is the daughter of Art and Melinda Matthias Miller. Darlene Schiller, Norene, Roald "Bud" and James were others in her family. Norene, Bud and James, following their mother, dedicated their lives to the Jehovah's Witness religion.



Bud Miller, Vernon Stumme, my sister, Carol, Iris June Freitag, Marian Moeller, and I, along with others, rode the Dinky to Waverly to swim. Two nickel hamburgers and a dime malt cost 20 cents, swimming a dime, and the fare on the Dinky 27 cents, for a total of 67 cents. Today we are amazed at these figures. The United States was not yet out of the depression. It took a while for us to accumulate 67 cents. We seldom asked our parents for money. I dug worms for my uncle Harold, 10 cents for a hundred worms. We saved for quite a while to make this trip. Finding a penny or someone giving us a penny would make us happy. Riding the Dinky to Waverly was for us a thrill, especially riding over Crane Creek.

Reiny Freitag and a few of his buddies, Wayne and Dale Kuethe, Glenn, AI, and Erv Fortsch, along with Norman Seeman and others, also rode the dinky to Waverly to swim. Reiny remarked that the hamburgers at Roy's were greasy, but delicious. They were not fried on a skillet. Meat was rolled into a ball and thrown into a huge container of grease, then ladled out and flattened. 5 cents! Eggs at Roy's were also not fried. They were broken into the grease then fished out. Roy's was a popular place to eat.





"Patterns and Game Plans"

What a fantastic hunting season in 2020 I've had this far! Waterfowl hunting has been good, I have gotten out after some pheasants, but what has had me fired up all fall is chasing whitetails with my PSE bow and Traditions Muzzleloader.

I have really gotten into pursuing a couple specific bucks, and that has made the challenge and strategy of my hunts so fun. This month I will go over some of the patterns and game plans I've used to help me harvest a great buck during early muzzleloader season in October.

This story actually begins all the way back to last March. As I've stated before, whitetail deer hunting is a year-round process for me. I had been given permission to hunt some ground close to home, and was so excited. For years I had traveled a lot to deer hunt and it's so great to be able to hunt and be back home in minutes.

I started scouting the properties right away and even put out trail cameras in the spring just to get a gauge on how many deer were in the area. While I didn't find any shed antlers, I had found a lot of signs (rubs, scrapes, trails, etc.) and many very big tracks throughout the property. After a few scouting trips I had everything narrowed down to what I thought to be the most high percentage areas on the property and planned to have up four tree-stands throughout the property.

As the year progressed, I eagerly awaited when the bucks in the area would begin their antler growth. By mid-June they started to take shape as to what they would become. As we got into July, I had two bucks that I decided I wanted to specifically hunt. They were both eight-pointers and one was very wide racked and the other was very tall. As summer wore on, I scouted lightly from a distance, watching the beanfields from the truck with binoculars. I saw both of them frequently and had a good idea through the trail camera pictures and glassing the fields, where they were bedding and feeding.

When October 1 finally arrived (Iowa's bow season opener), I was ready in between where the bedding area was and where they were feeding. I set-up close to the bedding area, but not too close as to

bump them out before they got up to feed in the evening.

The first few hunts of the season yielded a lot of deer sightings and encounters with smaller bucks, but I had not seen either of the bucks I was after. As you might remember, early fall was very dry here and some of the little ponds along the river bottom had begun to dry up and new growth started to sprout out of these pond beds. I started to notice quite a few sets of deer tracks around these pond beds. I decided it was time to set up a new strategy and target these little ponds as food sources for the deer. The beanfields had dried up and had started to be harvested. The new growth in the pond was succulent to the deer and suddenly nature had made several food plots throughout the timber.

I moved a stand that put me between a bedding area, and one of the bigger ponds. I also put up a camera watching the pond. After a day or two, I checked the camera and, to my surprise, the tall-tined eightpoint had proved my hunch right as I had pictures of him feeding in there in the evenings. My next chance to hunt would be Early Muzzleloader and I was excited as I felt I had a real good opportunity to get the buck with this new-found pattern he was on.

I wasn't able to get out to hunt until Monday after work. As I got to the timber, as usual I felt like I was running behind. I parked my four wheeler further from the timber than usual to try not to spook deer that may already be on their feet. I loaded the muzzleloader and checked the time. It was 4:30 and I was definitely late. I eased up to the edge of the timber and very quietly made my way to the stand. This evening there was no wind and it was as though you could hear a pin drop in the timber. I cringed with every step as I walked in the dry leaves.

As I neared the stand, I looked to my right toward the pond and there was a deer feeding in it. I looked with my binoculars and it was the tall-tined eight-pointer feeding along the back edge of the pond. This hunt suddenly became a stalk and I kept thinking there's no way he's not going to hear me trying to sneak up on him. At this time he was about 150 yards out



and I wanted to preferably cut that distance in half. I carefully sneaked through the woods, watching each step and trying my hardest to sound like another deer. In this area there's an old lane leading into it and I knew, if I could get to that lane without spooking him, I was golden.

I made it up to the lane which was packed dirt with no leaves on it, so I could move quickly and quietly closer to him. I made it to within 75 yards of him and found a tree to prop my gun in. All this time he just fed throughout the pond. I readied my Traditions Muzzleloader and settled the crosshairs of the scope. My heart was racing and I took a second to calm down before I squeezed off a shot. As the smoke cleared, the buck hunched

up almost as it had been a bad shot.

"What did I do?" I thought. But it wasn't a bad hit, the buck walked slowly up the pond edge, fell over, and was done in a matter of thirty seconds. I was so excited over how it all played out. I looked at my watch and it was 4:55 — all that only took 25 minutes. As I walked up to the buck I was humbled as the pursuit on him had ended, but so excited to target, pursue, and close the deal on such a beautiful buck!

Before I go this month, I just want to say thank-you to the two family landowners that were gracious enough to allow me to do this on their lands and the friendships we've formed. I truly can't thank you enough!


