

Young maiden is awestruck with hero. In last scene, a tender farewell, the hero rides off into the sunset without looking back, damsel waving. We cheered and clapped at the end of the movie. Another fun Wednesday night.

What I remember about the early movies in Readlyn goes back 80 years or so. The first years, the shows were put on by a Warneke. Then, for several years, Paul and Rose Good from Arlington brought movies to town. Wouldn't you know, in later years my wife's brother, Alan Wescott, would marry their daughter.

Structure

The outdoor area, with cinders covering the ground to avoid mud, was located where the community building was erected. At that time, it was between the old bank building and the tavern owned by Bob's father, Oscar "Butch" Thran. It had a high back fence, but a much more elaborate front. The front structure was also about 10 or 12 feet high and had a ticket window and an entrance gate. There was an elevated bandstand and a projection booth. Seating was planks on sawhorses. The seating was three rows across with two aisles and was about 15 or 20 rows in length. Seating was for maybe 300 and was usually filled Yes, seats were hard with no backs, but we didn't mind.

Movie Night

Because we had to wait for nearly dark, movies started rather late. As I remember the high school band played for maybe an hour or so before the movie started. Finally it was about time, so we would buy our 10 cent ticket and go in. Movies began with a comedy cartoon, then a chapter of a continuing serial and in the early '40s some World War battle scenes. Then the movie. Many of the movies would be westerns or maybe mysteries or adventure types. I would say our favorites were the westerns. Who wouldn't like the westerns when you had heroes that I remember like: (See if you ever heard of or remember these) Buck Jones--Hoot Gibson--Johnny Mack Brown--Ken Maynard--Tim Mc-Coy--Tim Holt--Buster Crabbe--Zorro--Rocky Lane--Hopalong Cassidy--Rex Allen--Monte Halle and Wild Bill Elliot.

Other heroes--Tom Mix and his horse, Tony--The Cisco Kid and Pancho--Red Ryder and Little Beaver--Gene Autry and his horse, Champion. Also, Frog and Little Frog--Roy Rogers and Dale Evan (Lutherans), horse Trigger, also Gabby Hayes--Lone Ranger and Tonto, horses Silver and Scout-- Lash Larue and his whip.

Oh yes, halfway through the movie reels would be changed and there would be a drawing, \$3, \$2, and 5 \$1 winners.

many years owned the Los Angeles Angels Baseball team. He made over 300 movies, wrote and introduced many songs such as "Rudolph the Red-nosed Reindeer." He demanded more payment per picture, an excessive amount the movie studio was willing to pay. The studio countered by creating a new hero,

> Roy Rogers. Roy was plucked from the popular western vocal group, 'Sons of the Pioneer," was promoted into stardom and later became more popular than Gene Autry. He met Dale Evans on location in a film in which they were cast together. Dale Evans was an actress, singer, author and songwriter. Their marriage was a team both off and on screen. Roy and Dale along with Roy's horse, Trigger, were immensely popular on ra

deed stars in the entertainment field but were even more outstanding as human beings. Their marriage brought together five children from their previous marriages. They had a child, Robin Elizabeth, born with Down's Syndrome who died at age two from complications of mumps. Dale Evans wrote a bestseller book "Angel Unaware" about Robin to change public perception of children with developmental difficulties.

She wrote a total of seventeen books primarily dealing with Christian faith.

To ease the pain of the loss of Robin, Roy and Dale adopted a Korean girl, Debbie. Debbie was killed at age 19 in a bus accident while on a church group outing. Roy and Dale adopted three daughters, Mimi, Dodie and Debbie, and one son, some with handicaps. In addition, they also provided for foster children in their home.

Dale wrote many Christian children's stories, one whose title was "The Bible Tells Me So." Dale also taught Sunday School. She appeared on many programs with religious topics. She was involved with Billy Graham on his TV Christian Crusades. Dale was outspoken in her Christianity, telling that God would help them in their troubles.

Roy Rogers appeared in more than 100 films, always with his horse, Trigger. Dale Evans co-starred in many films with her horse, Buttercup.

Many of the citizens of the Readlyn-Denver communities would be especially proud of Roy Rogers and Dale Evans for this reason--they were members of the Lutheran Church.



Our Fine Arts Boosters continue to support the programming within the music and band areas.


The contributors to the FFA Test Plot advance the agricultural knowledge base of our students.





Homestead Tax Credit, Military Exemption due by July 1

The Bremer County Assessor's office would like to remind property owners to sign up for the Homestead Tax Credit if you have purchased or built a new home within the last 12 months. To qualify for the credit you must own and occupy the property as a homestead on July 1 of each year, declare residency in Iowa for income tax purposes and occupy the property for at least six months each year. Once

The Bremer County Assessor's office a property owner qualifies for the credit, ould like to remind property owners to gn up for the Homestead Tax Credit if bu have purchased or built a new home Please refer to Iowa Code, Chapter 425.

Property owners may be eligible for a Military Exemption if you are a resident of Iowa, have been involved in full-time active duty during a war or conflict, or served 18 months active duty and have been honorably discharged. (The original or a certified copy of the DD214 must be recorded in the Bremer County Recorder's office by July 1 the year exemption is first claimed. Your DD 214 needs to show release from active duty during a qualified time for other than training purposes.) Surviving spouses remain eligible for the exemption as long as they do not remarry and exemption continues until the property owner is no longer eligible. Please refer to Iowa Code, Chapter 427.

Filing deadline for the Homestead Tax Credit & Military Exemption for the 2021 valuation is July 1, 2021. (After July 1 all applications would be considered for the following year.) Property owners may apply in the Bremer County Assessor's office 8-4:30, Monday–Friday or online at https://beacon.schneidercorp.com. For any questions please call 319-352-0145.

"Turkey Season Recap" ejohnston@mossyoakprostaff.com

The alarm startled me out of a sound sleep, as I sat up I thought "here comes another day of work." I have been putting in so many hours at work I had forgotten what day it was. It took me a second to realize I had a day off and it was Opening day of Iowa's second season turkey! I was instantly wide awake as the thought popped in my head. I had everything ready to go the night before and it didn't take long to get on the road! I barely had time for a few sips of hot coffee and I was at the entrance to the little lane to access where I would be hunting. As I eased down the lane in the darkness an owl flew down out of a tree right in front of the hood of my truck. Any sleepiness that was left had now exited the building! As I neared the timber I shut off the headlights to not "shine" the timber and spook any roosted turkeys. I quietly exited the truck, slid on my turkey hunting vest, grabbed a few shells and quietly loaded my shotgun. Being short on time this season, I elected to gun hunt for turkeys this year and forgo the bowhunting until deer season. As I left the truck the woods were dead calm, with every step I felt as though I was spooking everything in the timber. I had been watching a flock of turkeys all winter in this area through trail cams and from a distance with binoculars. This is the second spring I had been turkey hunting these properties, so I had a very good idea where the birds roosted each night and where they wanted to go when they flew down. I wanted to get close to their roost and with every painful step I hoped I wasn't spooking them. As I rounded a corner of a thick hedge to begin the final 100 yards of my walk into the river bottom an owl let out a loud series of hoots, a big ol' tom instantly responded with a thundering gobble! He was roosted exactly where I thought they would be. "Game on" I thought to myself as I slowly and carefully made my way to where I wanted to position myself. This month I'm going to take you through probably one of the more successful and short Iowa Turkey seasons I can remember.

Alright, back to the story. I carefully worked my way in the dark through the thick underbrush to where the timber opened up in the river bottom. As I stepped down into the low ground I was home free and knew I wouldn't spook the birds as the ground was now mostly sand and I could move quietly. I eased to within 75 yards of where the birds were gobbling. As I sat down against a tree, more turkeys start-



ed gobbling. I could hear six different toms up in the trees. The timber began to wake up, with the turkeys gobbling, birds chirping, and rooster pheasants crowing in the distance. As the woods started to get lighter I knew the toms would soon fly down. I let out three soft yelps with my mouth call and all six toms gobbled back at the same time, truly music to my ears! I decided to not call anymore as they knew where I "the hen turkey" was at. Soon after I began to hear the sounds of wingtips brushing against tree limbs and the turkeys were on the ground. I had no idea the show I was about to take in. One by one I started to spot each bird on the ground. Usually patience is something I struggle with, but this particular morning I kept telling myself take it all in and you'll get a chance. The toms were on the ground for a few minutes and about 75 yards in front of me when the hens started to hit the ground. Soon I was literally surrounded by turkeys, they were dropping in everywhere and to my count, I had 26 hens and six toms all around with some jakes mixed in. All six toms were now full strut about 60 yards out and all together. It was like a painting with the sun backlighting their fans from the east. They kept strutting as the hens moved around and scratched in the leaves. Eventually the hens started to make their way to the west as I had seen them do many times on my trail cameras. The toms were soon to follow. The hens all passed by me at 35 - 40yards and my heart was racing, it was all I could do to stay still. Typically I don't get too nervous anymore around turkeys, but this hunt had me worked into a frazzle! As the toms started to take the same path the hens did, I readied myself for the shot. As the lead tom stepped into an open lane I clicked off the safety, let out a couple loud clucks to get him to poke his head up, aimed, and fired! The big tom turned and ran away..... "What happened?" I thought. I could not believe it, I had missed... with a shotgun at 40 yards. I was stunned, I didn't know what to think for a moment, I had this beautiful show and I ruined the moment. I sat there for a while and reflected on my shot. I came to the conclusion that I was so worked up with excitement in that moment I didn't settle the gun before I pulled the trigger. As I walked back to the truck, I started to feel better as I realized I had a wonderful show in the timber and now I would get to go again in second season! I gave the timber a rest for a day, as I had spooked all those birds. My next hunt would be Sunday morning, my plan was to get right back near the same roosting area

and get just a bit closer to change the shot from 40 yards to hopefully around 20 yards. Sunday morning came a bit warmer with a small chance of rain so I knew I needed to make it happen before the rain arrived. I was up around 4am and made my way to the timber. I had a slight breeze so my walk in was a little easier as the wind helped conceal my noise. I carefully made my way through the darkness using a small light here and there to avoid tree limbs and sticks on the ground. It had warmed up enough since Friday that I had broke a sweat by the time I neared the area I wanted to setup. As I sat down and readied my calls a Tom gobbled loud, only problem was I now felt too close to the roosting area. He was a mere 30 yards from where I was sitting! Getting too close can be a big problem, while on the roost, a turkeys constantly scan the ground with their best defense, their eyes. I now had to remain completely still until he flew down. As the glow to the east started to become more light, I could see turkeys all around me in the trees. Three of them were gobblers and the rest, hens and Jakes. When one would gobble, all three would



gobble! It was a thunderous rock concert in the timber, when all three gobbled it was so loud being that close, I could almost feel it in the ground. My heart was pounding and the tension was high as I waited for them to fly off roost to the ground. All three toms were right in front of me in plain view. I kept thinking to myself, take your time on the shot. As the timber woke up the turkeys began stretching their wings and moving around on the tree limbs. The first tom that gobbled started to bob and lean out and down he came, he hit the ground about 40 yards to my left. I let out just a couple soft yelps hoping to not spook the birds still on roost and he gobbled along with the two toms still in the tree. He went into full strut and started to come right at me. I could hear him spit drumming as he neared. I clicked off the safety as he crossed the 30 yard mark. He was still full strut, so I let out some loud putts on my mouth call. He went out of strut and poked his head up. I settled the bead of my shotgun and fired. He was done right where he stood. The other birds still in the trees were flying everywhere away spooked. As I walked up to the tom, I just slowed down and took the moment in. I tagged him and set up my phone for pictures. As I slowly walked back to the truck, the rain started to fall. I had gotten it done before the rain and was back at the house by 7 am. I now had the two-week wait for 4th season to arrive. In Iowa, a hunter is allowed two turkey tags and my next tag was 4th season. As the day neared for 4th season, my wife, Aubrey, and I did a lot of driving the gravel roads to watch the turkeys from a distance to see how their patterns and movements were changing as the spring rolled on. Aubrey doesn't hunt, but she loves to help in the scouting process. The night before the next hunt, we spotted some toms in the same area as my previous hunts so I knew they were still using the same routine and the plan was set to once again be in there early and get near their roost. The alarm went off much earlier now that May neared. Although tired, I was fired up to get back in the timber. Much like before, I eased down the lane

with the truck carefully not shining the timber with my headlights. This morning was much warmer than 2nd season and I felt very mobile with the fewer layers I needed to wear. The plan was the same and the timber was once again so calm the old cliché 'you could hear a pin drop" is needed to describe it. I slowly made my way carefully and every step deliberate and thought out in hopes of not being too loud and spooking everything. I made my way to a nice tree that gave me great cover and was fairly close to where I thought they were roosted. This morning, however, was differ-The day before was very windy out of the Northwest and when the first gobble came in the pre-dawn darkness, the Tom was roosted across the river. As I sat there, I hoped when the other birds gobbled one would be on my side of the river. Soon after five different toms were gobbling and all on the other side. The windy day before had repositioned where they roosted. I started to think this hunt might be a bust. In my experience it has been very difficult over the years to call a tom across water once he's on the ground. I had thought about

moving closer to the river, but decided to be patient and listen to where they go after they flew down. The gobbling was once again thunderous through the river bottom, I let out a couple soft yelps with my mouth call and all the toms immediately responded with gobbles. I began to have hope I might have a chance to get one to fly from roost to my side of the river. My hopes were dashed as I could tell from the change in tone of their gobbles they were now on the ground. I let out a series of fairly loud calls and one of the toms quickly responded. I kept my eyes locked towards the river that was around 75 yards away from my position. I soon saw the flutter of wing tips, the tom had flown across to my side! I readied my gun towards his path and took in the show. The big tom came up the river bank and went into full strut, the glow from the east of the not yet risen sun backlit his fan to make what looked like a painting. He gobbled and looked for the hen "me" he had heard. He went out of strut and quickly started coming to me. As he neared the 30 yard mark I putted on my call and he poked his head up and I fired. He was done quickly and as I walked up to the tom I was excited and could not believe it was over that quickly. Legal shooting time was 5:27 am and I was done and bird tagged at 5:48 am. I sat there, snapped a couple pics and took the moment in. Moments like these don't come nearly often enough. This year was probably by far and away the quickest turkey season I've ever had in 25 years of hunting. I hunted a total of two hours in the three mornings I hunted. The keys to my success, first and foremost, are good areas to hunt. The turkeys have to live there to be successful. The next biggest thing is scouting, my trail cameras and our family scouting trips from the road had these birds pinpointed.

I can't thank the landowners where I hunt enough for not only their generosity in allowing me to hunt their farms, but also for the friendships we've made. I'm sure they get tired of hearing "Thank You." Get out there and make some memories, and, until next time, GET OUTDOORS!!

Another man in the church needed someone to fill a vacant position in a financial sector headed by a Norwegian consultant. > 1986: Pastor married Angeline Marie Cecilia, the love of his life.



Despite Pastor's English proficiency of 525/550 minimum, some German sponsors made an exception and financed a six month intensive English course to boost Pastor's TOEFL score for graduate study.

> 1988: Daughter Lalaina was born on April 30 of that year. Four months after her birth, Pastor traveled to Carbondale IL, to attend Southern Illinois University for a six-month English as a Second Language course and also a few undergraduate business courses. The goal was to start an MA degree in telecommunication management in the fall 1989.

> 1989: Angeline and 14-month-old daughter Lalaina joined Pastor in the United States that summer. Pastor started his graduate study in telecommunication management in the fall.

> 1991: Jonathan was born with a heart condition, cleft palate and multisensory impairment, which caused the family to remain in the United States for Jonathan's treatment. This proved to be an influential occurrence that helped nudge Pastor into entering the ministry.

> While Pastor was writing his Master's thesis and commuting from Carbondale, IL, to St. Louis where Jonathan had two heart

surgeries and then near death when he contracted the flu, Pastor broke down sobbing since he was in such a dark place. Another epiphany occurred on I-64: A sudden silence filled the car. It was a peace he had never experienced before; he knew Christ was in the car. Still sobbing, Pastor praised the Lord for all He had given him. The Lord also used a group of women to "lift him up;" the nuns from the hospital supplied food and cared for Lalaina. Pastor now recognized the importance of a community of believers.

Pastor's physical dream predicting his entrance into the ministry in 1982 would soon become a reality. Jonathan's health issues proved to be God's mysterious way to make it happen. The next of Pastor's journey will be publicized in the June edition of the Chronicle. Stay tuned!



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
