We would like to thank Dewey Hildebrandt for getting the ball rolling to get this road hard-surfaced and surfacing it to interstate specifications. It is eight inches of concrete and will last much longer than us.

We have heard some say it is a highway to nowhere. Not so! It connects to C-33 and is well-traveled. In the first mile alone, we have Dan Schuldt's Repair and Kevin Leistikow's L&L Ag Repair. Both shops are very busy and highly-traveled, with no more dangerous dust and potholes. Croell Redi Mix out of Sumner got the low bid and has done an excellent, fast job. 



Motion made, seconded and carried to adjourn. Hostess was Luann Happel.



# Readlyn, Long Ago

## Wapsi Geography

The Wapsipinicon River has a length of 299.5 miles. Its source is near Taopi in southern Minnesota at an elevation of 1,348 feet above sea level and empties into the Mississippi near De Witt at 574 feet above sea level. The Wapsi enters Iowa in Mitchell County and flows alongside or through the communities of McIntyre, Riceville, Deerfield, Tripoli, Readlyn area, Littleton, Otterville, Independence, Quasqueton, Troy Mills, Central City, Stone City, Anamosa, Olin, Oxford Junction, Toronto, Wheatland, McCausland, Follets and Shafton before it empties into the Mississippi River.

Two state parks are located on the river, Cedar Rock State Park, near Quasqueton, and Wapsipinicon State Park near Anamosa. Many county parks border the Wapsi including the Seven Bridges County Park east of Klinger.

Cedar Rock State Park is a state park in Iowa, preserving the Frank Lloyd Wright-designed Agnes and Lowell Walter residence, also known as Cedar Rock. The Usonian-style (simple in design) was constructed in 1950. Sitting on the brow of a hill overlooking the Wapsipinicon River, the house commands spectacular views of the 320-acre grounds and river. The house was one of Frank Loyd Wright's most complete signature designs. Nearly everything at Cedar Rock bears the architect's imprint. Wright designed the furniture, chose the draperies, and picked out the accessories. Wright also designed an elaborate boathouse on the Wapsipinicon River. Following Lowell Walter's death, the home was donated to the Iowa Department of Natural Resources and opened to the public.

Cedar Rock State Park is a short driving distance from the Readlyn area, not far from Independence. I am disappointed that I have never visited Cedar Rock. It is open to visitors May-October. Visitors must call for a reservation for the tour (319-934-3572).

Wapsipinicon State Park is located near Anamosa. The 394-acre park is along the sandstone and limestone of the Wapsi River. The park was dedicated in 1923 making it one of the oldest state parks in Iowa. The park has several archaeological sites dating from early civilizations. The facilities in the park were developed in the '20s and '30s, constructed by prisoners from nearby Anamosa State Penitentiary. They built shelters, stone arch bridges and roads. The park's recreational facilities include camping, fishing and boating. There are also a couple of caves to explore, including an ice cave.

## The Legend of the Wapsipinicon River

What do we know about the Wapsi River other than it flows 2 ½ miles east of Readlyn or that the Wapsie Valley School District has taken its name from our local river? More will be known after this article is read.

The legend goes that Wapsi was a young warrior and Pinicon was the daughter of an Indian chief from another tribe. Wapsi and Pinicon were engaged in an intertribal love affair much like Romeo and Juliet. They wanted to be married but knew neither tribe would allow it. Thus, they left on their own and eloped but were found by Pinicon's father and the other chiefs. The couple knew that the Indian chiefs would separate them and kill Wapsi for such a treacherous act so they decided they would rather die than be taken back and separated. They raced to the river,

clasping each other, leapt in and drowned in the swirling waters. The sorrowful Indian chief later named the river Wapsipinicon after the two departed lovers.

The romantic legend of Wapsi and Pinicon makes for interesting folklore but is not well-founded in history. The literal translation of the beautiful name is White Potato River or Swan Apple River. The translation refers to the white artichokes which grew along the banks of the

## The Wapsi from Frederika to Seven Bridges County Park

Highway 63 crosses the Wapsi a short distance from Frederika. The dam in Frederika creates a lake with cabins on the west side and homes on the east side. Frederika City Park and Alcock Park are located on the Wapsi west of Frederika.

The Wapsi flows in a southeasterly direction toward Tripoli under Highway 93 flowing through Sweet's Marsh. Plum Creek joins the East Fork of the Wapsipinicon River several miles north of Tripoli which flows through Sweet Marsh and joins the Wapsi east of Tripoli.

Sweet Marsh is a 3200-acre Iowa State Wildlife Management Area. I have never been to Sweet Marsh even though it is less than 8 miles from Readlyn. All I knew about the marsh is that rattlesnakes were found there; however, a rattlesnake has not been seen there in 10 years. I have spent time researching Sweet Marsh. The topic of the marsh is so interesting and broad and will be included in a later article

Within a few miles, the Wapsi enters into an area I knew well in the '40s, from two miles north of Highway 3 to the Sev-

en Bridges Park. It is a tragedy how the Wapsi has changed from the time I fished the river several times a week in the 1940s, 75 years ago. The Wapsi now is a different river, lacking the depth it once had. Areas along the river were fenced off and farmers ran cattle during the summer months. There were open grassy areas all along the river. Access all along the river was available. Simply open and close a barbed wire gate and drive up to the river to a good fishing spot.

Excellent fishing was found 1-½ miles north of Highway 3, north of the bridge near Smoketown; in an old river bed east of the river, one mile north of 3, big bullheads and northern pike; excellent fishing under the bridge on 3, crappies, bass, northern pike and bullheads; 400 feet north of 3 in Benzeau's Bayou, northern pike and bullheads, especially at night (brought mosquito lotion). Here I was running barefoot and stepped on a big snake, all coiled up. Never knew what kind of snake, just kept on running.

Good fishing along Highway 3, 400 feet east of the Wapsi in the old river bed, northern pike and bullheads. Bill Kehe's

cane pole slid into the river baited with a frog, he chased it, cast a line over the line on the pole and brought in about a five pound catfish. More good fishing all along the river, south near the CGW railroad bridge (our swimming hole was nearby), on to Rommel's Bridge and further downstream to the seven bridges.

A few years ago, I walked up to Benzeau's Bayou. What was once a three-to-four foot deep good-sized fishing spot was silted in. The same for the old river bed one mile north of 3 and the old river bed on 3 east of the river. There were some backwaters and ponds along the river years ago and they are now gone.

On Sunday in the '40s many people from Readlyn would tie their cane poles on the side or top of their cars and head for the Wapsi to catch a meal of fish. Those days are sadly gone. Herman Schweer would often drive his Model T to the Wapsi and bring home every bullhead he caught, the little ones too small to clean, he would feed to his chickens. The Wapsi was loaded with bullheads. People, including me, thought bullheads were a delicacy. When fried, that soft

white meat still makes my mouth water.

Otto Richmann would close his garage in Klinger every Thursday afternoon to go fishing. Klinger was a short distance from the seven bridges area. I cannot overstate the good fishing in the Wapsi and how many from Readlyn went fishing. Those days along the Wapsi were some of the happiest days of my youth. One problem, during World War II, long cane poles were in short supply, they had to be imported.

Morbid history in the Readlyn area of the Wapsi. Wilbert Matthias drowned near Rommel's Bridge and the bodies of the two cousins were found in The Seven Bridges County Park. The killer was certainly acquainted with the area.

From the Readlyn area, the Wapsi flows through Independence where, at times, the river has caused great flooding, it then flows many miles further, into the Mississippi.

It was a pleasure to write this article. It brought back some pleasant memories. A truism, things do not always change for the better, for example, The Wapsipinicon River



## "Tactics for Late Season Success" Ejohnston@mossyoakprostaff.com

As the hunting seasons wind down in the area, some folks think it can be very hard to take a deer. The whitetails have seen months of pressure with all the different seasons Iowa offers, and they have seen very hard pressure from the shotgun seasons in the days leading up to late season. While, yes, the deer have seen a lot of pressure, Iowa's late deer seasons can be a very fun and productive time to bag a great Iowa mature buck or a doe to finish filling the freezer for the year. This month I will take you through the tactics I use to hunt whitetails in the late season.

It was many years ago, but I remember it well. It was December 23, 2000. I was still a young hunter, but was gaining experience. I had never really hunted the late muzzleloader season at this point, but I thought I would give it a try. The winter season had already been brutal that year and there were many inches of snow on the ground. Having never hunted the late season, I really wasn't sure what to expect. I decided I would hunt from some of my bow-hunting stands and this particular evening I had decided to sit over a cut beanfield. The snow was so deep on the walk to my stand I was having trouble just walking along

the edge of the field, mixed in with the thirty-mile-an-hour northwest wind and sub-zero temperatures. I thought to myself, "What am I doing? This is crazy!" As I sat in my stand that afternoon, it got colder and colder. The wind got even stronger and I was downright cold! About an hour before dark, I finally caught some movement back in the timber. I thought, finally, some action! I watched carefully and realized this was not just a deer making its way to the field, but this was at the time the largest whitetail I had ever had a chance at!

The buck slowly worked its way out of the woods along an old logging road that led to the bean field. I thought, "Perfect! He's going to walk in front of my stand for an easy 30-yard shot!" Once I got a real good look at this deer and his drop tines, I was shaking uncontrollably! I was so cold, and the adrenaline was flowing, I could barely raise my gun! As he approached, he turned off the logging road and headed straight at me! He walked right to the base of the tree and I shot him at five yards. I was so excited and hooked on late season from that time on.

With my inexperience at the time, I was actually very lucky on that hunt and didn't realize I had stumbled into a very productive pattern for late season. I had

also made some mistakes that I'll get into. When you hunt late season, be it with muzzleloader or bow, the pattern for this time of year centers around FOOD. That is the main deal of this whole season. If your hunting area doesn't have a January food source, find one that does. Everything a whitetail does in the winter centers around their stomachs.

What I like to do to get ready for a late season hunt is scout first to find a group of deer on a food source. Deer this time of year will be herded up on any available food source. I will drive around my hunting areas, checking the cut crop fields looking for what fields the deer are using before I plunge in to hunt. I normally use trail cams in all of my deer hunting, but this time of year that can be very tricky. The deer will bed very close to the food source, so, by checking a camera, you will usually do more harm than good by bumping them off the field. In certain scenarios cameras can be utilized, but I usually have better luck keeping my distance and scouting from a warm truck.

Once you've found a good field to hunt, you must pay attention to details on everything. As I said earlier, these deer are pressured and you must stay sharp with every move. You must pay great attention to wind direction, your scent control, and entrance routes to your stands. I was lucky on that December hunt to make it to the stand without bumping deer. The woods are very open this time of year and, as I said earlier, the deer will bed very close to the food. By close, I mean usually within

a hundred yards or so. You must plan a way in that keeps the wind in your face and doesn't expose you too much.

That leads me to stands. That December hunt, one of my mistakes was hunting 20 feet up a tree fully exposed to the elements. Even with my high quality Mossy Oak clothes of today, one will not make it long exposed to sub-zero temps and wind chill. I have turned to ground blinds for late season. Ground blinds allow you to set up on fields, sneak in from behind and get yourself out of winter's wrath! Sometimes you can even get away with using a small propane heater to help keep warm. But with ground blinds, it's best to get them out a little in advance to allow the deer to get accustomed to seeing it near their field.

As for the weather, the colder it is, the better the hunting will be. They have to eat, and the cold drives that need even further.

One last tactic is I only hunt in the evenings during late season. The deer bed so close to the food its very, very hard to get in position in the morning darkness without spooking them. In some circumstances it can be done, but in my experience evenings are the most productive with the least intrusion.

Late season can be a lot of fun, and with these tactics, you should see a lot of deer! So as Christmas rolls around, get yourself a late season tag, bundle up and head for the woods. You may get that big buck you've been after all season! And, until next time, Get Outdoors!
