





Go to the national news, anytime, any day of the week and you're going to be faceto-face with destruction, heartache, and depression. Well, I've decided, that's not going

to be the case today. That train is coming off the tracks. I have made the necessary arrangements, that if you go to the Readlyn Chronicle newspaper this month, you'll have before you, a feel-good story. Lord knows, we can all use a feelgood story.

I want to take you back to June 20, 1975, in Norfolk Virginia. Entertainer extraordinaire, Elvis Presley, was performing an afternoon show in concert. After finishing a song, Elvis began joking with his bandmates, as he often did. Suddenly, he noticed a little girl off to the left side of the stage. He stopped the show in front of 12,000 fans and walked over to the little girl and her mother. He knelt down to her eye-level and he could see that she was totally blind. Elvis held his microphone to his side so the audience couldn't hear his words to her. Eventually, he took the red scarf from his neck, kissed it, and touched her blind eyes with it. He then wrapped and tied the scarf neatly around her neck.

The little girl told Elvis that she listens to his songs every night before she goes to bed. Elvis responded by telling her, "I've had a lot of accolades, awards, and many

good things said about me, but none of that matters. What I mean to you is all that really matters to me right now."


The blind girl asked if she could rub her hands over Elvis Presley's face. "My mother says that you are the most beautifully handsome person and I'd like to feel your face to see you," the little girl said. "You sure can," Elvis replied. "I want you to know, that it would only be a waste of your time, because it's you that has the most beautiful face I have ever seen. If you want to feel or see beautiful, you need only to touch your own face," Elvis added.

"Do you really mean that, Mr. Elvis?" the blind girl asked. "I sure do, and as a matter of fact, I'd like your autograph to always remind me that I have met the most beautiful person there is," Elvis said.

After his conversation with the little blind girl, Elvis hugged her tight and continued on with his show. After the concert, Elvis contacted his right-hand man, Joe Esposito, and asked him to tell the little girl's family that he will always be there for them. He handed Esposito a check for \$50,000 to give to the family. Further, he arranged air fare, concert tickets, and all accommodations for the family, for every show he performed from that point on, until his passing.

Elvis Presley had a God-given talent and a far greater, generous heart. He stopped his show of 12,000 fans for one little, blind girl, so that, if only for a moment, she had vision to see beyond what her young heart could only feel.







Can you believe football is almost here again?!

In my 3.5 years as an advisor, I have always said this is way more of a COACHING job than it is a career in financial literacy. A coach has to get to know his players. Understand how they learn. Some are even "do-it-yourselfers" and do an amazing, efficient job being self-taught.

Then there is a middle ground where people want good things for themselves and their communities, and they're willing to do the work to get there... they just don't know exactly how to put their visions into play. People like this need and appreciate a coach for their guidance and mentorship along the way. This is the common prospect type that comes across my desk. They're great people that have worked hard for what they have. They genuinely want to have a partner that helps them achieve their potential and avoid mistakes. They want the truth... not fluff. They want to be told if they're on track or need to make adjustments. They want a partner to navigate their investments at the best interest of their goals so they can give their full focus to their own families, goals, and passions.





Dear Warrior Families - We are continuing to do school registration this year online! We appreciate all of the grace and understanding these past 2 years as it was still new to us in the implementation of this process. There will always be kinks to work out but overall, we felt it was a great experience and hope that you found it beneficial as well. There were several reasons we chose to go online for registration:

- 1) Eliminates the need for physical paperwork (in most cases)
- 2) Eliminates the need to travel to the school office
- 3) Provides convenience and accessibility by allowing registration to be completed at your own pace from anywhere with an Internet connection

Please take a moment to read the information below and if you have any questions do not hesitate to contact us.

Registration Time Line and Access: Registration will be open Monday, July 28, at 8:00 a.m. until Monday, August 11. There are two ways in which you can access registration:

1) For those families who already have a parent portal account - Log into your parent portal, click the 3 lines in the upper left-hand corner, click 'More' at the bottom of the drop-down list, then click 'Registration.' This will take you to the school registration. This is the easiest way for returning students to register. All of your information will populate and you will need to review and make changes if necessary.

2) For those families who do NOT have a parent portal account (including new students to the district) - the link is provided below. You can click on the link, type it into your web browser, or copy and paste it into your browser. (**You will want to use a computer, tablet, or iPad as most cell phone screens are too small to read the registration materials.**) You will be required to input all infor-

mation requested for guardians and students.

Things to note:

• Parents registering students for Transitional Kindergarten or Kindergarten - Please choose 00 for grade level under the student heading in Demographics. For Previous School, if vour child did NOT attend Preschool, put NA in the required fields.

Parents registering students for Preschool - Please choose PK for grade level at the bottom of the drop down list in Demographics.

When registering a 7-12 student - All 7-12 students must have a Bound account where most health documentation will be uploaded (physicals and immunization records) and where permissions will be obtained. Paper copies of physicals will not be accepted. The following forms may be turned in to the jr. sr. high school office prior to the first day of school, if applicable: Medication Authorization, Release of Health and Educational Information, Asthma Inhaler Authorization, Diet Modification Request Form, and Dental Forms.

If you need help completing your registration, or need access to a computer or Internet, please contact any Wapsie Valley school office starting August 1. If you started the application, please have it filled out as much as possible and remember to provide your application number so we can help you complete it.

Fees: When you have completed online registration, please call your child's school building after August 1,

to have your parent portal account set up if you do not have one set up already. If you already have a parent portal account you will need to log into the portal to pay your registration fees.

(There will be a \$2 fee added to all payments through the Parent Portal. Paying by check or cash is always accepted by mailing or bringing it into any of our buildings at no additional cost. In order to use a debit or credit card, paying through the Parent Portal with the additional fee is the only

Finally: 1) Fairbank Families Only: Fairbank students will be able to see their assigned teachers under the Parent Portal by clicking the 3 lines at the top left-hand corner and selecting 'Schedule' sometime during mid August.

This past legislative session saw many law changes. One of those changes deals with the use of personal electronic devices by students at school. The Wapsie Valley Board of Education approved a policy to reflect this law change. Please

let us know if you have any questions.

Policy 503.09: Use of Personal Electronic Devices by Students: In order to promote the best educational experience, students should feel connected to their educational environment and to others in the school community. Building meaningful connections can occur in a variety of ways. Technology has advanced peoples' ability to connect with one another across a variety of virtual platforms, and when used appropriately, adds value to the learning environment. However, it is vital to the developmental health and growth of students that the district provides opportunities for students to connect with peers and other members of their school communi-ty in-person whenever possible. In-person learning and interactions teach vital life and social skills that students will need for their continued success in the community.

Definitions: For purposes of this policy, a "personal electronic device" is a device that is used by a student to send or receive information or create or review content, including cellular and mobile phones, watches or other wearable devices in a receive or transmit mode, laptop or notebook computers, tablets, video game devices, portable media players, and any applications or programs installed by the student on a school-owned or issued device. A "personal electronic device" does not include a device possessed by the student for documented legal,

health, and safety purposes.

The "school day" is from 8:15 a.m. to 3:18 p.m.

General Rules: Student use of personal electronic devices during the school day (8:15-3:18) is prohibited. Students have access to district-owned electronic devices as appropriate for the instructional needs of the learning environment and authorized by the classroom teacher. Parents or guardians who need to communicate with students during instructional time may contact the school building administrative office.

The following are the district-provided educational technologies and devices that will be made available to students for instructional purposes:
• Chromebooks

iPads

A parent or guardian may communicate with a student via their school provided email or in the event of an emergency requiring the student's immediate attention, they may contact their student through the school's of-

In the event of an emergency, the school will contact the parent or guardian by the method most recently listed by the parent in the school's student information system immediately when it becomes safe to do so.

If the student uses a personal electronic device

during the administration of any assessment, the student may receive no credit for the assessment, and will also face the consequences identified in the prior paragraphs. If the student uses a personal electronic device in a state or federal mandated assessment, the school will follow any protocols for that assessment's security.

Health Concerns: A parent or guardian of a student may petition to allow their child to maintain access to a personal electronic device for a legitimate, documented health-related concern. The petition shall be addressed to the building principal. If not granted, a parent or guardian may appeal to the superintendent or designee, whose decision shall be final. A parent or guardian has the burden of providing a legitimate reason for allowing the child to maintain access to a personal electronic device contrary to Wapsie Valley School's policy.

A student who has a current Individualized Education Program, a plan under section 504 of the federal to a personal device during an appropriate portion of the school day as documented in the plan. The device should be used solely in the manner necessary and doc-

Violations: Students who violate this policy will be held to the discipline policies in the student/parent handbook

Use of Personal Electronic Devices Outside of the School Day: Students who choose to use personal electronic devices outside of the 8:15-3:18 school day, while on school property, at school-sponsored events, must use these devices in accordance with all applicable laws and board policies. Students who violate this policy may face disciplinary consequences up to and including suspension or expulsion. The Superintendent, in conjunction with building level administration, will develop administrative regulations in accordance with this policy.

State and local school officials have adopted the following family size and income criteria for determining eligibility:

qualify for free meal benefits and received notification qualifying for reduced price benefits, complete an application for free and reduced price meals.

Households must contact the school if they choose to decline meal benefits.

3. Some SNAP and FIP households will receive a letter from the Iowa Department of Health and Human Services (Iowa HHS) which will qualify the children listed on the letter for free meals. Parents must take this letter to the student's school be qualified for free meals automatically through the state direct certification process. Their host family will receive notification of these benefits. Families that receive this notification from the school need to do nothing more for their foster students to receive free meals. If a family has foster students living with them and does not receive notification and wishes to apply for such meals, instructions for making application for such students are contained on the application form. Households may be eligible for free or reduced-price meal benefits one of four ways

1. Households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for reduced price meals or free meals, if they complete an application for free and reduced price school meals/milk. Households may complete one application listing all children and return it to your student's school. When completing an application, only the last four digits of the social security number of the household's primary wage earner or another adult household member is needed.

2. Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) households, students receiving benefits under the Family Investment Program (FIP) and students in a few specific Medicaid programs are eligible for free or reduced price meals. Most students from SNAP and FIP households will be qualified for free meals automatically. These households will receive a letter from their student's schools notifying them of their benefits. Households that receive a letter from the school need to do nothing more for their student(s) to receive free or reduced price meals. No further application is necessary. If any students were not listed on the notice of eligibility, the household should contact the school to have free or reduced price meal benefits extended to them. If you feel you would to receive free meals.

4. SNAP or FIP households receiving benefits that do not receive a letter from Iowa HHS must complete an application with the abbreviated information as indicated on the application and instructions, for their students to receive free meals. When the application lists an assistance program's case number for any household member, eligibility for free benefits is extended to all students in a household.

Eligibility from the previous year will continue within the same school for up to 30 operating days into the new school year. When the carryover period ends, unless the household is notified that their students are directly certified or the household submits an application that is approved, the students must pay full price for school meals and the school will not send a reminder or a notice of expired eligibility. An application cannot be approved unless complete eligibility information is submitted. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. If a family member becomes unemployed the family should contact the school to complete an application.

Households notified of their student's eligibility must contact the school if the household chooses to decline the free meal

Foster children are eligible for free meal benefits. Some foster students will

ter student may be included as a member of the foster family if the foster family chooses to also apply for benefits for other students. Including students in foster care as household members may help other students in the household qualify for benefits. If the foster family is not eligible for free or reduced price meal benefits, it does not prevent a foster student from receiving benefits. Special Supplement Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) participants may be eligible for free or reduced price meals based on a completed application.

When known by the school, households will be notified of any child eligible for free meals if the children are enrolled in the Head Start/Even Start program or are considered homeless, migrant or runaway. If any children are not listed on the notice of eligibility, contact the school for assistance in receiving benefits. If households are dissatisfied with the application approval done by the officials, they may make a formal appeal either orally or in writing to the school's designated hearing official. The policy statement on file at the school contains an outline of the hearing procedure. School officials may verify the information in the application, and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable state and federal criminal statutes. "Tournament First Timer"

As many of us outdoor enthusiasts know, there are many first times in the outdoors. First fish, first deer, the list goes on. Each of those firsts are always very special and moments we never forget. This month, I will tell you the story of young Keegan Geerts' first bass tournament.

This story actually starts quite a long time ago becoming friends with the Geerts family through Travis and Nicole Geerts in the Readlyn area. Travis and I are both archery coaches with Wapsie Valley Archery, and, over time, became great friends, hanging out regularly locally and up at our cabin in Prairie du Chien, as they, too, have a cabin up there which, at the time, was about a half mile from us. Through our adventures boating and cooking out, we became friends with Travis's brother and sister-in-law, Bryan and Mandy Geerts. Their cabin is right next to Travis and Nicole and just recently, this past spring, we moved from our old cabin to a new place right near all of them in Prairie du Chien.

In the backyard is a pond and, as you might imagine, I started showing the boys, Henry Geerts (Travis and Nicole's son) and Keegan Geerts (Bryan and Mandy's son), all the different techniques to catch fish in the pond. The boys took right to it and eventually this evolved into me taking them both out for trips in the bass boat on the Mississippi River. Each trip, the boys caught fish and learned more and more as we went catching everything from bass, to walleyes, and even drum.

One Sunday morning, my eyes were really opened to just how intense Keegan was getting on his bass-fishing skills. As Henry and I fished from the front of the boat catching a few, Keegan proceeded to give us an on-the-water seminar, throwing a crank-bait from the back of the boat and catching four bass that totaled up over 14

pounds combined! While Keegan, at 12 years old, isn't one to typically smile in a picture, even he couldn't help but give a smirk this day. I was beyond impressed with Keegan's ability. We were up near the lock and dam this particular morning and, as we drove the boat away, Keegan looked at me and Henry with a crooked smile and said, "That was a dam good spot!" I'm sure the pun was intended as we laughed and headed back to the cabins.

Later that week, my usual tournament partner, Adam, informed me he wouldn't be able to fish a June 28 tournament out of Lansing we had talked about fishing. I thought it over and decided to ask Bryan and Mandy if I could ask Keegan to fish it with me. They gave me the green light and I immediately asked Keegan if he would. As you might imagine his answer was a very big yep!

From there the plans began — we would practice and find areas on Friday and fish the tournament on Saturday. As I talked to Keegan leading up to the event, the wait for him was long as this would be his first official bass tournament.

Thursday, June 26 finally arrived and I met Keegan at my cabin as his mom and dad brought him up. We sat in the boat readying tackle and rods. Keegan was in awe as I laid out seven St. Croix rods for him to use and I showed him what to tie on each rod and the purpose for all the different baits and rod styles. The best way to describe tournament fishing rods is to compare them to golf clubs. Each rod has its job and technique to do.

Finally, Friday morning arrived and we made our way to Lansing right as the sun was starting to rise over the trees. We were met with less than ideal conditions with recent heavy rains not only raising the water level, but making it very muddy. I told Keegan right away, the key for this practice would be finding clean water.

The first few spots we checked were

very muddy and discouraging, but we kept checking and eventually came across a small backwater off of the channel that held clean water and very quickly generated fish strikes. I relayed to Keegan this was the type of areas we needed to mimic and we should have a solid plan.

We headed further south on Pool 9 and found half a dozen spots similar, including one area that I hooked up with a three pound largemouth bass. Three pounders are kind of a benchmark size range to look for in practice. As late morning came, the wind started to pick up out of the south and the waves grew in intensity. I decided to cut practice short as to not wear Keegan out before competition day. On the ride back, Keegan held on to the side and dash handle, nearly coming off the seat with each wave. At first I was worried, but again I saw the slight smirk and I knew he was having a great time.

Back at the cabin, we talked over our plan and talked about the importance of checking over all our gear before the tournament. A 3 a.m. alarm woke us from our sleep to start the day. With the 45 minute drive to Lansing, it required this earliness with tournament takeoff being 5:30 a.m. As we arrived in the parking lot, we were greeted with fellow anglers all getting a kick out of Keegan fishing his first tournament and reminiscing on their first tournaments. We checked in and received our boat number of 7 for takeoff order a great draw for Keegan's first time. As we waited our turn to take off. I looked at Keegan and said "Are you ready, Mahomes?" Keegan's favorite football player is Patrick Mahomes, so I call him that often. He looked at me, slightly shaking, and said, "Yep!!"

As our number was called, I hammered the throttle and we were headed to our first spot, the water, smooth as glass made for a quick run. I looked at Keegan and said, "How fast you think we were going?" He smiled and said "61.2 mph!" I said, "You looked at the dash!" Another "Yep!" finished the conversation as I jumped up front putting the trolling motor down and started casting. Quickly I heard "I GOT ONE, GET THE NET!" I looked back to see Keegan with his rod bent all the way over, battling a large fish. As I grabbed the net, what appeared to be easily a 4 pound smallmouth bass leapt from the water just as Keegan's bait shot straight in the air

losing the fish. Panic swept over me as I thought this is not the way to start a day let alone a tournament career. I looked over expecting complete devastation only to see Keegan making another cast.

"I'll get another one!" he exclaimed. I was amazed at his confidence as even I was dejected. We continued fishing the area back and forth, catching our five fish limit by 8:36 a.m. Keegan had caught some and I caught some both adding to our live well. Along the way, Keegan learned about placing tags on the fish and keeping them in order while doing our best to keep the fish healthy in the live well.

We fished our first area until about 10:00 a.m. With check-in time being 2 p.m., we decided to head back north to the first spot we found in practice holding fish. We fished the area thoroughly, slightly upgrading our limit with a bit bigger fish each time along with catching small fish that didn't help our limit. With time running out, Keegan hooked up with a very nice largemouth bass, boosting our limit by a pound or so. I looked at him and said, "Last minute magic, Mahomes!" He smiled and once again I got a loud "Yep!"

At 1:45 p.m., I fired up the boat and made the 5-minute run back to check in for the weigh-in. We loaded the boat and readied ourselves to weigh. I told Keegan no matter the outcome we had a great day boating over 40 bass throughout our day. I showed Keegan how to add water to the bag and we bagged our five fish up from the live well. It was all Keegan could do to carry that bag of fish and water to the scale, but he proudly brought them to the weighmaster.

"11.38 pounds, Eric Johnston and Keegan Geerts!" the weighmaster called out. We fist bumped and all the anglers standing nearby said "nice job, young man" to Keegan. We snapped some pictures before releasing our catch and waited for the results.


